NOME, Sept. 3.—The two big Soviet transport planes, carrying a Russian technical mission to the United States, after spending a couple of days here, left yesterday for Anchorage enroute to Washington D. C. by way of Sitka and San Francisco.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Sept. 3.—President Franklin D. Roosevelt today appointed a new five man mission headed by W. Averill Harriman, lease-lend expiditer in London, to go to Moscow and discuss material aid to Russia in the fight with Germany.

LOG SCALE STILL HIGH

Silka Spruce for War Purposes Still Principal Variety of Output in District

Log scaling in Prince Rupert forestry district for the month of August this year totalled 32,527,545 board feet as compared with 36,874,400 board feet in the same month last year, bringing the total for 1941 to date up to 148,756,989 board feet compared with 120,226,453 board feet in the first eight months of 1940.

The scaling per varieties this August in board feet was as follows: Douglas Fir, 555,766 Spruce, 2,094,614 Cedar, 5,550,096 Balsam, 294,177 Hemlock, 6,209,628 Jackpine, 285,472 Miscellaneous, 37,792.

Scale of forest products such as poles and piling this August amounted to 388,765 lineal feet, bringing the total for the year to date up to 1,791,843 lineal feet compared with 1,357,278 in the first eight months of 1940.

BERLIN AND FRANKFURT HIT

LONDON, Sept. 3.—Anti-aircraft fire was heard from the Nazi-occupied French coast yesterday after Royal Air Force planes had roared high over the English Channel to continue assaults both by day and night on enemy positions.

The daylight offensive followed an attack by British bombers Monday night on the Rhineland district of Germany with Cologne the chief target.

JAPAN IN STRUGGLE

Internal Struggle Between Extremists And Moderates Is Indicated

SHANGHAI, Sept. 3.—Japan was reported reliably today to be in the throes of an internal struggle between the German-goaded extremists and the realistic moderates over how best to achieve unchallenged Oriental dominance which the Japanese regard as their ordained world role.

According to reliable foreigners, the Konoye government must either yield to the extremists or face the possibility of a violent overthrow since it is said the super-nationalists will not hesitate to use force.

Premier Konoye told the government and war industries representatives today that Japan was facing the gravest crisis in its history and Domei News Agency said that total mobilization was needed to overcome the emergency.

It was the Premier's first public statement since July 30 and came as a proposed movement of United States war supplies to Russia through waters adjacent to Japan was the subject of discussion in Tokyo, Washington and Moscow.

The Japanese plan a safety zone move which would cut off Vladivostok.

Becoming Ignominious Fiasco . . .

Adolf's plan of conquest has become an ignominious fiasco, according to Russian newspapers who are beginning to tell of the failure of the German invasion in their country. One paper says "the mad fascist beast is bleeding to death." The feeling is growing throughout the world that Hitler has sown the seeds of failure and now is just beginning to reap the harvest.

The New Governor . . .

Greatest problem facing Ottawa authorities in selecting a successor to Hon. E. W. Hamber as lieutenant-governor was to find a man as popular, and a man and wife who could fill the position as capably as Mr. and Mrs. Hamber.

Thus, in the selection of Col. W. C. Woodward and Mrs. Woodward to occupy Government House at Victoria for the next five years, Ottawa has shown good judgment.

The appointment of Colonel Woodward—"Billy" to thousands of friends here—is no surprise to Vancouver and to Hon. C. D. Howe, his adventures when on official their new position with credit to themselves and their home province goes without saying.

Here since childhood, Colonel Woodward has behind him a distinguished record in both the last and present wars. The important position he filled as executive assistant to Hon. C. D. owe, his adventures when on official business to Great Britain, his subsequent good work in publicizing the extent of Canada's war effort, will long be remembered.

Did Not Give Enough . . .

One citizen of British Columbia, writing to a Vancouver newspaper, says she will not vote for Hon. T. D. Pattullo because the old age pensioners get only \$20 a month. Yet it must be remembered that until T. D. took action no old age pensions were paid in British Columbia or in any other province of Canada. Had he not taken action the probability is that the aged men and women would still be living on their friends. The twenty dollars was a great help and was received in many cases with tears of gratitude.

We are not suggesting from this that twenty dollars is enough for any old person and, if these poor old folks look for an increase in the amount, they are most likely to get it from the people who made the first gesture in that direction. We suggest this for two reasons. One is that in order to get action the first necessity is to elect the people who promise it and the next is to make sure that the group elected is sympathetic to giving it and is ready to stand criticism for the action they take. This the Liberals have done.

Were Worthy Citizens . . .

It was with regret that the Daily News yesterday recorded the deaths of two well known local citizens, both pioneers of many years' standing who were highly esteemed by numerous friends. Miss Jessie Rothwell, who passed away Saturday in Regina where she had been spending the summer, had been for more than a quarter of a century identified with the teaching staff of local schools and there are many young folk here today—and some no longer quite so young—who passed through her careful pedagogic. From them she commands particular respect.

William Levi Sandison was another esteemed citizen whose loss Prince Rupert will feel. Quiet, unassuming and genial, he was a well known and popular figure.

First Presbyterian Church will especially feel the loss of Miss Rothwell and Mr. Sandison for both were faithful and active members through the years.

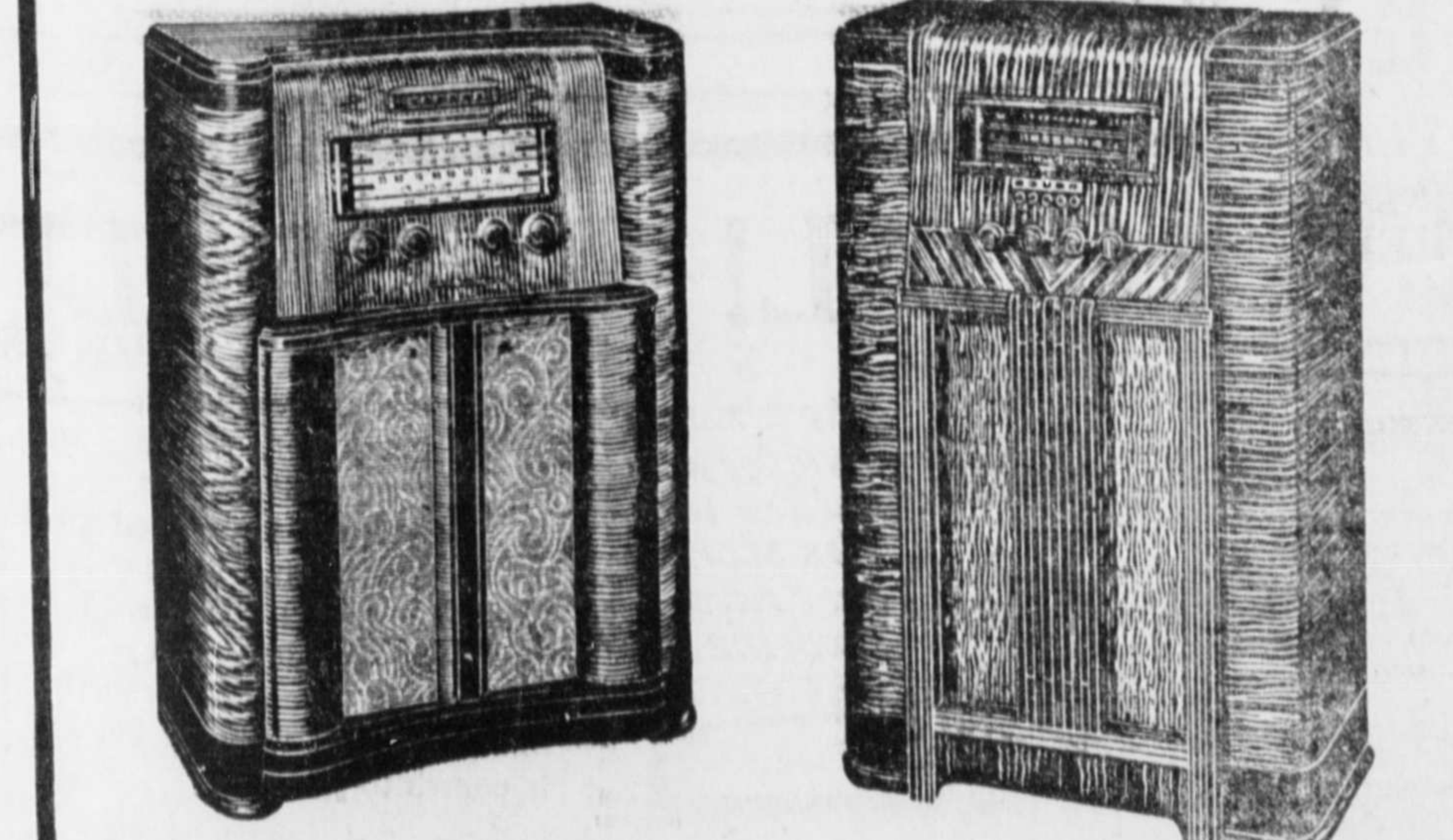

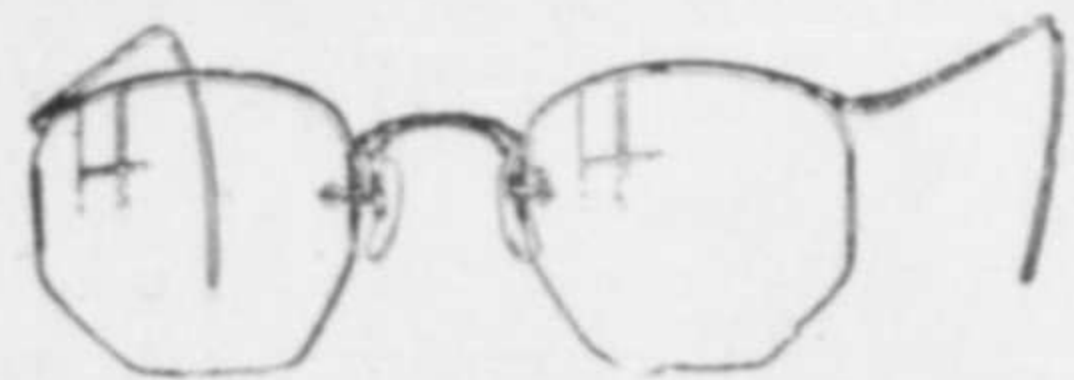
