HAVOC-SPREADING BUSH FIRE HAS CLAIMED FIVE

GOVIN'S GOVERNMENT GOES BACK TO POWER REJOICING

PROVINCE OF QUEBEC REMAINS FAITHFUL TO OLD LOVE
WITH AN INCREASED MAJORITY—RESULT OF ELECTION
WAS A FOREGONE CONCLUSION—NO EXCITEMENT.

(Special to Daily News.)
Montreal, May 16.—Premier
Gouin's government received the
sweeping endorsement of the peo-
ple of the province today and was
returned to power with an in-
creased majority, the net gains
being seven. Seventeen Conserva-
tives and Laborites were elect-
ed. One minister was defeated,
the Hon. Caron Lislet. The elec-
tion of Morine, Conservative, by
a small majority being the sur-
prise of the day. Elections in
Gaspé and Magdale Islands were
deferred. By the redistribution
act seven new ridings are added
and of these five went for the
government and two for the op-
position. Eighty seats were con-
tested, but there was little in-
terest, the result being a fore-
gone conclusion.

Railway Suffers Penalty for Neg-
lect to Carry Out Orders

Word has just been received in the

remains unopened to scows.
The penalty is a result of the
neglect of the railway company
to carry out the orders of the
railway commissioners handed
down by them on January 3rd,
as reported exclusively in The
Daily News.

FIVE MEN LOSE THEIR LIVES FIGHTING FOREST FIRES

NORTHWESTERN WASHINGTON SWEEPED WITH SERIOUS EF-
FECT—SNOHOMISH COUNTY DEVASTATED—MILLIONS
OF FEET OF FINE TIMBER DESTROYED.

(Special to Daily News.)
Seattle, May 16.—Five lives
are known to be lost and two
men are missing while property
has been damaged to the extent
of several hundred thousand dol-
lars as the result of fires sweep-
ing through timber in the north-
western part of the State of
Washington. The loss of life
occurred in a fire which de-
stroyed four logging camps in
Skagit County. Fifty million feet
of green timber have been burned.
Other fires in the western states
brought the total of timber de-
stroyed to seventy million feet.

STRONG MOVE ON THE BOARD AT CITY HALL STAR CHAMBER

Council in Closed Session Last Night Wrestled With Civic Prob-
lems---Finance Committee Severely Scored in Motion by
Clayton, Kerr and Montgomery---Mayor Rebuked for
Meddling---City Hall Pay Roll Published
for Information of Citizens

Over the city hall salary list
last night in private session the
city fathers fought. Fierce was
the contest. Loud and high ran
the eloquence. Hard blows were
given and received. It is rum-
ored that crinkled edged kris
of the mayoral sarcasm and the
bludgeon with which the finance
minister believes he can deliver
unfailingly a "knockout blow"
were both outmatched by keener
and more effective weapons in
the tongues of Aldermen, Clay-
ton, Kerr, Morrissey, Montgom-
ery and Dybhavn. Notice of a
terribly trenchant motion was
placed on the board for Monday
night's meeting. Its terms are
practically a denunciation of the
Mayor's original finance com-
mittee as incompetent.
Mayor Rebuked.
A further notice of motion was
also posted, the motion being in
censure of the Mayor for having
cancelled without consulting the
Council the order made for the
purchase of a team of horses for
the Public Works department.
This motion is moved by Alder-
man Morrissey and seconded by
Alderman Dybhavn.
The result of the springing of
these motions on the Council was
that the star chamber was dis-
solved speedily and in silence.
But before this occurred there
was some discussion on the sal-
ary list here given. This dis-
cussion resulted after a good deal
of to and fro motion and coun-
ter motion in the decision that
the resignations of the whole of
the Engineering department are
to be requested, not necessarily
signifying that the department is
to be done away with, but that it
is to be reconstructed out of the
material in hand on a different
basis probably. The Engineer-
ing department as will be seen
from the accompanying list
represents the biggest item in
the city hall pay roll, namely
\$17,400 per annum up to the end
of March. After that certain
changes were made, Mr. Lucas
through indisposition retired, and
Mr. J. A. Miller today ended his
connection with the department
to take up other work. regard-
ing the rest of the pay roll, Miss
Ulwin has resigned from the city
clerk's department, her resigna-
tion taking effect at the end of
this month, and Mr. E. Gilling-
ham leaves the assessor's de-
partment on June 1st, but Mr.
Ellis has been working for that

TO EXTEND INDIAN MINES DEVELOPMENT

This Hitherto Unboomed Mine Grows Daily More Promising as the
150-Foot Tunnel Advances---A Substantial Property
With Solid Men at the Back of It

Without making any noise
about it, a number of substantial
business men in Prince Rupert
who are interested in mining and
who are regarded as men of valu-
able and reliable experience in
mining concerns and affairs gener-
ally were talking amongst
themselves last fall of the pros-
pects of the property known as
the Indian Mines, near Stewart.
One and all agreed that this
property is one of the very best
in the whole district. No one
seems to have shouted the news
broadcast, but more than one
level headed man quietly secured
an interest in the Indian Mines.
It is generally admitted that
the investment looks thoroughly
good.
Origin of the Name.
The Indian Mines were so
called because the existence of
the valuable silver-lead ores
there was first made known by
two Indians, the discoverers of
the vein, who, it is understood,
retain a considerable interest in
the property. Not having the
means to work their find, they
took into their confidence one or
two trustworthy white men, and
thus the property was opened for
development.
Where the Mine Is.
The mine is situated about fif-
teen miles from Stewart, B. C.,
on the bank of the Salmon River,
which empties into the head of
Portland Canal. It is a silver-
lead showing and is a promising
prospect. The ore body exposed
so far is of considerable extent,
a prospect tunnel having shown
that it descends to a depth of
150 feet at least, while at this
depth there are indications that
greater stage of development this
summer.
A very much greater ore body ex-
ists. In October last the main
tunnel was driven in 150 feet,
the last thirty-five feet being in
rich ore. This is at a vertical
depth of 150 feet from the sur-
face croppings and 300 feet from
the great galena showing on the
surface, which was the find made
by the mine's discoverers. It is
for the purpose of getting under-
neath this main outcropping that
the tunnel is being driven, and
the fact of having struck the ore
shoot at this distance in is con-
sidered exceedingly promising
for future development. A track
was laid last fall and a car serv-
ice initiated so that the force of
six men employed then could get
ahead to better advantage. Every
further work of development in-
creased the promise of the mine,
and this summer operations on a
much larger scale will be car-
ried on.
Substantially Controlled.
Although the Indian Mines
represent beyond doubt a prop-
erty of exceedingly valuable
promise, even that aspect of them
is not so solidly confidence in-
spiring for the investor as the
personnel of the group of men
who are most intimately inter-
ested in the development of the
mine. The company owning the
property at present consists of
a number of business men of the
highest standing in the Province

OUTLAWS ARE STILL AT LARGE

Possé Only an Hour and a Half
Behind Them Now—They
Abandon Their House and Flees
for Old Retreat.

(Special to Daily News.)
Clinton, B. C., May 16.—The
posse after the Indian outlaws
was reported this morning to be
but an hour and a half behind
them. The desperadoes have
horse, which the posse took pos-
session of. It is difficult to fol-
low the trail of the men on foot,
and it is feared that they will get
into the mountains above Big
Bar on the Fraser River, where
they were in hiding all last win-
ter, and that to get them they will
have to be surrounded and starv-
ed out, which may mean weeks
or months. They are believed to
have a good cache in the vicin-
ity of their old hiding place.
Yesterday they were within ten
miles of Clinton. Every rancher
in that district is being watched
to prevent the outlaws obtaining
food or horses.

Tuesday night and hurled into
the Skeena River, has not been
recovered dup to a late hour this
afternoon.

been opened so that scows might
enter. The G. T. P. has delayed
this work pending appeal against
the decision of the railway board,
and is now being mulcted in the
sum of \$100 per day as long as
the fill remains closed. Their
appeal process continues.

steamer Port Simpson is leaving

do freighting in supplies until
the Skeena is again navigable.

HUNTER KILLED BY GRIZZLY BEAR

Formidable Bruise After Being Wounded Wreaked Savage Vengeance on His Would-be Slayer on Crevasse Mountain.

PRIVATE FIRM SUPPLIES JUICE

Saskatoon Makes Big Bid for Cistern Power for Industries--City Agrees to Buy 14,000 Horse Power at \$33.

Saskatoon, May 14.--As a result of complete and thorough investigation of the conditions and possibilities of developing power on South Saskatchewan, below the city of Saskatoon, H. M. E. Evans, head of the Saskatchewan Power Company syndicate, reported to the City Council that fourteen thousand horse power could be generated at a total construction cost of \$2,200,000.

Increased estimate of possible product following upon the recent campaign by the Industrial League is taken as confirmation that Saskatoon can be made an industrial centre. The City Council and Industrial League have held a joint meeting to consider the entire situation and take action.
