

REDS THROW BACK NAZIS

MOSCOW-The Red Army today met the German offensive in the Ukraine with counter-attacks such as those which threw back the Nazis in the central sector last week while mobile fighting raged at places along the 350-mile front from the Smolensk region west of Moscow to Bletserkov, south of Kiev. Firmly entrenched Russians were reported turning back successive waves of German infantry in the northwest-in Estonia and south of Leningrad. The Russians reported that a transport ship, presumably German, laden with troops and arms, was sunk in the Baltic Sea by a Soviet submarine.

HUN SHIPS HIT

LONDON-In two air attacks off the German and Dutch coasts, the Royal Air Force hit four German ships and a Hun sub was captured at another place.

An United States navy airship from the naval air base at Lakehurst, N.J., hovers over an American freighter while on patrol over the Atlantic. The airships are coming back into their own and the base at Lakehurst is another U.S. defence post feeling growing pains. Officers and crews are being trained for the new blimps ordered by the navy. Though relatively much slower than a plane the blimps have several advantages for specific tasks. They furnish a steadier platform for observation. Mines and submarines can be spotted easier from a hovering blimp than from a speeding plane. And they can hover for hours over a suspect vessel when a heavier-than-air craft would soon have to be speeding back to its base for more fuel. They are already doing yeoman duty in the American patrol of the Atlantic.
