

GIGANTIC BATTLE

LONDON-Nine million men are reported engaged today in a gigantic battle in Russia between the Nazis and the Reds. Smolensk, important point on the way to Moscow, being 230 miles from the Soviet capital, is evidently in imminent danger of capture by the German forces. The Nazis claim that the last reserves of the Russians are being thrown into battle.

RUSSIAN NAVAL EXPLOIT

MOSCOW-The newspaper Pravda published details of an exploit of the Russian Navy in the Baltic Sea in which two German destroyers and thirteen Nazi troopships were sunk.

BLOW AT NAZI SHIPPING

LONDON-Within the past twenty-four hours, British bombers have put out of action seventeen Axis ships totalling almost 100,000 tons, damaged five others of between 40,000 and 45,000 tons and struck smashing new blows at Hamburg and other industrial areas in northern Germany and at the German-occupied French coast. Docks and warehouses were blown up by British bombers again attacking Boulogne.

New Regulations to Restrict Use of Gasoline in Canada to Become

OTTAWA, July 17: (CP)- Restricted hours of gasoline sales in Canada and ban on use of credit cards and charge accounts in gasoline purchases will come into effect next Monday, it was shown today in an order published in an extra edition of the Canada Ga-

The new restrictions call for the closing of gasoline stations from 7 p.m. until 7 a.m. on work days and Mondays, cutting out Sunday sales

It is emphasized that the necessary saving in Canada's gasoline supplies in order to conserve for war use must come from voluntary conservation rather than from the closing hour regulations which are primarily designed to reduce the expenses of service stations.

### EDITORIAL

## Nazi Thoroughness - - -

One reason why the Nazis win battles is their thoroughness in preparation and execution. One outstanding example of this is given in the invasion and capture of the island of Crete. News Week tells about this in a recent article compiled by an American diplomatic observer in London as follows:

At a crucial point in the battle for Maleme airport, when British artillery still commanded the field, the Germans dropped salvage engineers by parachute. They quickly filled holes, dragged away damaged planes, and cleared the way for more aircraft to land. "They had foreseen how to counter our artillery," a British officer remarked.

When a glider made a successful landing it was given a quick coat of white paint as a signal for other gliders to land there . . . Gliders which alighted on water had small auxiliary engines to push them to the beaches.

Parachute troops were equipped with flashlights operated by hand-driven dynamos, inflatable waistcoats to serve as life preservers if they fell in the water, and shockproof rubber boots in which were carried wire cutters and other tools.

Each man had his own chart marked with his own particular objective, and officers had oversize cuffs for carrying large-scale maps.

Fully equipped medical officers were dropped immediately after the paratroops were dropped . . . Each soldier taking Ovillers and La Boiselle. temperature, 74, Sea smooth. carried a disk which indicated his blood group, thus facili- Russian advance southwest tating blood transfusions.

Several planes were assigned to each group of a dozen or so men on the ground to look after their needs alone. Keeping in touch by short-wave radio, the pilots dropped food, ammunition and medical supplies, and bombed the enemy whenever their men were in a difficult spot.

Road signs in German were dropped from the air and set up for the land forces, since few of them could read Greek.
