Turkey Offers To Mediate

IRAQ AIR FORCE IS DESTROYED

Varying Reports Received As To Situation There—British Appear To Be In Control

LONDON, May 5: (CP)—Reliable reports said today that Turkey has offered or will offer to mediate between Iraq and Great Britain. Informed sources said Great Britain would accept the offer contingent on Iraq's withdrawal of forces menacing Habbaniyah airdrome.

CAIRO, May 5: (CP)—Most of Iraq's air force "already has been destroyed," the British Middle East command said today and Iraq artillery which pounded the besieged British airport at Habbaniyah was "rendered comparatively inadequate yesterday by our aircraft."

The British garrison at Habbaniyah is intact and has suffered very few casualties, a communique said, and the British troops remain without interference in the occupation of the Basra area.

Half of the Iraq air force was reported to have been destroyed in twenty-five planes which were rendered useless at Bagdad airport by British bombing.

The British have occupied Basra, driving out the Iraq forces, and taking over the air field.

Twenty thousand British troops are reported marching on Bagdad. The exiled regent, from Transjordan, has called on loyal Iraqis to oppose the traitor. The regent plans to march on Bagdad and regain the government.

Meanwhile Berlin reports that Nazi troops have been landed in Iraq from transport lanes. The flow of the oil line to Haifa has been stopped, the line being now in Iraqi hands, Berlin claims, and the British forces at Basra have been surrounded by Iraqis.

Even if the flow of oil from Iraq should be stopped, there would be plenty of oil reserves for the British fleet in the eastern Mediterranean.

Budget Debate On At Ottawa

OTTAWA, May 5.—The budget debate will open at Ottawa today. It is not expected to be long as the Conservatives are not expected to raise any objections to the major measures of the government to finance the war effort or the "pay as you go" policy.

ATTACK IS BROKEN UP

British Believed to Definitely Have Upper Hand at Tobruk Now—Activities Elsewhere.

CAIRO, May 5: (CP)—Imperial forces, counter-attacking the Germans and Italians at Tobruk, were reported today by the Middle East command to have broken up Axis preparations for renewal of assaults on the port. Heavy casualties were inflicted on Axis forces which still hold a small sector of outer defenses. There have been heavy raids by the Royal Air force on Bengasi, Derna and Benina. The British are mopping up in Ethiopia.

NAZIS IN BIG RAIDS

Belfast And Liverpool Bear Brunt Of Week-end Luftwaffe Attacks

LONDON, May 5: (CP)—Northern Ireland officially announced today that much damage to commercial, industrial and residential property was inflicted on Belfast last night in a German air raid.

The Nazis also pounded at Liverpool for the fourth successive night in an apparent continuation of the German effort to wreck British ports at which North American aid might be received.

Large numbers of incendiary, high explosive and time bombs were dropped on Belfast. The attack was heavily sustained for three and a half hours and, after the bombers left, the time bombs kept exploding. The Nazi planes kept coming over an seemingly ceaseless wave after wave. The loss of life was believed later today to have at first been expected. The raid was a bad, if not worse, than that of April 15. Seven enemy planes were brought down, six by night fighters.

The raid on Liverpool last night was somewhat lighter than that of Saturday night. The enemy planes flew high in Indian file. On Saturday night no less than sixteen of the enemy raids were brought down. Fourteen had been the previous record for number of enemy planes brought down in a single night.

Portsmouth, Plymouth and Bristol were also raided last night as well as several districts on the northeast coast and East Anglia.

AIR FORCE IS ACTIVE

Brest, Rotterdam, Antwerp, Le-Havre and Cherbourg Bombed

LONDON, May 5: (CP)—British bombers last night scored direct hits on the German battleships Gneisenau and Scharnhorst at Brest naval base docks and attacked other widespread objectives in German-occupied territory. Many heavy bombs were dropped on or near the two battleships.

France, the Netherlands, Norway and shipping at sea came in for British attack including such points as Rotterdam, Antwerp, Le-Havre and Cherbourg. A direct hit was reported to have been scored on one enemy transport ship.

Cologne in Germany proper was pounded heavily Saturday night by the new high powered British bombs.

OTTAWA, May 5: (CP)—Sam Robertson, Canadian Press London superintendent, is listed as missing as a result of enemy action while on a sea voyage, according to official word from London. He had just visited Canada on a month's furlough and was on his way back to London. OTTAWA—Premier T. D. Pattullo left Ottawa last night on his return to Victoria after conferring with the federal government here.

OTTAWA—Flying Officer David Smith of Hamilton was killed when a Royal Canadian Air Force plane crashed at Riding Mountain, Manitoba, after a collision with another plane in mid-air. Another R.C.A.F. plane made a forced landing at Slocan Park, British Columbia, but neither pilot nor crew were hurt.

ROCKY MOUNTAIN HOUSE, Alberta—A downpour of rain over the week-end doused serious forest fires near here and the hazard is now said officially to be over.

NASHVILLE, Tennessee—Wendell Wilkie said here yesterday that within three to six months United States would be producing more war materials than Germany. If Great Britain can add air supremacy to sea supremacy she will win the war. Wilkie made this statement after Charles Lindbergh had said that, no matter how much help Great Britain received from United States, she would never have air supremacy over Germany.

WASHINGTON—Speaking in Virginia yesterday President Roosevelt said that United States was ever ready to fight for democracy. He recalled words of President Wilson that democracy could not survive in isolation. He warned the Axis that it must inevitably perish. Spiritual value would ultimately prove stronger than the sword.

BOSTON—President James Conant of Harvard University urges an immediate declaration of war by United States on Germany. Conant, who recently returned from a trip to England, said the hour for action had now struck.

MENZIES ON WAY ACROSS

Prime Minister Of Australia To Speak In United States And Canada

NEW YORK, May 5:—Prime Minister R. G. Menzies of Australia is enroute from London to New York aboard an American clipper plane. He will speak in United States and Canada on behalf of immediate increased aid for Great Britain in the war against Germany.

SOCIALIZE FOR PEACE. PROSPERITY

Mrs. Jamieson Speaks—C. C. F. Woman Member Asserts Social Security Essential To Future Of Democracy

Only in a system of socialization planned for the welfare of the many can lie future prosperity, security and peace, declared Mrs. Laura Jamieson, C. C. F. member of the Legislature for Vancouver Centre, in addressing a public meeting in the Oddfellows' Hall last night. Only through banding and working together to control the lives of men could progress be made in democracy. Unless a system was set up insuring social security there would be chaos at the end of the present war. There was nothing new in community ownership, declared Mrs. Jamieson. Schools, playgrounds, water systems and such like were operated on a community basis. Why could this not be done with transportation, utilities, banks and even such things as moving pictures etc? Why could not the government go into the revenue industries? It had gone into the liquor business which was a source of considerable revenue. The government had already clothed itself with authority to go into the fuel business.

The so-called social legislation under the capitalistic system was only a stop-gap, declared Mrs. Jamieson. The C. C. F. consistently supported all improvements in social legislation but the ultimate aim was complete socialization. Only through it would come permanent security.

Mrs. Jamieson declared that the whole matter of social security should be a federal responsibility.

Mrs. Jamieson's audience numbered possibly some 150 or 200 persons. Mrs. J. S. Black acted as chairman. The proceedings open with singing of "O Canada."

Check On YugoSlavs; Are Loyal

NEW YORK, May 5: (CP)—United States coastguardsmen today boarded YugoSlav ships in New York harbor as a precautionary measure. Washington reports said that the coast guard was investigating whether the crews were loyal to the government of King Peter II and found them so.

ITALY IS MEATLESS

Is Sold Or Served Only On Saturdays And Sundays Now

BERLIN, May 5:—D. M. B. news agency reports that the sale of meat and serving of it in restaurants has been stopped except on Saturdays and Sundays. The requirements of the army, it is explained, have made this necessary.

War News

THE WAR IN IRAQ
BASRA—Fighting between the Iraqi and British in Iraq continues for the fourth day. The former regent of Iraq, who fled after the Nazi coup d'etat by which Hitler's puppet became premier, is now in Transjordan organizing an army to march against the new government which, it is claimed, does not enjoy the confidence of the people of Iraq.

BATTLE OF BRITAIN
LONDON—Twenty-four Nazi planes were shot down as the German Luftwaffe made widespread raids on Great Britain during the week-end. The raids were again concentrated on Liverpool Saturday night although the east coast town was also heavily attacked. London was also bombed again. Belfast received a heavy attack last night, comparing with that of April 15. Damage and casualties were heavy.

REPULSED AT TOBRUK
CAIRO—The British garrison at Tobruk is still holding out with the Axis forces, still at the outer defences, being hurled back with heavy losses.

HITLER ROARS AGAIN
BERLIN—Chancellor Hitler spoke loud and vehemently last night in a long harangue before the Reichstag. It was the first since July 19 last, following the downfall of France, that the German dictator had spoken to the parliament of the Reich. He gave no direct clue of the next move but admitted the war might continue at least into 1942. He called Prime Minister Winston Churchill a madman and a fool and "history's most blood-thirsty dilettante." He would blast Britain from the air until it got rid of Churchill.

URGES GREATER PATROL
NEW YORK—Declaring that the present patrol is inadequate, Wendell Wilkie, speaking Saturday night, came out flat-footed in favor of naval convoys of cargoes for Great Britain. The rate of sinkings of British ships was so serious, said Wilkie, that United States should take immediate and complete measures to protect its own shipping to Great Britain.

GIBRALTAR AND SUEZ
LONDON—It is believed here that the Nazis will essay an early drive against Gibraltar and Suez. Twenty-seven Nazi divisions are said to be concentrated on the southwest coast of France preparatory to moving through Spain in a thrust at Gibraltar. Nazi technicians are said to be everywhere in Spain. French permission to move through Syria enroute to Suez is being sought. Hitler and Mussolini, it is said will meet soon to discuss the drive on Egypt.

IN ANTARCTICA
BOSTON—Members of the Byrd expedition, home from the south, say that Germans and Japs have been in Antarctica. The Germans used a base at Deception Bay for the Admiral Graf Spee, their buildings there being later destroyed by the British. Jap "whalers" have been at the Bay of Whales where there are no whales.

300 NAZI PLANES DOWN
LONDON—Three hundred Axis planes were brought down in the battle of the Balkans. Royal Air Force losses were also heavy but not nearly as great as those of the Axis.

ELECTS SPEEDY TRIAL
William Manual, a soldier, having been committed for trial in city police court on a charge of assault, came before Judge W. E. Fisher this morning and elected for speedy trial which was set for Thursday.

EDITORIAL

Financing Germany . . .

Many people have asked how Germany is financing this war. It was said before the war commenced that German finances were badly strained and that a break would come before very long. Since that she has been spending like a drunken sailor and always seems to find means for subversive purposes as well as for war materials.

One way that country has of getting materials without paying for them is by looting the conquered countries, banks, private homes, churches. Anything in sight is legitimate prey.

As one writer says: "The plunder attains astronomical figures and French accountants get an acute painful headache in trying to estimate the worth of the merchandise filched from France and removed to Germany."

The greatest steal of all is by the method of using "occupation marks" with which to buy from the conquered peoples. It is easier and more polite to use this method. This money has nothing behind it except German bayonets. Every German army division has a printing press and the daily production is said to be ten million dollars in France alone. The Bank of France is compelled to take this phony money.

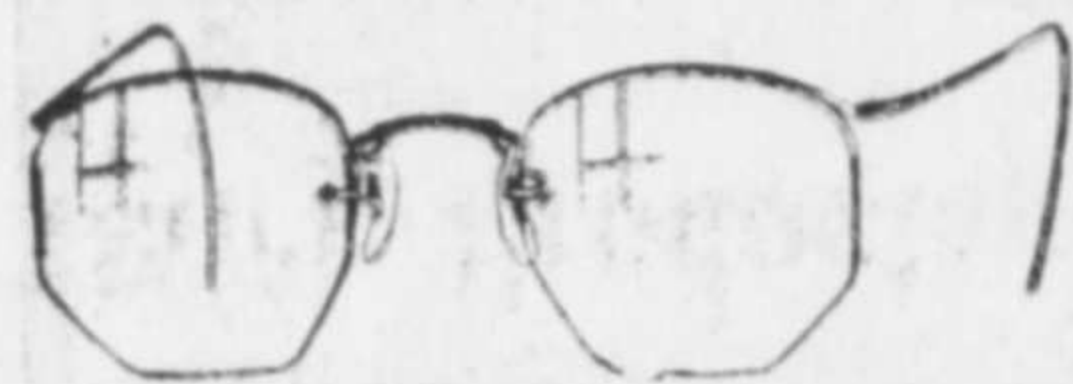
