

Unofficial despatches during the past few days seem! to indicate that the Japanese are using similar tactics to those of Germany, issuing threats with a view to influencing political and other moves and possibly trying to cause uneasiness and unrest in Britain and other parts of the Empire and the United States.

Just now the United States is somewhat divided over a matter of how much help will be sent to Britain. Should! the Japanese overstep the mark and become really hostile, the gaps in the United States would immediately close and the country would be a unit, not only in its own defense but in the defense of the British Empire.

The great stumbling block to Japanese aggression in the East Indies is the fortress of Singapore and the other fortress of Hong Kong. They are the two great centres; of British naval power in the Pacific and could not easily be taken, even by a very powerful fleet such as the Japan- Now is the Time to GET A ese now undoubtedly have.

We still are inclined to believe that the Japanese are sufficiently wary not to duplicate the Italian action by throwing in her lot with Germany too soon. If it was found that Britain was defeated, she would at once take! advantage of the opportunity to grab all she could, but otherwise she is very likely to await developments. Her MEN! WANT NORMAL PEP, VIM? threats may tend to weaken the naval forces around Britain or in the Mediterranean but they will not have any other effect. Possibly that is what they were intended to

Surprised At Speed - - -

Italian leaders in Africa declare that they were all surprised by the speed with which the British forces advanced. They did not think they could have been overtaken on more than one occasion when retreating from the various centres where they were attacked. That was one reason why so many prisoners were taken. They were not able to get away from the British mechanized forces.



THE MARQUIS OF LORNE, K.T., G.C.M.G. GOVERNOR-GENERAL OF CANADA, 1878-1883

60 YEARS AGO A Charter was signed

On February 15, 1881, the Marquis of Lorne, then Governor-General of Canada, signed the charter of the Canadian Pacific Railway. That signature consummated the vision of great Canadian statesmen - Sir John A. Macdonald, D'Arcy McGee, Sir Georges-Etienne Cartier, and Sir Charles Tupper—that the new Dominion of Canada should be linked from Atlantic to Pacific by a trans-continental railway—and implemented the pledge under which British Columbia entered Confederation.

So began a new era in Canadian unity . . . and Empire solidarity . . . for the Railway expanded into a system spanning two oceans and linking three continents. Today — as in 1914-18 — a proud responsibility rests on our transportation and communication systems - railway, steamships, freight, express, telegraphs and engineering shops. Canadian Pacific officers and employees everywhere are co-operating -each in his own field-towards the common goal . . . VICTORY. When that goal is reached—and it will be reached—this will be due, in no small measure, to Canada's contribution, and to the vision and foresight of the men who, sixty years ago, planned the construction of the first Canadian trans-continental railway.




