SPOTLIGHT ON BULGARIA

SOFIA-There are indications that Germany may attempt to move troops soon through Bulgaria. Both Bulgaria and Turkey are reported to be massing troops on the Thracian frontiers. Istanbul hears that Great Britain has warned Bulgaria that military objectives in Bulgaria will be bombed if she permits German troops to pass.

ITALIANS RUN IN ALBANIA

It was an uncomfortable crossing owing to the weather. A sixtymile gale was encountered. The only reminder of war at sea was the sighting of a loose mine.

BELIEVES INVASION IMMINENT

LONDON-Col. L. C. M. S. Amery, Secretary of State for India, told a London audience today that he believes a German attempt to invade England is imminent. Hitler must seek to make a decisive blow and there is but the one direction in which this can be made. Der Feuher's next big blow is due and the only hope for a decisive result is conquest of Britain. It will be a "supreme and formidable" effort and, while it probably will not be successful, it may involve losses, sacrifices and restrictions to an extent Britons have not yet dreamed of.

Recently there was a dinner at a Conservative Club in Toronto for the purpose of discussing the present position of the Conservative party. The gathering was not a party convention nor did it pretend to be that. It was! simply a gathering of influential Conservatives of that city who are anxious that the party shall regain its former standing as a political power in the country.

From the report of the meeting telegraphed to this coast it seems as if the chief difficulty emphasized was; the lack of leadership. Today there is at the head of the party an old time Conservative from the maritime provinces whose chief policy seems to be one of opposing the present government, irrespective of the merit of the questions up for discussion. Evidently R. B. Hanson has not! caught the ear of the Canadian public. Under his leadership the party is likely to gradually disappear.

There is a call for younger men but young men have to fight their way in Parliament and they are under the handicap of having to please men of the type of those who met at Toronto. These people do not realize that Canada! is becoming more democratic. R. B. Bennett realized that when he came out with a rather advanced policy but he lost the support of the old time Conservatives.

It looks to us now as if the Conservatives will remain in the cold shades of opposition for a long time unless they can find some fairly young man who can fire the party with a new optimism, a new hope and give them a new policy. If it is to continue to cater to wealth and preferred position, it may as well throw in the sponge now. It must break from those controlling influences that have held it in leash in the past. With a magnetic leader and a new policy, it would have a good chance of sweeping the country, if not at the next election, at any rate in the not far distant future.






