COULD DISTRIBUTE WAR MATERIALS TO ANY COUNTRY HE DEEMED ADVISABLE—BRITISH WARSHIPS WOULD BE ENABLED TO BE

REPAIRED IN U.S. YARDS

WASHINGTON, D.C., January 10: (CP)— After President Franklin D. Roosevelt had urged quick action on a vast lease-lend program, administration leaders asked the United States Congress today to give him sweeping powers to transfer American-made military equipment to Great Britain and other warring democracies. The President told a press conference before the legislation was introduced that the powers it gave him were needed to avoid delay.

The bill would permit the President to manufacture defence articles for any country whose defence he deemed vital to the United States; to sell, transfer, exchange, lease, lend or otherwise dispose of any defence article to any such government.

One clause enables the United States to repair defence articles whether manufactured in the United States or not. For example, British warships could be repaired in Brooklyn or any other United States navy yard if the President considered it in the interest of national defence.

The measure authorizes the appropriation of funds in such amounts as may be necessary. Estimates of the eventual cost have reached ten billion dollars.

Mr. Roosevelt also told the press conference that he had signed a proclamation requiring copper, brass, bronze, zinc, nickel and potash to be exported only under export licences effective February 3.

Under the plan, the President is also authorized to decree priorities to United States arms manufacturing plants for delivery to democracies such as Great Britain, Greece and China.

TO TRAIN CANADIANS

Plan to Speed up War Effort By Fitting Men and Boys For Industry

OTTAWA, Jan. 10: (CP)-Plans to speed up training of men and boys for Canadian war industry were announced today with an objective for 1941 to train 100,000 workers.

The Dominion government will spend more than \$4,000,-000 during the next fiscal year on a project mostly in allowances to cover living expenses of trainees taking courses at vocational schools.

From the schools the trainees will go to schools in industrial plants where they will receive a minimum scale fixed by the government.

The length of training will depend upon the aptitude and degree of skill required but. in general, the courses should last from six to three months. Single trainees living at

home will not get allowances

except under special circum-

stances. Those away from home will get \$7 to \$9 weekly and trainees who are heads of families will get \$12 weekly.

GREAT RAID UPON ENEMY

Out by Royal Air Force Today

LONDON, Jan. 10: (CP) - As aerial warfare between Great Britain and Germany assumed new violence, British bombers pummelled cross-country targets along the French coast today with a large scale daylight assault following night raids against the Ruhr Valley and invasion ports.

So great were today's attacks that the repercussion of exploding bombs shook the English coast twenty to thirty miles across the Channel. It was the largest daytime raid vet essaved by the British and commenced shortly after noon. Late in the afternoon, watchers on the shore of southeast England saw an impressive formation of bombers and fighters returning from across the

Night raids caused explosions and fires in a Gelsenkirchen synthetic

Other squadrons last night made a six-hour assault on the German submarine base at Brest. Fires were started and direct hits scored on a large ship in the harbor. One pilot said a salvo burst near a dry dock and caused an immense explosion.

War News

INVASION OF ITALY

LONDON-Once the situation in North Africa is cleaned up and there appears to be good reason to believe that it soon will be, Great Britain may start an intensive attack upon Italy itself by land, sea and air, it is suggested in military quarters here. Of course, there is always the possibility that Italy may sue for peace or have a revolution.

TRAIN BOYS FOR AIR

LONDON, January 10-Sir Archibald Sinclair, Secretary of State for Air, announces the establishment of a training plan designed to open the Royal Air Force to boys of sixteen and older to meet the growing demand for pilots. The plan includes special educational facilities, formation of university air squadrons and short university courses for air crew candidates. It is planned to institute the new training plan February 1. It is estimated that from 600,000 to 800,000 boys between the ages of sixteen and eighteen would become eligible for service under the plan.

GREAT VICTORY FOR GREEKS

ATHENS- Greece today celebrated the capture of Klisura, one of the main bases of the Italian defence line on the way to the key port of Valona in Albania. It is hailed as one of the greatest military achievements of the war. A series of bloody bayonet charges preceded the final fall of Klisura which gave way after twenty-six days of siege. Not only have the Greeks Captured Klisura but they have reached heights overlooking Valona, the possibly early evacuation of which is seen by some. Fleeing Italians were overtaken by the Greek warriors and their retreat deteriorated. Large numbers of prisoners and considerable quantities of war materials were captured. The advance of the Greeks in central Albania also continues.

BRITISH SWEEP FORWARD

CAIRO-While siege forces are being concentrated around Tobruk with the possibility that an early storming of that Libyan port may be essayed in spite of the fact that its fall would bring a large addition to the already embarrassingly huge number of Italian prisoners, British and Australian mechanized forces pushed further west into Libya today. At the same time the British, it-was revealed, had thrust seventy miles into Italian Somaliland and entered Buna unopposed. During the last few days the British have recorded advances on four fronts in North Africa.

NEW RAIDS ON BRITAIN

LONDON-Fifteen cities and towns were raided during the night by German bombers in a renewal of the air war against Great Britain on a scattered but not particularly heavy scale. London, the Midlands, Liverpool and Bristol were among the parts visited by the enemy. The attack lasted about seven hours, ending shortly after midnight. Nowhere were casualties heavy or damage extensive, it was officially announced.

MASS R.A.F. DAYLIGHT ATTACK

LONDON-Wave after wave of Royal Air Force bombing planes flew like clockwork over Boulogne and other French coast invasion bases of the Nazis shortly after mid-day today and, dropping huge demolition bombs, did shattering damage. It was one of the heaviest and most concerted raids undertaken by the British so far in the war. Explosions could be heard as far away as southeast England where the land shook. Last night the Royal Air Force blasted at the industrial Ruhr, synthetic oil plants at Gelsenkirchen, docks at Brest and fuel storage facilities at Rotterdam.

Twenty-Eight Thousand Men In Training

OTTAWA, Jan. 10.—Twenty-eight thousand young men went into training in thirty-eight compulsory military camps throughout Canada today. The term of thirty days may be extended to four months.

EDITORIAL

Difficult Financing - - -

With half the assessed value of the city taken off the taxable roll, it is evident that financing the city of Prince Rupert must be difficult. The city owns over a million and a quarter dollars worth of the land which, if held by individuals, would be paying about fifty thousand dollars a year taxes. Two large pieces of property are also held by the Dominion and provincial governments. Business and other improved property held by the city is bring in some revenue and helps to improve the financial condition of the city.

It is satisfactory to know that the financial condition of the city is improving and that any improvements being made are made out of current revenue and not from borrowing. However the city is governed during the next! few years, borrowing will be probably impossible. All improvements must be paid for from current revenue.

Present Situation - - -

It is rather unfortunate that the provincial government could not have arranged for the passing of the legislation asked by the people of Prince Rupert in regard to city management. The present situation is very unsatisfactory. The local commissioner is in charge but everything he does must be referred to the non-resident commissioner who does not and cannot understand local conditions. The city is so far removed from the capital that

it is impossible to keep in close touch. The city is now solvent and, if we are not to have a city manager as promised, it would be better to return to the old mayor and council form of government, subject to the restrictions imposed and the new set-up made neceshary by the change in bond interest payments and sinking

fund payments. We should very much dislike returning to the old form of administration but the present system is even worse than the old. If there is to be a commissioner, he should be a resident commissioner with all the powers of a commissioner so that citizens may feel they can go to him with some hope of getting action on any local matter.

Registration Of Japanese - - -

Owing to the present feeling of distrust, it is a good idea to have all Japanese residents in the country specially registered, more for their protection than for any other reason. There have been strained relations between the Japanese and the British for some time and, while there has been an easing up of late, the Japanese government still declares itself to be an ally of our enemies. That in itself is enough to make us suspicious.



EW INSTALMENT PLAN OF PAYING INCOME TAX WITHOUT INTEREST







THIS YEAR, for the first time, it is possible for you to pay your income tax in eight monthly instalments without interest.

In former years, you had to pay at least onethird of your income tax by April 30th. After that date 5% interest was charged on the unpaid balance (8% after August 31st).

This year, two-thirds of your tax may remain unpaid after April 30th without interest, provided you pay in eight monthly payments beginning in

This plan was put into effect to enable you to adjust yourself to the sharply increased Income Tax burden for 1940 and is available to you only on the following conditions:

One-third of the total tax must be paid in four monthly instalments payable in January, February, March and April. The remaining two-thirds of the tax must be paid in four equal monthly instalments in May, June, July and August.

For example, if your tax is \$60.00 it may be

Actually you may pay one-twelfth of your total tax in each of the first four months of 1941, and one-sixth of the total in each of the next four months. However, it is recommended that you pay your tax in eight equal monthly instalments of \$7.50 each instalment for a total tax of \$60.00.

WHO PAYS INCOME TAX?

If you are a single person without dependents, and your income in 1940 was more than \$750.00

you pay general-income-tax. If you are a married person without dependents, and your income in 1940 was more than \$1,500.00

you pay general-income-tax. If you are a married person with children, you are allowed \$400.00 exemption for each dependent child or grandchild, in addition to the \$1,500

exemption. NOTE: In addition to the general-income-tax you pay National Defence Tax on your total income without any exemption if you are single and your income goes over \$600 or if you are married and your income goes over \$1,200.

FILL IN YOUR INCOME TAX FORMS NOW

The necessary forms for making your income tax returns are available at any post office, or from the Inspector of Income Tax for your district. Complete information and rates of taxation are supplied with the forms.

Make out your income tax returns now-before January 31st. Find out how much your total tax will be. Learn how much you must pay each month. By doing this, you will avoid interest charges and penalties.

PAYMENT FORMS Instalment Income Tax Remittance Forms are available at any post office, or any branch of any bank, or the office of the Inspector for your District, and their use will ensure accurate and proper allocation of your payment. However, you can send in your instalments by ordinary letter with your name and address plainly stated thereon, clearly indicating the division between Provincial and Dominion

RATES OF GENERAL-INCOME-TAX WHICH INDIVIDUALS MUST PAY

Your net Taxable Income is the amount left after you deduct exemptions from your total income.

If your net Taxable Income is \$250 or less the tax is. If between \$250 and \$1000 the tax is \$ 15 plus 8 %

For higher incomes refer to the Income War Tax Act. In addition to these rates, there come in excess of \$5000. Also there is National Defence Tax and in some Provinces, Pro-

vincial Income Tax.

RATES OF NATIONAL DEFENCE TAX

For a single person


