RED ARMY HOLDS ON IN BATTLE

Advances Of Germans At Some Points Admitted—"Mountains Of German Corpses"
NAZIS REPULSED
 MOSCOW, October 11:—German attacks in the Vyazma sector were repulsed overnight and the invaders suffered heavy losses, the Soviet government declared today, but the Red Army acknowledged that its situation was still critical on that vital front. Both sides were, apparently, pouring men into the huge ten day old struggle in which the Russians said the German plan of encirclement had been balked and the offensive before Moscow apparently slowed down. A communique said that the Red Army had been braced with fresh strength of reserves sent out to stop the drive toward the Red capital. The Army newspaper Red Star said German divisions were rushing into incessant battle also. "The danger is great and it is up to us to stop him now and not let him go any farther," Red Star declared.

LONDON, October 11:—There were widely divergent reports today, according to the sources from which they emanated, of the progress of the terrific and sanguinary battle raging on the central front in the Briansk area in the Russo-German war. Berlin claimed that hundreds of thousands of Red forces were being put out of action either by destruction or encirclement. Moscow claimed that, generally, the huge Nazi attacking forces were being kept in check although Red Star, Soviet army newspaper, admitted that the Russians, fighting with their backs to the wall, were withdrawing to new defence lines approximately 100 miles west of Moscow at the nearest point to the capital city. Masses of reinforcements, with huge mechanized forces were being drawn up to meet the advancing Nazi panzer units.

LONDON military authorities agreed that the Russian situation was precarious and that considerable numbers of Soviet divisions appeared to be already encircled. In Moscow, in spite of the fact that the city is now obviously the principal objective of the Nazi drive, the population appears little perturbed. There are full houses in the theatres. Places of entertainment and amusement are thronged. Life goes on much as usual. Next Wednesday is being looked forward to as the day on which heat will be turned on for the winter in apartment buildings.

Mountains of Corpses
 The Red Army conceded yesterday that Germans are advancing at several places with immense forces in a new surge towards Moscow from the vicinity of Briansk but declared that the gains were being made "over mountains of German corpses."

North of Orel, however, the Army newspaper Red Star declared, the invaders were stalled and the Nazi plan to encircle Marshal Timoshenko's armies on the central sector had collapsed. At Briansk, Red Star declared, the Russians were heavily outnumbered after the Germans had thrown mighty reinforcements into the battle.

Both official and unofficial reports indicated that the Germans had been held along virtually the whole central and northwestern fronts. Reports said that at least fifteen thousand German officers and men were killed in various intense pocket battles around Vyazma and Briansk, west and southwest of Moscow. BOMBERS MISSING

Ten R.A.F. Machines Fail to Return From Attack on German Industrial Areas.
 LONDON, Oct. 11:—Ten bombers are missing as a result of an attack by the Royal Air Force last night on the industrial Ruhr and Rhineland. More than two hundred British bombers roared across the channel in waves overnight as the Royal Air Force renewed the offensive against Germany. The raids were the first in more than a week due to bad weather.

Nazi Radio Station Taken By U. S. Navy on Coast of Greenland; Ship Captured

WASHINGTON, D.C., Oct. 11:—The navy announced today that a Nazi radio station had been discovered and "disposed of" on the Greenland coast and also that a small Norwegian steamer enroute to establish a station in Greenland had been taken into custody. The navy said the radio station was manned by an agent of the German Gestapo and was seized last month. The spokesman said the expedition was sent to Greenland to establish a station to send weather reports and other military information to the Germans.

RUSSIA TO BATTLE ON

Even If Moscow Falls, Soviet Will Continue Resistance to Germany, Predicts Beaverbrook.
 LONDON, Oct. 11:—Back from Moscow where he headed the British mission which, with a similar American mission visited the Soviet capital to discuss means of further aiding the Soviet in its war against Germany, Lord Beaverbrook expressed the opinion that, even if Moscow should fall, the Russians will fight on. The morale of the Russian people is high and they are confident of eventual victory, Beaverbrook declares.

War office disclosure that Great Britain has organized a special corps of shock troops, skilled in sea landings and guerilla warfare, was taken in some quarters today as foreshadowing more and bigger raids on German-occupied soil. Details of the corps extensive field exercises were disclosed at the moment when sections of the public and press were demanding to know what Great Britain has done or plans to do to relieve the German pressure on Russia.

 LONDON, Oct. 11:—The Dutch government in exile warned the citizens of Rotterdam yesterday that that city was next on the list for intensive bombing by the Royal Air Force now that the great German ports of Hamburg and Bremen had been put out of action. The loyal people of Rotterdam have been warned to move away from military objectives.

Duff Pattullo Has Instinct For Doing Right Thing; Has Done Much for Prince Rupert

Covering the Queen Charlotte Islands in August, 1916, his first campaign, T. D. Pattullo, now the Premier of British Columbia, with a group of friends, came to the Tlell River and found that the ferry boat was at the other side. While his friends were wondering what to do, "T. D." shed his clothes in the bush, swam the river and brought the boat over.

Shortly after his appointment as Minister of Lands in 1916 his belief that all should have an opportunity to learn to swim prompted him to deed the swimming pool across the harbor to the citizens of Prince Rupert. Such prompt action in doing the obviously right thing was typical of the sturdy young Yukoner in 1916, and it is still typical of him as Premier of British Columbia.

Sitka Spruce
 During the last war, as Minister of Lands, Mr. Pattullo did not wait for legislative authority to throw open privately-held spruce stands on the Queen Charlotte Islands for the cutting of airplane spruce but authorized immediate cutting by order-in-council, having the order ratified by the legislature at the next session. One war ended and another has begun since "T. D." swam the Tlell River and Sitka spruce is again being cut for overseas service. British Columbia has seen good times and bad times. Many of the old faces are gone and many of the young boys of 1916 are handling big business today. The old frame Court House here is forgotten in the palatial building that now houses all provincial government offices under one roof. The site of the old frame building was turned over to the federal authorities by Mr. Pattullo and on it stands a federal building that would be a credit to any city while the sorry-looking hole in the ground, of unhappy memory, on the opposite side of the street, is coming back to the province in lieu of the new site granted by Mr. Pattullo.

The Dry Dock
 During the last war a few ships were repaired at the dry dock—today ten ships are being built here with more to follow. Premier Pattullo was in Ottawa to aid Mr. Hanson in pressing Prince Rupert's claims for the building of these ships. Present day fishermen have probably forgotten the old conditions on the waterfront. They are more convenient today, thanks to Premier Pattullo. An ore-sampling plant and a new hospital are further improvements to development and to the care of public health which have been provided. Great new developments in Yukon and Alaska are afoot which will bring increasing business to Prince Rupert. Not so many miles of road remain to be built to link Prince Rupert with the Alaska Highway and that highway is assured. The premier is the busiest man in British Columbia. He is running the business of the province of British Columbia and running it better than it has ever been run before but he is still the same sturdy northerner who swam the Tlell River and brought back the boat.

Dominion Government Takes Tighter Hold On Purses Of People

Sales Not Only of Retail Stores Are Affected But Also Operations of All Institutions Lending Money for Buying.

OTTAWA, Oct. 11: (CP)—The Dominion government took a tighter hold today on the pocketbooks of the people by ordering drastic restrictions on instalment buying and borrowing in order to divert more production and a bigger share of the national income to the war effort. Restrictions, put into effect by the Wartime Prices and Trade Board, take effect Oct. 14. Not only sales of retail stores are affected but also operations of all lending institutions as far as instalment credit transactions are concerned. Most important regulations are:

1. Down payment on any goods affected by the order other than private automobiles must be at least one-third of the total cash price and never less than \$10 at the time of delivery. The balance must be paid in full within twelve months with minimum monthly payments of \$5 each.
2. The minimum down payment on automobiles must be fifty percent of the cash price. The balance must be paid in full within twelve months on cars costing less than \$500 and within eighteen months on cars costing less than that.

The control ranges over a wide variety of commodities including home appliances using electricity, vacuum cleaners, sewing machines, refrigerators, washing machines, furniture, clothing, radios, jewelry, phonographs, bicycles, boats and marine motors unless they are to be used for commercial purposes or in the fishing industry.

FRUITS OF WINTER IN

Summer Lines Disappearing From Local Retail Market—Butter Weak But Flour Stiff.

Summer fruits are pretty well cleaned up on the retail market and winter lines now predominate. Grapefruit are scarce and prices high, good fruit being difficult to obtain. Oranges are also high in price. New oranges will not be in until the end of November. MacIntosh Red apples have taken quite a jump in price and choice sizes are very hard to get, the general offering being eighties, an unusually large size which is not so popular with householders. Lightness of the apple crop this year is the reason for this situation.

Hothouse tomatoes of much improved quality are now on the market. Terrace root vegetables, of good quality, are coming in now in substantial quantity. Eggs, after a recent drop, are firming up in price again. Butter stocks have been piling up of late and prices at the moment are weak.

Flour has taken a jump in price and there is talk of a stiff tax being applied. Almonds are pretty well cleaned up now and no new stocks are expected.

Pack into clean, hot jars, and seal at once.

Whaling off the Queen Charlotte Islands has been extremely successful this year. According to latest available reports the Consolidated Whaling Corporation had taken 224 whales compared with 196 for the same period last year and a total of 220 for the entire 1940 season. With slightly more favorable this year, the fleet has been remaining on the job for a longer period than last year and, as a result, it is expected that, when final returns are in, the industry will have reached a new level for the year. Due to war demands, the demand for whale oil is much improved. Officials say they expect a continuing strong market for whale livers in view of their high Vitamin A content.

Dr. Neal Carter has just received from the University of Washington the report of some investigations into the amount of radium in the sea water along the coast of northern British Columbia and Alaska. The report was made by Dr. L. A. Sanderman and Dr. C. L. Utterback of the oceanographic laboratories of the University at Seattle. It was found by these two scientists that the amount of radium in the water in the neighborhood of Prince Rupert is 0.000,000,000,000, 6 parts of radium to one part of sea water. This is only about a half as much as was found in other places on the coast. The largest amounts were found at the head of inlets fed by glacial streams. The amount around Prince Rupert corresponds very closely to the amount of radium found in the rock formation of the Skeena Valley by the Canadian department of mines. Dr. Carter says there is also gold in the sea water but not in sufficient quantities to make recovery profitable.


Northland Transportation Co.'s steamer North Sea, Capt. Len Williams, arrived in port at 6:30 last evening from Alaska and, after spending several hours here discharging fish from Ketchikan for transshipment East over Canadian National Railways, sailed in continuation of her voyage to Seattle. Union steamer Cardena, Capt. John Boden, arrived in port at 9:30 this morning from the south and sailed at 11:30 a.m. on her return to Vancouver and waypoints.

Rev. Peter Kelly, with the mission boat Thomas Crosby, made calls recently at Pacofi and Lagoon Bay, holding services at both places. The Thomas Crosby went direct across from Ocean Falls and, after also visiting Cumsheewa Inlet and points in Skidegate Inlet, came in last week to Prince Rupert in connection with the holding of Presbytery sessions there.
