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# Election Is Due In B.C. This Fall

## On Eastern Front— MILLIONS OF REDS TO FIGHT

Vast Soviet Forces, in Separate Army, Standing Beyond Moscow—Nazis Claim Capture of Smolensk

ISTANBUL, July 19: (CP)—Another Soviet army of four million men is waiting behind Moscow to be flung against the German forces at an opportune moment, an Axis diplomat who was stationed in the Russian capital until the outbreak of war said today. He said the force is separate from Russia's far eastern army.

Last night Germany claimed that Smolensk, last important city on the way to Moscow, 230 miles distant, had been captured and that panzer units were driving on toward the Soviet capital.

Russia failed to admit the loss of Smolensk but Moscow said that fierce fighting was in progress around there.

The Soviet army was reported to be digging trenches in the effort to stop the Germans on their way to Moscow.

The Nazis were still hammering away 150 miles southwest of Leningrad and 120 miles from Kiev.

Important victories were claimed by the Nazis in Bessarabia where four towns were yesterday reported to have been captured.

Reds Recapture Cities  
Moscow reported today that Russian detachments waging guerrilla warfare behind the German lines had recaptured two cities identified only as "SH" and "Z."

All through the night, a Soviet communique said, the Red Army fought stubbornly in Polotsk-Nevel, Smolensk and Bobruisk areas.

## TRAIN IS BLOWN UP

Explosion of Munitions Carrier in Sweden is Heard for Miles—Followed by Lesser Blasts

STOCKHOLM, July 19: (CP)—A Swedish munitions train exploded today in a head-on collision with an express train at Krylbo station north of Stockholm. The initial detonation was heard for miles and a series of shell bursts continued for hours.

## CANADIANS REACH GIB

Men From This Country Aboard E-Boats Which had Adventurous Passage

GIBRALTAR, July 19.—Canadians are among the members of crews of a number of E-boats which have arrived at Gibraltar after an adventurous passage from England. Each boat carries two officers and ten crew members.

## Huge Sabotage Fires Are Set

Trouble Being Caused For Nazi Aggressors In Enemy-Occupied Holland

LONDON, July 19:—Reports have reached here of huge sabotage fires having occurred in Nazi-occupied Holland.

## Discontent In Italy

BERNE, July 19.—According to reports here there is a growing feeling in Italy that Adolf Hitler may be defeated this year. As a result, feeling against Benito Mussolini is mounting. Crown Prince Umberto is said to have favored a separate peace with Great Britain.

## YOUNG MEN ARE KILLED

Quadruple Tragedy at Level Crossing Near Portage la Prairie Last Night

PORTAGE LA PRAIRIE, July 19.—Four young men, returning from swimming, were killed just west of Portage la Prairie last night when their automobile was struck at a level crossing by the Dominion, transcontinental train of the Canadian Pacific Railway. They had evidently not heard the train approaching.

## KVICHAK AT DOCK

Wrecked United States Transport Being Lifted on Pontoons Allowing Epic Salvage Feat

Early this afternoon as the Daily News went to press, the United States Army transport Kovichak, successfully salvaged by the Armour Salvage Co. from Sisters Island near Milbank Sound where she sank a few months ago after stranding, was in the process of being taken out of the water and lifted on to the pontoons at the local dry dock.

During the morning the Kovichak, with her salvage outfit, was removed to the dry dock from Digby Island where she had been beached at the first of the week to be further buoyed up for docking purposes following an epic submarine tow of 150 miles up the coast to this harbor.

## Compensation For Provinces

Dominion Will Make Good Loss of Revenue Caused by Curtailment in Gasoline Use

OTTAWA, July 19.—The Dominion government is agreeable to compensate for loss of revenue caused by the appeal to gasoline consumers to cut down the use of motor fuel any provincial governments which have withdrawn from the income tax field.

Toll of Life Taken by Excessively Warm Weather in Pacific Northwest

PORTLAND, Oregon, July 19.—Nine death have been attributed to the continued heat wave in the Pacific Northwest. Walla Walla reports the record high temperatures.

Indians Defeat New York Yankees and Still Have Chance in American League

CLEVELAND, July 18: (CP)—Cleveland Indians have been nearly eliminated from the American League pennant race but still have a chance. Thursday they dropped another crucial game to the New York Yanks but came back to win yesterday. The Yankees are now leading over the Indians by six full games. Joe DeMaggios hitting streak ended at 56 games on Thursday.

Detroit Tigers were defeated by Washington Senators and dropped back into sixth place ahead of the Chicago White Sox who won over Boston Red Sox. The St. Louis Browns lost to the Philadelphia Athletics and are again tied with Washington Senators in the cellar.

## NAZI SHIPS DESTROYED

Royal Air Force Continues Relentless Pounding—Norwegians Cheer British Air Attack

LONDON, July 19: (CP)—A Royal Air Force bomber "probably destroyed" four ships totalling 22,000 tons off the Netherlands today, it was authoritatively reported. An announcement said that a group of Blenheims attacked a German convoy escorted by anti-aircraft ships.

Unfavorable continental weather kept the Royal Air Force grounded during the night but bombers of the coast command today carried out an attack on a German supply ship in a Norwegian port and the air ministry said that the attacking planes were cheered by Norwegian cottagers and fishermen standing in their boats.

## RAIDING IS EFFECTIVE

Foreign Diplomats at Ankara Tell of Enormous Damage Wrought Upon Germany

ANKARA, Turkey, July 19.—Foreign diplomats arriving from Germany tell of enormous havoc which has wrought upon important industrial and military centres by the almost ceaseless bombing campaign which has been conducted of late by Great Britain's Royal Air Force.

Dusseldorf is now little more than charred ruins, it is stated. Docks and other facilities at Hamburg and Bremen have been rendered virtually useless. Hanover has suffered enormous damage and the Kiel naval centre has been severely hit.

## TO BATTLE HITLERISM

Outspoken Statement Is Made in London By Harry L. Hopkins

LONDON, July 19: (CP)—The United States is going to build enough ships to bring goods into the United Kingdom and into every theatre of war where the democracies are fighting Hitler," Harry Hopkins, supervisor of the United States "lease-lend" program said yesterday.

## EMBASSY LEAVING

Some Members of United States Envoy Staff Depart From Moscow for Kazan

MOSCOW, July 19.—Part of the staff of the United States embassy to Russia has moved from Moscow to Kazan, 450 miles to the east but Ambassador Lawrence A. Steinhardt and the principal members of the staff still remain in the Russian capital.

## International Joint Board To Hold Sittings

TRAIL, July 19:—The International Joint Commission will sit here September 3 and in Spokane September 6 to consider problems affecting Canada and United States arising out of the construction of the Grand Coulee dam which will cause the flooding of a great deal of country.

## Fuehrer Has Fit

BERNE, July 19.—Chancellor Adolf Hitler, it is reported here, suffered an epileptic collapse during a conference. Medical aid was rushed to the Fuehrer.

## JAPAN HAS FREE HAND

Way in Which New Militaristic Administration Will Move Is Still Carefully Guarded Secret

TOKYO, July 19: (CP)—In the new Japanese cabinet which was formed yesterday by Prince Fumimaro Konoye, Konoye himself is again Premier with the totalitarian minded Baron Kii-hiro Hiranuma as vice-premier and a membership weighted in a military and naval sense by three admirals and four generals.

Yosuke Matsuoka, who concluded the neutrality pact with Russia after aligning Japan with the Axis, is dropped as foreign minister and is succeeded by a prominent naval expert, Vice-Admiral Teijiro Toyoda whose foreign policy is little known.

The new cabinet, which has been approved by Emperor Hirohito, evidently has more freedom of action in regard to foreign policy, the details of which, however, continue to be a closely guarded secret.

Kumataro Honda, ambassador to the Japanese-sponsored Chinese government at Nanking, and Vice-Minister Chuichi Chasi submitted their resignations today to the new foreign minister, Admiral Toyoda, as an aftermath of the organization of the new cabinet by Prince Konoye.

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## Policemen In Vancouver In Shirt Sleeves

VANCOUVER, July 19.—Mayor J. W. Cornett yesterday issued an unprecedented order yesterday as a result of the extremely warm weather permitting police officers for the first time to shed their tunics in favor of blue shirts and belts. Motormen and conductors on street cars immediately followed suit. A light summer uniform for the police department is being planned.

## FRENCH TO EVACUATE

Have Evidently Given Up Hope of Holding Out in Somaliland

VICHY, July 19: (CP)—The Vichy government has begun parleys with Great Britain over the evacuation of women and children from Djibuti and elsewhere in French Somaliland, it was learned today, indicating that hope has been virtually abandoned that that outpost can hold out against the British and Free French blockade.

W. T. Moodie, general superintendent, Canadian National Railways, Vancouver, arrived in the city yesterday from the south in the course of a general inspection tour. He will return to Vancouver by rail over the local line.

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## Legislature Will Be Dissolved In Course Of Coming Few Days

Statement Made Last Night at Port Alberni by Minister of Labor in Nominating Convention

PORT ALBERNI, July 19: (CP)—Hon. George S. Pearson, minister of labor, in an address to the Liberal nominating convention which again chose him as candidate for Alberni-Nanaimo, said here last night that "within a few days the legislature will be dissolved and the election will be this fall although I know no more about it than you gentlemen." Dissolution of the legislature would precede the holding of a general election.

Mr. Pearson's hint came as no surprise as it has been known in authoritative quarters for some time that there would probably be an election this fall.

## VANCOUVER STILL HOT

Electrical Storm With Showers in Early Morning

VANCOUVER, July 19.—A series of lightning flashes and peals of thunder early this morning accompanied rain showers for Vancouver but another warm day was predicted. During the electrical storm electric lights flickered and for a minute or so were off altogether. Yesterday 82 above was recorded as the heat wave continued.

This was at 5:30 p.m. Lillooet, with 112 above, was the warmest place in the province.

The Forest Branch reports that a dangerous fire situation still exists, making it necessary to continue the closure order on logging operations and other special restrictions due to the emergency. Hundreds of fires are burning in the Fraser Valley with a few on Vancouver Island. A large fire on Seymour Creek on the north shore, which was started by lightning, is still burning but Vancouver's water supply is stated to be in no danger.

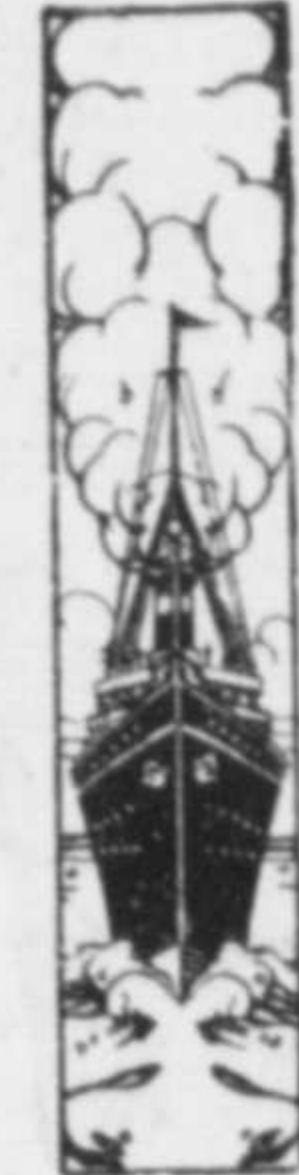

### Waterfront Whiffs

Sockeye Fishing This Season Quite Satisfactory—Only American Halibut Landed This Week



Sockeye fishing for the first three weeks of the 1941 season in the Skeena and Naas River areas contiguous to Prince Rupert is officially stated to have been quite satisfactory. There has been no large run but fishing has been steady from day to day. It is estimated that twenty-five per cent fewer gillnetters are fishing this year than last.

The fishermen in many cases having been attracted into the war industries. The department is well satisfied with this situation since it means that the fewer fishermen are doing better individually. Also the purposes of conservation are being more effectively served. Boats on the Naas River were this week averaging 25 sockeye and thirty pinks while the Skeena average is forty sockeye and 25 pinks. With seining on the Naas River opening this Sunday at midnight, pinks were beginning to show up in fair numbers. Gill-netting on Rivers Inlet and Smith's Inlet is reported to be only fair. In the Bella Coola area, where the fish always run early, sockeye fishing is now tapering off.

C. N. R. steamer Prince George, Capt. H. E. Nodden, arrived back in port at 12:35 noon today from Stewart and will sail at 5 p.m. for Ocean Falls and Vancouver.

Halibut landings at Prince Rupert for the season up to and including yesterday had reached a total of 9,295,000 pounds as compared with 11,213,119 pounds at a corresponding date last year. The American total is now 5,489,900 pounds as against 6,323,100 pounds last year. The Canadian total is 3,806,100 pounds compared with 4,888,099 pounds. During the past week only American fish was landed, the total being 265,500 pounds. The price range for the week was from a high of 15c and 12.1c paid the Bernice for 25,000 pounds to a low of 11.9c and 11c received by the Explorer for 36,000 pounds.
