# JAPANESE FORCES OFF COAST

## Black-Out Effective All Along Co. View Of War

Announcement Made By Premier On Advice o Authorities-Co-operation of Citizens of P. ace Rupert and Other Cities Asked.

VICTORIA, Dec. 9: (CP)—Effective immediately between dusk and dawn and continuing until further notice, the premier of British Columbia, on the advice of the military authorities, last night issued instructions for a complete blackout of lights and radio communication on Vancouver Island, the whole coast of British Columbia and the lower mainland. The Western Air Command announced last night a complete black-out of Vancouver Island, British Columbia coast and the lower mainland "because the war situation is such that an attack by Japanese forces on the Pacific Northwest coast is imminent."

An official statement said:

"Attention all citizens of British Columbia.

"The war situation is such that an attack by Japanese forces on the Pacific northwest coast is imminent, therefore, on advice of the military authorities, the premier of British Columbia has issued instructens for a complete black-out of lights and radio communication on Vancouver Island, the whole coast of British Columbia and the lower mainland.

"Co-operation of the citizens of Vancouver, Victoria. New Westminster, Prince Rupert and Nanaimo especially is essential to make this effective.

"All lights of any kind must be extinguished or completely obscured including vehicles and boats of all

"Further instructions will be issued authorizing

lights for ships and essential services.

"The public are assured that defence arrangements by the navy, army and air force are completed and ready for any emergency. There is no necessity for any panic or evacuation.

"These instructions go into effect immediately today between dusk and dawn and continue until further notice."

SITUATION SERIOUS

British Columbia coastal districts bristled today in a state of emergency following warnings by military and civic leaders that an attack on the Pacific Northwest was "imminent" and that the Japanese were off the Aleutian Islands and "we expect them here any time."

Mayor Andrew McGavin of Victoria, made the statement concerning the Japanese off the Aleutians and said the situation was very serious. His statement came as heads of the army and air force warned that the black-out ordered for coastal districts last night was not a black-out but the "real thing" and there is every reason to believe there will be an attack on the Pacific Northwest."

These warnings came soon after Premier T. D. Pattullo broadcast that a full wartime black-out would go into effect immediately on coastal districts and Vancouver Island.

## New York Exchange Had Busy Germany Declares War Against United States

Youth Committee of Prince Ru- tween United States and Japan No Confirmation of Tokyo, Kobe and Formosa Being Bombed—Knocking Out of Singapore Said to Be One of First Aims.

> Canada and the United States took urgent defence precautions today as Japanese aircraft reconnoitred over the San Francisco bay area and other Japanese forces were reported off the Aleutian Islands. Washington observers believed the Japanese were trying to compel the United States to pull the main fleet for coastal defence and predicted that the manoeuvre would fail.

> Meanwhile, the prediction that Germany would declare war against the United States in a few hours was broadcast by the Stockholm correspondent of the National Broadcasting Company. It was later reported that there had been such a declaration.

Unverified reports of the bombing of Tokyo, Kobe and the Japanese Island of Formosa were broadcast by the Columbia System from Manila, these being the first such reports of aerial counter blows against Japan. However, Imperial headquarters at Tokyo claimed that no air attack had been made upon Japanese territory up to morning.

A Tokyo broadcast said that Guam and Wake Islands, American-owned stepping stones across the Pacific from Honolulu to Manila, were now under the Japanese flag.

Co-incidentally Japanese land forces were said to have opened up an attack on the area of Singapore and it appeared one of the first Japanese aims was to knock out this stronghold.

Berlin quoted a Japanese communique as saying Japanese troops were advancing in northern Thailand toward the Burma road.

## Being Without Electricity . . .

Last night there was a black-out along the whole coast. It was a precautionary measure in view of the evident preparations the Japanese had made to try to strike quickly at different points on this coast. It did not necessarily mean anything except that we were ready for all emergencies.

It is possible that night may bring us another blackout just as it is bringing the same to all points on the coast. Possibly authorities will make some other plans than pulling a central switch in order to bring about a black-out. We all realize that the black-out is necessary and desirable but heat is needed in the morning and heat is also desirable for industrial and other purposes independent of the question of lighting. These are the days for quick decisions and using common sense.

While it is necessary and desirable to be careful about the black-out, it is not necessary or desirable to be frightened over the situation. There is nothing to be worried about. We are as safe as any place on the coast and probably much safer than most places. If all carry on their work as usual and obey any new regulations that may be made, we have little to fear. We are very far from any Japanese base, so far that we are not likely to find our daily occupations interfered with.

After their experience of a complete all-night blackout, Prince Rupert people are probably appreciative enough of the seriousness of the situation and would welcome their power services sufficiently to lend all co-operation in keeping the city dark providing they were allowed the privilege of retaining their electrical power ser-

vices.

While the Japanese ambassadors were negotiating with the American statesmen with the idea of arriving at a peaceful settlement, Japanese airplanes were on their way across the Pacific to attack. In fact, negotiations were still going on when the first attacks were made.

## Nothing New in War . . .

There is nothing new to Canada in being at war. We have been at war for some time, but there has so far been no fighting in Canada. Our enemy has been Germany and friends of Germany. Now, conditions have changed and we find ourselves nearer our enemy. The Pacific Ocean does not so effectively separate us from Japan so we are liable to clash at any time. Hearing the excitement in the United States centres tends to make us all more interested than otherwise we would have been. While American centres showed a great deal of interest in Canada being at war, it was as nothing to when the United States was at war and when they were attacked by a treacherous enemy. Then even Senator Wheeler wanted to fight. It was quite a treat.

## We May Help This Time . . .

During the last war American soldiers went overseas to help win the war for the British and many of them seemed to regret it. Now Canadians will help the United States. We expect United States to be able to win without our help, but the cause is similar so Canadians will be glad to help.







## JUNIORS IN WAR EFFORT

Girl Guides Of Canada Take Big Part In War Work And Set Example For Sticking To It

By MARIENNE IZASK Canadian Press Staff Writer Canadian Girl Guides are ad-

apting their work to fit the necessities of wartime. No other war has demonstrated so clearly the need for response from every man, woman and child. Even the smallest seven-year old Brownie is not barred in this effort. In fact, the enthusiasm and eagerness of the younger children is often a clarion challenge to war-weary grown-ups.

A recent effort of English Guides to help bombed Britain is the instruction of bombed-outs in how to cook over a makeshift outdoor fire with little or nothing in the way of utensils. Older girls are studying fire prevention, ambulance work, A.R.P. work, motor mechanics and child welfare. Canadian Guides are following their English sisters along the same lines. Experiments in training of 15-year olds in caring for small children; outdoor cooking, A.R.P., signalling and other technique are features of the Guides' work at the present time.

For Self Reliance

Mrs. H. F. M. Hertsberg, provincial commissioner for Girl Guides of Ontario, remarked, "If any good comes out of this war, one of the advantages will be that children will be more self-reliant and responsible."

In November, 1940, the Canadian Guides Association started making clothes for children of the bombed-out areas in Great Britain as a national project. Since February, 1750 articles have been sent monthly to Girl Guide Headquarters in London for dis-

Besides their own projects Canadian Guides are helping other organizations. They have knitted and sewn more than 20,000 articles of clothing for the Red Cross; have helped by cleaning Red Cross workrooms, running messages and serving tea to the volunteers. In some communities small Brownies have taken on household tasks as family mending in order to release mothers for war work.

Aid To Other Groups

Older Guides assist the Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire, and the Catholic Women's League as typists, chauffeurs and messengers. Hospitality is extended to war guests. Correspondence is encouraged with refugee children and they are sent picture books to help them in English.

The Girl Guides of the British Empire last year donated \$222,200 of which Canada's contribution was \$11,935. This money purchased for the forces two air ambulances, a motor lifeboat, five mobile canteens for the Y.M.C.A., 20 motor ambulances for the Royal Navy, a number of church huts and 56 "quiet rooms" where soldiers can rest, write letters home and hold church services.




