CAIRO—A Royal Australian Air Force bomber has sunk a 7,000-ton Italian supply ship off Bengasi. It was a German ship which had been turned over to the Italians. An Italian naval auxiliary vessel was also damaged.

FORCED TO MEET ISSUE

The United States, Great Britain, Australia and the Netherlands East Indies seem intent on suppressing and encircling Japan, declared the Japanese deputy foreign minister in Tokyo yesterday. "Japan is being forced to meet the issue," he declared.

GREEKS STILL FIGHTING

ATHENS-Notwithstanding important new diplomatic developments in the Balkans, the war between Greece and Italy in Albania still goes on with heavy fighting. Further important gains by the Greeks are reported and the Italians are in disorderly retreat between Tepelini and Klisura.

Ilsley, minister of finance, London newspapers pointed out that the Turko-British mutual assistance pact remained undisturbed and expressed confidence it would be maintained.

Berlin said that the pact would put an end to British intrigue in the Balkans and predicted a similar pact would be extended to JugoSlavia to make a Balkan bloc also including Bulgaria and Hungary and thus force Greece to quit fighting.

# PASSAGE ASSURED

Senate Will Undoubtedly Approve "Lease-Lend"-Strong Arguments In Favor Heard

WASHINGTON, D.C., Feb. 18:-Senate Republicans have advised Democrats that they are prepared to support the "lease-lend" aid to Britain bill as it stands providing a decisive anti-convoy clause is inserted. They would do this in the interests of national unity and the national defence program.

Senate Majority Leader Alben W. Barkley of Kentucky yesterday asked the Senate to support the bill to stop the foul aggressor and breaker of treaties. He denounced Adolf Hitler as an "international gangster." If Hitler won the war with Great Britain, United States would either have to surrender to Hitler or beat him on United States territory. To pass the bill would be as effective as declaring war.

Senator Warren R. Austin of Vermont, a Republican, was prepared to go to war. There were much worse things than war. If Hitler came to America it would be by way of Iceland and New Zealand,

Senator Claude Pepper of Florida declared that, if the bill failed government holds, Welles said, to save Britain, then United States would with its own armed forces. Senators opposing the bill are being heard today.
