YugoSlavia Is Still In Doubt

Heaviest Air Assault of War on Germany Is Started By Britain

Hamburg and Bremen Feel Opening Weight of New Offensive Made Possible By Passage of "Lend-Lease" Bill in United States

LONDON, March 13: (CP)—Royal Air Force planes crossed the Straits of Dover this afternoon, apparently for new attacks upon German objectives after it was described as the heaviest air assault against Germany last night since the war began.

ARE DOWN BY NIGHT

Royal Air Force Sets New Record by Destroying Eleven Enemy Planes

LONDON, March 13.—Nazi bombers were over England again early today and two of the enemy machines were shot down in a fight at dawn, making the overnight total of destroyed German machines eleven—a new one-night record for the British defence forces.

The enemy struck with renewed fury. Their planes came over Liverpool at great height and, dropping bombs indiscriminately, subjected that port to the longest raid of the war.

While the large scale attack was centred on Merseyside, the Liverpool shipping area, London was also attacked during the night.

The sound of a new type of artillery was heard, giving hint that a new anti-aircraft defensive weapon was being employed.

The enemy was over the Midlands, East Anglia and southeast and southwest England as well last night.

Up to dawn at least nine Nazi raiders had been brought down.

MUSSOLINI NOT HELPING ATHENS

ATHENS—Even Premier Mussolini in person cannot inspire the Italian forces in Albania to stand up against the Greeks. Despite their heaviest counter-offensive yet in the war, the Fascists are still losing ground and suffering appalling casualties.

CHINESE TO SINGAPORE

TOKYO—The newspaper Nichi Nichi says that a million Chinese soldiers are being sent in an expeditionary force to Malay Peninsula. They will be outfitted by the British with United States equipment.

CALAIS IS ATTACKED

LONDON—The Air Ministry announced that the Royal Air Force attacked the German-occupied airfield at Calais this afternoon.

ADVANCING IN ETHIOPIA

CAIRO—British forces are continuing their rapid advance in Ethiopia. They are converging from seven directions toward Addis Ababa, the capital.

BOAT FOUNDERS

Paloma of Vancouver Sinks In Nanaimo Harbor—Cause Is Unknown

NANAIMO, March 13: (CP)—The Green ton seiner La Paloma of Vancouver sank last night at the entrance to Nanaimo Harbor with a load of oil drums.

The seiner listed suddenly, righted herself and began to go down.

COLLIDED OVER CITY

Royal Canadian Air Force Tragedy Yesterday At Saskatoon

SASKATOON, March 13:—Two planes were killed when Royal Canadian Air Force planes collided in mid-air over this city yesterday.

KILLED IN AIR CRASH

Two Planes Crash In New Brunswick—Pilot Officer Gillard Of Vancouver Is Victim

MONCTON, New Brunswick, March 13:—The body of Pilot Officer Charles Gillard of Vancouver, killed when a Royal Canadian Air Force training plane crashed yesterday, was found and brought here today. Three men had been in the plane. Leading Aircraftman J. Patton of Ingleton, Ontario, bailed out uninjured while Leading Aircraftman C. C. Cobe of Bountey, Saskatchewan, was seriously injured. A second plane which crashed about the same time with one man aboard was sighted from the air today.

OTTAWA, March 13.—Three air-men were missing after crashing of two Royal Canadian Air Force planes over Westmoreland County in New Brunswick. They are Pilot Officer Charles Gillard of Vancouver, Leading Aircraftman B. C. Cobe of Saskatchewan and Leading Aircraftman J. Patton of Ontario.

BOMBING OF EIRE

Unidentified Plane Drops Missiles On County Donegal But No Damage Done

DUBLIN, March 13: (CP)—The government of Eire information bureau reported yesterday that bombs were dropped by an unidentified plane near Cordunoh and Innishowen, County Donegal, but no damage was done.

MANITOBA ELECTION

Prairie Province Will Vote On April 22, Premier Bracken Announces

WINNIPEG, March 13:—The Manitoba Legislature was dissolved last night by Lieutenant Governor R. F. Williams K. C., shortly after Premier John Bracken announced that a general provincial election would be held April 22 with nominations closing on April 12.

TRANSFER TO SOUTH

M. M. McLachlan, for twenty-three years manager here for Brackman-Ker Milling Co. Ltd., has been advised of his transfer south at the end of April.

Mr. McLachlan has been in the service of the company for thirty-five years on March 1. He came here from Nelson.

ASKS FOR NO DELAY

President Roosevelt Urges Early Passage of Big Appropriation to Aid Britain.

Congress To Act

Will Comply With Chief Executive's Request on "Lend-Lease" Implementation

WASHINGTON, D.C., March 13 (CP)—A high administration official disclosed today that the Army and the Reconstruction Finance Corporation were negotiating to take over between \$350,000,000 worth of British war contracts and factories in the United States. The official said that the program did not mean that Britain was to be relieved of the remainder of her obligations to the United States but it would probably cut Britain's war obligations between twenty and twenty-five percent.

WASHINGTON, D.C., March 13: (CP)—In a letter to Speaker Sam Rayburn transmitting detailed estimates for expenditure under a \$7,000,000,000 appropriation which he is seeking to implement the newly passed "Aid to Britain" bill.

President Franklin D. Roosevelt yesterday said: "I strongly urge immediate enactment of this appropriation."

This arsenal, declared the President in his statement to congress, "will be the bulwark of our own defence against the aggressor."

It was imperative to the security of the United States that encouragement be given to those nations which were fighting against aggression and that every assistance possible be given them.

Congress expressed its readiness to give early approval to the President's unprecedented appropriation bill, both Democratic and Republican leaders expressing intention to support the measure.

Speaker Sam Rayburn said that everything else would be shunted aside in order to give speedy consideration to the appropriation measure which he predicted would be passed by April 1.

In addition to over \$2,000,000,000 for aircraft, the appropriation of seven billion dollars includes one billion 300 million dollars for guns, one billion dollars for food, 629 million dollars for ships, 362 million for tanks and trucks, \$1,350,000,000 for agricultural aid and 675 billion dollars for new plants to make weapons.

These funds will be available for expenditure up to June 30, 1942, which is the lifetime of the "Lend-Lease" bill. It was indicated that, if more money is needed in the meantime, the President will be back before Congress for it.

Meantime supplies will be available for immediate delivery to Great Britain from existing army and navy stores. One hundred and fourteen over-age ships, including 74 destroyers, are now available as well as 12,000 bombers and a large number of pursuit planes. It will be only a matter of days before these deliveries commence if they have not already started.

Shipments of goods from already existing stores are limited only by the \$1,300,000,000 curb placed by the Senate.

Great Britain has intimated that it has crews ready to man all ships available.

Secretary of State Cordell Hull was the first witness today before the House committee hearing on the seven billion dollar appropriation bill. He reiterated the President's exhortation for speedy passage.

RAILWAYMEN ARE SAVING

C.N.R. Employees Pledge Themselves to Extra of \$2,138,070 Per Year

MONTREAL, March 13.—Figures compiled today show that employees of the Canadian National Railways have pledged themselves to the regular purchase of war savings certificates to the extent of \$2,138,070 per year.

D. C. Grant, vice-president of finance for the system, in releasing these figures stated that the campaign is continuing and he anticipates that the number of employees pledging themselves to consistent monthly purchases and amount of their subscriptions will be substantially increased.

From the beginning of the present campaign the number of employees signing pledge cards has increased daily.

Previously, a considerable number throughout the system had subscribed but, as a result of the intensive campaign, the original number of subscribers has increased seven-fold and the cash value of their pledges has increased in similar ratio.

Some Question Still About Giving Into To Demands of Germany

Reported That Balkan Nation Does Not Mean to be Trampled Upon Like Bulgaria—Situation in Balkans Still Enigmatic

LONDON, March 13.—A Reuters dispatch from Balgrade today said that YugoSlavia would fight if foreign soldiers enter the country. She does not intend to be marched through like Bulgaria. This was in contradiction to earlier reports that the country would submit to Nazi demands that German troops be allowed to pass through the country towards Greece.

YugoSlavia appears to be still holding out against actual membership in the Axis although being willing to sign a pact of friendship with Germany and to remain neutral.

One million YugoSlavs were reported to be under arms today.

The Ankara radio today predicted that Turkey would be in the war by spring.

Greece still insists that she is in the fight to the death against Italy and Germany if necessary.

DOMINION ASKS FOR PAYMENT

Seeking \$34,000,000 From Provincial Government—Pattullo Says Claim Is Not Valid

VANCOUVER, March 13: (CP)—Premier T. D. Pattullo announced today that the Dominion government was requesting payment of provincial treasury bills totalling more than \$34,000,000 held by the Dominion government.

Mr. Pattullo said that nearly \$25,000,000 of the total was for unemployment relief, adding "we do not recognize that the Dominion has a valid claim on the province in respect of these unemployment relief notes."

The balance covers advances for other purposes. The terms or method of repayment are not known here.

MID-AIR DISASTER

Seven Men Believed To Have Died Today In Collision Of R. C. A. F. Planes North Of Toronto

BONDHEAD, Ont., March 13: (CP)—Seven men are believed to have died in the wreckage of two big bombing planes which touched wings or tails in mid-air and plummeted to the ground just north of this village, 35 miles north of Toronto, today.

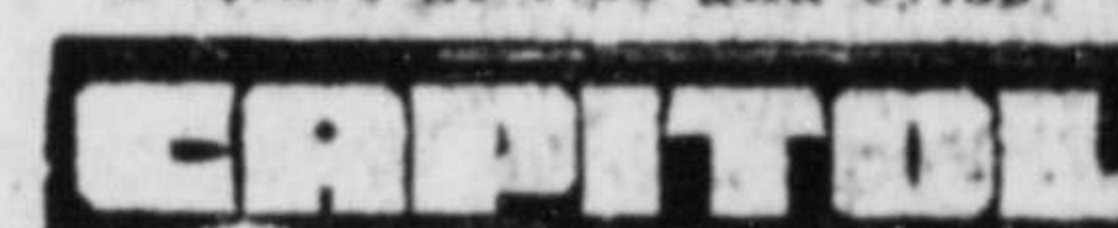
