### BERLIN AND FRANKFURT HIT

LONDON-Waves of Royal Air Force planes swept over the English Channel last night and early today to continue the round the clock offensive by blasting Berlin, parts of southwestern Germany and Nazi-occupied France. Berlin and Frankfurt were the main objectives. At Frankfurt a severe attack was made on railway lines and industrial targets. Large bombs fell on industrial buildings in Berlin and great fires were observed as British bombers set their course for home. Nine Royal Air Force planes were lost.

### NAZIS NEARING LENINGRAD

BERLIN-German sources claimed today that fierce Russian resistance and adverse weather has failed to blunt the spearhead of the Nazi drive on Leningrad which they say is now within twenty miles of the city and moving steadily forward.
