## FATAL SPEEDER ACCIDENT ON G.T.P.—BODY LOST

### ATHABASCA LANDING TO GET FIRST PULP MILL WEST OF SOO

DEPUTATION NOW IN OTTAWA ARRANGING TO LOCATE LARGE INDUSTRIAL CONCERN THERE DRIVEN BY NATURAL GAS DISCOVERED BY THE GOVERNMENT.

Ottawa, May 14.—The first pulp mill in Canada west of the Soo will be built very shortly at Athabasca Landing if a deputation now in Ottawa has its way. "There is any amount of pulp wood up in that country," said James Wood of Athabasca Landing, who leads the deputation. "Along the river and north of it there is enough to supply the whole prairie country if we can get a mill built. That is our intention, it coming here. "We have organized a syndicate which is willing to build the mill, the first in Canada west of Sault Ste. Marie, if we can get some timber land. "We are going to run it in a new way, too, by natural gas. The government drilled for oil at Athabasca Landing some years ago, but did not find it, but struck the gas instead, so we know just where it is. We have one railway running in to our town already, the Canadian Northern, and we will have the same line start out toward the Peace River country and Fort McMurray this sum-

mer, so there will be no lack of transportation."

### PURSUIT OF THE MURDERERS OF CONSTABLE KINDNESS

FUGITIVE INDIAN DESPERADOS ARE HARD PRESSED NOW FOR THEIR LIVES—RIDING ONE HORSE AND SHORT OF FOOD AND AMMUNITION POSSE CLOSE BEHIND

(Special to Daily News.)

Clinton, B.C., May 14.—The activity of Chief Constable Fernie and his posse of constables and trackers in shutting off communication between the Indian desperados Sliantam and Paul and their friends at Canoe Creek and Dog Creek has resulted in turning the fleeing Indians back towards Clinton.

The murderers are in desperate straits. Both are riding one horse and though they still retain their rifles, it is believed they have very little ammunition, and when seen at the head of Canoe Creek they had no food. A young Indian named Frank talked with them at this point. He was met later by the officers who succeeded in wringing the information from him and forced him to show them the spot where the trackers again took up the trail which they are now following. They at once recognized the hoof marks as being the same which they had followed from the James ranch, where a saddle was stolen last Tuesday.

A new addition to the Empress Hotel, on Third Avenue, is being erected on the two lots adjoining the present building on the east. The wing will be 50 x 100 feet in size. The basement will contain one of the largest and most modern bowling alleys on the coast. On the ground floor will be two stores in front, and in the enlarged to contain fourteen tables. About twenty-five more rooms will be added to the upper floors. W. L. Barker is the architect, and actual work of construction is already under way.

## ROADMASTER H. GALLAGHER HURLED TO DEATH ON G.T.P.

Caught by Train One Mile Out of Terrace Last Night His Motor Car is Wrecked and His Body is Flung into the River---Men Searching for It Today---Daniel McKay, Section Foreman, Bruised and Burned by Falling Tree at Terrace Bush Fire, is Now in the Hospital

H. Gallagher, road master on the G. T. P., between 6 and 7 p. m. yesterday while traveling eastward from Terrace on a railway motorcycle was struck by a train coming in from Van Arsdol, injured or killed, and flung off the line into deep water in the Skeena River. His body has not been recovered. Gangs of men are searching for it today.

Daniel McKay, section foreman on the G. T. P., while fighting a serious bush fire near Terrace station yesterday, was struck and borne to the earth by a falling tree. He was stunned and it was thought badly injured. Rushed to the hospital in Prince Rupert this morning at 1 o'clock by special train, he was attended by Dr. Eggert, who found him suffering from severe contusions and rather serious burns about the body and ankles. He is expected to recover speedily.

The following is General Superintendent Mehan's official account of both these affairs: "Mr. Gallagher, road master, left Prince Rupert yesterday morning on a motor car for the purpose of making an inspection of the track and the work in

hand by the various section crews. He reached Terrace about 6 last night and stopped there for dinner. He was notified there of a train running from Van Arsdol to Terrace, which was about due at that time. For some reason known only to himself he started out of Terrace, east-bound, and was struck by the train about one mile east of the station on a fill which is close to the river. The train was immediately stopped, but Mr. Gallagher had rolled down the bank and disappeared from view. The coroner and Provincial officers have been notified and all possible is being done to recover the body."

#### The Fire Accident.

Regarding the bush fire accident, General Superintendent Mehan said: "There has been a very bad bush fire raging in and about Terrace for the last two days. Yesterday is got very close to our station, and a large number of ties piled there. We have had a large force of men there fighting this fire, all our own employees, and yesterday afternoon while the fire was being fought back a tree fell, striking Foreman D. McKay. It was thought at first that his injuries were very serious, and he was rushed into Prince Rupert on a special train. Here it was found

that he is not so seriously injured except for bruises and several painful burns about his ankles and feet."

#### The Late Mr. Gallagher.

Referring to the late Mr. Gallagher, whose body is being searched for, the general superintendent said: "Mr. Gallagher has been in the employ of the G. T. P. for several years as section foreman, extra gang foreman and road master. He was a very competent and reliable employee. He was a single man, about 45 years old, with no relatives in this country except one brother who is also employed at the present time as extra gang foreman in the track department of this division. The rules and practices on the G. T. P. here are that employees whose duties require them to use motor cars shall keep in touch with the movements of trains at the different telegraph offices along the line."

Mr. Mehan was at a loss to account for the manner in which Mr. Gallagher met with his fatal mishap, as he was so reliable a man and knew of the approaching train. Had he waited ten minutes longer in Terrace the train would have been in and all would have been right with him. Regarding the bush fire at Terrace, Mr. Mehan is able to report this under control today.

### ROWING CLUB'S GREAT CHANCE

Opportunity to Secure the Hull of the River Boat Hazelton for Club Rooms at Low Price Being Considered This Evening.

It is hoped that the Rowing Club of Prince Rupert may be able to secure for use as a club house the hull of the river steamer Hazelton, formerly plying on the Skeena for the Hudson's Bay Co. The hull now lies at Port Simpson, and it is believed that for \$500 it can be secured. The machinery has been removed to Athabasca Landing, to serve a new river boat, and the hull unless purchased by the Rowing Club is likely to be broken up or sold out of the district. Every effort will be made, however, by the Rowing Club to secure this hull for club rooms after careful consideration of the matter at a meeting which will be held in Major Gibson's office tonight. The assistance of all anxious to have a successful rowing club established in the city is invited, and will be strongly forthcoming.

Work is progressing on an enormous scale and at the end of two years it is expected that 400,000 acres of land in the eastern section will be under irrigation.

FOR LIFE SAVING ON STEAMSHIPS

Great German Companies in Conference with Program Personally Drawn Up by Kaiser on Life Saving Devices.

Berlin, May 14.—Representatives of all the German steamship companies and of ship builders, marine architects, etc., held a conference under the chairmanship of Herr Del Brueck, the minister of interior, concerning the perfection of plans for the saving of life at sea.

The report showed that between 80 and 90 per cent. of the German crews were able to swim and row life boats. There was no criticism of the existing steamship routes, but it was thought that in fogs or when in close proximity to ice the speed of vessels should be reduced.

Thirty Million Pounds of Cheese and Seventy-two Million Pounds of Butter Consumed in Less Than a Year.

New York, May 11.—The marketing committee of the State food investigation commission here reports that each year New York consumes between 1,296,000,000 and 1,440,000,000 eggs and that before now there have been put away in cold storage warehouses 319,800,000.

**U. S. CURRENCY REMODELED**  
 New Coins Proposed to Congress by Representative from Ohio in Bill Which Has Approval of House Coinage Committee.  
 Washington, May 10.—If a bill introduced by Congressman Bulkeley of Cleveland and which has the approval of a subcommittee on coinage, weights and measures of the House of Representatives, becomes a law two new pieces will be added to the coins of the United States. One of them will be a 3-cent piece. There has been more or less agitation for years in favor of a 2½-cent piece, and also appeals for a ½-cent piece. The former has been urged on the ground that it would be a convenience to have a coin between the nickel and the penny, and also because the old time "bit," or 12½ cents, and its multiples still occupies a conspicuous place in retail price quotations. The advocates of a half cent, on the other hand, argue that this piece will serve all of the uses of a 2½ cent, and also furnish a smaller unit than the penny for numerous transactions. It is urged by the author of the bill that both the 3 cent and ½ cent will result in lowering the prices of many articles bought by the masses, the prices of which are fixed by custom and convenience at 5 cents and one cent, and furnish the means of making exact change where now the odd cents or odd half cent are added to the nominal price.  
 The Treasury department has been inclined in the past to oppose any increase in the number of denomination, because of the difficulty in readily distinguishing them from each other. Mr. Bulkeley has met the objections by proposing to have the 3-cent piece perforated in the middle, like the Chinese cash and some of the Belgian coins. He has included in his bill a provision changing the bronze cent to the nickel alloy used in the 5-cent piece. This is a change which everybody is likely to approve. A white cent will be a brighter, cleaner coin than the old copper piece.  
 Few people know what a handsome revenue the government derives from the seigniorage upon its small coinage. During the last fiscal year the declared seigniorage formally turned into the treasury from the coinage of 1 and 5 cent pieces was \$3,246,384.63, and upon the subsidiary silver coins \$1,912,309.23; total seigniorage, \$5,167,684.86. The mint is a great and very profitable business institution.
