

SUNDERLAND FLYING-BOAT RESCUES R.A.F. FR OM GREEK COVE



Heroic defenders of Crete, forced to give ground by increasing strength of German airborne invasion forces and Nazi domination of the air, have been withdrawn from the island. This picture, released by the air ministry in London, shows a si nilar withdrawal from the Greek mainland when outnumbered Allied armies, after fighting brilliant rearguard actions, were taken off. A giant Sunderland flying boat of the R.A.F. is picking up air force personnel in a rocky and hill-rimmed Greek cove. These huge planes played an important part on the withdrawal from Greece and may have been similarly valuable in removing su vivors of the Crete battles.



English Woman Writes Even "Contraptions" May Bring Miracles To Troops

OTTAWA. June 14: (CP)-Desscribing her adventures with makeshift mobile canteen, an Englishwoman has written Canadian friends that "the mobile tea canteen is second only in importance to the ambulance" and "if you don't know what to buy-we don't begin to have enough of them."

"They are the 20th century version of the biblical miracles of loaves and fishes" her letter said. "And there are some strange contrartions now serving in emergen-

"There wasn't a canteen available even if we had the money to buy one but we were determined to get things to the men just the same. "Tust as we were ready to start out a spell of bitter weather set in. However we thought about the men out there in their camps and this gave us the courage to start out."

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
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
