Enemy Is Falling Back In Africa

DEMANDS ON JAPAN

A.B.C.D. Powers Require Complete Abandonment of Policy of Aggressive Expansion.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24.—A.B.C.D. powers—America, Britain, China and Dutch East Indies—joined in four demands upon Japan—first, Japanese withdrawal from the Axis; second, Japan's abandonment of her aggressive expansionist policy; third, withdrawal of Japan from China and French Indo-China; fourth, equality of commercial opportunities for all nations in the Orient.

Secretary of State Cordell Hull and Special Envoy Saburo Korusu are expected to resume their conversations this week following the suspension last week pending the receipt of new instructions by Korusu from his government at Tokyo.

New Raids Are Carried Out By Royal Air Force

LONDON, Nov. 24.—The Royal Air Force carried out long daylight raids over occupied France Saturday and were over there again yesterday. Seven British planes failed to return.

The Royal Air Force roared back across the channel to pound northern France during Sunday night following two waves of day raids which bombed a factory near Calais and hammered barges near Gravelines with machine gun fire. In the night-foray British airmen attacked French airdromes where German bombers were based.

Appointed To School Staff

Miss Violet Thorne of Courtenay Is Appointed Following Miss Halliwell's Resignation.

Miss Violet Thorne of Courtenay, Vancouver Island, has been appointed to the primary grade teaching staff of Borden Street School, it was announced at the City Hall today. She fills a vacancy caused by the resignation of Miss Lillian Halliwell, who is to be succeeded as vice-principal by Miss Kate McKay.

SEWARD IS FIRESWEPT

Half of Business Section of Alaska City Is Wiped Out by Flames During the Night.

SEATTLE, Nov. 24.—Army Signal Corps officers said today that fire of undetermined origin last night and this morning wiped out half the business district of Seward, Alaska.

The blaze broke out last night and was not brought under control until all buildings on the east side of Fourth Avenue, the main business thoroughfare, were destroyed for a distance of two blocks.

Fire fighters were handicapped when a water main broke and winds sprang up.

Mervin Colebank and Harry Holubank, for supplying liquor to Indians, were each fined \$50, with option of one month's imprisonment, in city police court on Saturday. S. Dixon, for a third drunkenness offence, was given three months' imprisonment without option of a fine. A charge against D. Gurvich of supplying liquor to a minor was dismissed.

New Peace Offer Is Due Shortly

Hitler Expected to Wave Olive Branch Again in December Or January.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24.—Chancellor Adolf Hitler's next peace offer, based on a "new deal" for Europe, is expected to be made in December or January.

PARACHUTE CORPS NOW

Great Britain Is Continuing To Build Up This Arm Of Service

LONDON, Nov. 24.—Great Britain continues to build up a parachute corps with a view to an eventual invasion of Europe. The ages for enlistment are 23 to 32. Parachutists will be equipped with machine guns, tommy guns and mortars.

ENCOURAGE ENLISTING

Local Civilian Committee Decides To Canvass Employers To Secure Co-operation

The first active move taken by the local civilian recruiting committee for the encouragement of voluntary enlistment in Prince Rupert will be the getting in touch with employers of men of military age in the city with a view to listing such men as are eligible for overseas service. The ultimate intention is to personally contact these men with a view to interesting them in enlistment. Already two of the principal employers of the city have furnished such lists of men who are within the ages and not considered key men.

This step was decided upon at a meeting of the local civilian recruiting committee on Saturday afternoon with Major A. S. Parkes, the new recruiting officer here and Capt W. H. Crocker, who is relinquishing those duties. The committee also decided to draw to the attention of Col. James Mess, civilian director of recruiting at Ottawa, the unsuitability of the present recruiting headquarters here and recommending more prominent, attractive and mobile facilities.

Alex McKenzie was elected chairman of the local civilian recruiting committee with J. J. Little as vice-chairman. Other members of the committee are D. G. Borland, G. A. Hunter, W. L. Armstrong, H. A. Breen and E. V. Whiting. Sergeant C. B. McFarlane will carry out the secretarial work for the committee.

As soon as the letters for submission to the employers and employees have been prepared, the committee will meet again, probably about the middle of the week. In the meantime, the local committee, recognizing the need for men forthwith, is losing no opportunity to make its assistance as effective and immediate as possible.

Deliveries of herring from east coast of Vancouver Island and lower mainland waters are now being commenced for the Nelson Bros. Fisheries Ltd. cannery here which expects to have an active winter season canning these fish. The output will, evidently, be limited only by the amount of fish available. When herring becomes available locally, the Port Edward and Tucks Inlet reduction plants are expected to start grinding them.

CANADIANS GET OVER

One of Largest Contingents, Including Many Airmen, Have Landed.

AT A BRITISH PORT, Nov. 24.—The final contingent of the Fifth Canadian (armored) Division has landed safely in Britain from the largest troop convoy ever to reach the island.

Thousands and thousands of Canadians, in battle kit, poured ashore and piled into trains which took them to training camps in the south of England near defence lines of the Canadian Corps.

It took several days to disembark the vast contingent which included the largest draft yet of airmen trained under the Commonwealth Air Training Plan. Men from Canada, Australia and New Zealand, as well as Royal Air Force men, and a large group of Norwegians trained in Canada made up the contingent which was so large that it formed the complete complement of a big peacetime passenger liner. It was the first time in the war that a troop transport carried airmen alone.

Smithers A.R.P. Getting Active

Fire Department Section of Civilian Protection Committee Holds Practice

SMITHERS, Nov. 24.—The fire department section of the Civilian Protection Committee held a practice and test of their pumps and equipment in Alfred Park during the middle of last week and everything worked satisfactorily. First aid parties have been hearing lectures and receiving instructions from A. B. Washburn who has proven himself very capable in this regard and lectures on gas and gas-masks have been delivered by Dr. C. Greene and Constable W. Todd.

A large number of citizens have been enrolled in the various departments under the Civilian Protection Committee and all of them are keen in being instructed in the parts they are to play in any emergency.

Distinctions Have No Place in God's Kingdom, He Says

Dismiss pride and prejudice, practise justice and mercy and bring peace and harmony was the admonition of Rev. A. F. MacSween in his Sunday morning sermon at First Presbyterian Church. There was no place in God's Kingdom for distinctions which were common in ordinary life as between men, communities and nations. People must necessarily be classified for purposes of expediency but classes were often carried too far. Too often was there distrust and contempt between the rich and the poor, the old and the rich and between the nations. Even in churches distinctions might some times be found. The pastor spoke on the text from Acts 10—"God is no respecter of persons but in every nation he that feareth him and worketh righteousness is accepted with him."

BATTLE OF MOSCOW ON

Conflict of Unprecedented Proportions Continues in Front of Soviet Capital.

MOSCOW, Nov. 24.—Nazi and Soviet forces are still locked in battle of unprecedented proportions in front of Moscow. Saturday night they were fifty-seven miles away from the Soviet capital.

WILL MEET NEAR PARIS

Petaain And Goering To Parley At Fontainebleau Near Paris

PARIS, Nov. 24.—Marshal Henri Philippe Petaain, Chief of State of France, and Marshal Herman Goering, Vice-Chancellor of Germany, will meet at Fontainebleau near Paris on Wednesday.

Red Cross Air Raid Stations

Twenty-Three to Be Started in Vancouver With \$100 Worth of Equipment in Each.

VANCOUVER, Nov. 24.—The Red Cross will establish twenty-three air raid stations in Vancouver. They will be established in school houses and public buildings. Each will be provided with \$100 worth of equipment.

NAZI ACE IS KILLED

Col. von Molders Was Credited With Bringing Down 101 British Planes in Battle

BERLIN, Nov. 24.—The German ace, Col. von Molders, aged 27, was killed Saturday in an air-plane crash near Breslau while returning from the funeral of General Kurt von Briesen. He was credited with bringing down 101 British planes in battle. A state funeral will be given.

Oil Man Is Paying Visit

R. W. Baker, vice-president and general manager of the Standard Oil Co. of British Columbia, arrived in the city on Saturday night's train from the interior and will proceed by the Catala tomorrow afternoon to his headquarters at Vancouver. Mr. Baker was accompanied into the city by Robert Sutherland, local manager, who has been on a two weeks' trip through the interior as far as Prince George on company business.

Dr. R. G. Large will be the speaker at the weekly luncheon of the Prince Rupert Gyro Club this Wednesday, telling of his recent trip to eastern Canada and the United States.

SITUATION IS BETTER

Sudden Improvement in Labor War—Coal Mine And Steel Strikes Are Ended

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 24.—The week-end saw a sudden and welcome improvement in the strike situation in the United States.

The Captive coal mine strike ended with 50,000 men returning to work after agreement had been made to arbitration by a committee consisting of John L. Lewis, president of the Committee on Industrial Organization, the president of United States Steel, and the director of federal conciliation service. One hundred and fifty thousand miners who had been on sympathy strike also returned to work.

The Pittsburg steel strike also came to an end and negotiations for a settlement of the threatened general railway strike have been resumed.

It is some time since the labor situation has looked better than it does today.

Smithers Old Timer Is Dead

Mark Wilson, Former Railway Engineer, Passes Away

SMITHERS, Nov. 24.—Mark Wilson of Smithers was another old timer to pass away recently. He died in the Smithers Hospital at the first of last week.

Mr. Wilson was at one time a locomotive engineer on the Grand Trunk Pacific along this line and was well known by the railwaymen. For some time he operated the Evelyn Rooms in Smithers but sold out nearly ten years ago and has been living in Smithers since that time.

ANOTHER ROBBERY

Howe & McNulty's Store on Second Avenue Visited for Second Time Within a Week By Rifle Thief.

For the second time within a week Howe & McNulty's hardware store on Second Avenue was broken into during Saturday night and a rifle taken. Entry on both occasions was gained by the breaking of front windows.

Late Sunday night or early Sunday morning the window of the main front door was broken and entry made. Out of the store window a 25.20 Winchester rifle was taken.

In the previous robbery the show window itself was broken and the rifle, also a Winchester, evidently picked right out of the window.

Police investigation is proceeding.

Minister Is Near Death

Worse Turn in Condition of Hon. Ernest Lapointe Who Has Been Dangerously Ill.

MONTREAL, Nov. 24.—The condition of Rt. Hon. Ernest Lapointe, minister of justice, which was dangerous last week, is now much worse. He was able to talk to his family again at the end of the week, but Dr. J. R. Boutin, medical director of Notre Dame Hospital, this afternoon described Mr. Lapointe's condition as desperate. "It is only a question of hours," Dr. Boutin said.

More Veterans' Guards Needed

Category Has Been Reduced to C2, It Is Announced.

Two hundred and fifty more men are needed immediately in the Veterans' Home Guard, local recruiting headquarters have been advised. The category has been reduced to C2.

GERRY FOR ROAD WORK

Further Champions Cause Of Prince Rupert, Speaking At Ottawa

OTTAWA, Nov. 24.—In addition to advocating that Prince Rupert be made a fortress in view of her strategic importance from a military standpoint in the Pacific arena, G. G. McGeer, M. P. for Vancouver - Burrard, urged that the highway between Edmonton and Prince Rupert be finished and that improvements be made to the road between Prince George and Vancouver.

SIMPSON IS BADLY BEAT

Very One-Sided Score in Return Senior Basketball Game—Local Intermediates Also Win.

After losing by seven points to the very same team just one week previous at Port Simpson, Prince Rupert Savoy's turned the tables on their opponents, the Port Simpson Young People's Education Association, here Saturday night with probably the most one-sided score ever recorded in the city. Final statistics showed Savoy's 36, Port Simpson 19. This game was of no actual significance save the fact that Savoy's had promised to make an example of their opponents and did so.

Angus MacPhee, Savoy captain, was high scorer for the evening with 32 points and showed up remarkably well since this was but his second game this season. Don McIver played centre most of the evening with MacPhee on the wing position opposite Beynon and Holkestad. Every combination seemed to work to perfection for the locals as evidenced by the high score. Even though the game was very one-sided it was entertaining at times.

Intermediate Game

In an intermediate game between the Booth Memorial High School and Port Simpson Intermediates, the local team won easily by 45-23 and showed superior teamwork and shooting accuracy. This game was a repetition for the High School boys who took their opponents on the latter's home floor by one point the Saturday previous. These boys are now ready for much stronger opposition and it is expected they will be making plans in the near future to entertain Ketchikan High which defeated them so badly last winter at the Alaskan city.

In a very exciting, low scoring ladies' game the Fraser Street entry took the measure of the High School by the low score of 10-6. The girls showed their eagerness to mix things up a little by doing everything but shooting.

It was good to see interest in the ladies' department and their regular league will start this week. A surprisingly large crowd was on hand considering the cold evening.

British Blitz—SMASHED IN LIBYA

Gambut and Bardia Captured As Great Westward Swing Continues in Cirenaica Sector.

CAIRO, Nov. 24.—With Bardia and Gambut recaptured at the week-end, British blitz forces are smashing deeper into Libya in their grand offensive with violent British attacks from the Tobruk sector. Fighting rages in the hilly coastal regions. Main German forces are trapped in a triangle between Tobruk and Fort Capuzzo. They are faced with annihilation. A column of New Zealand troops has forced entry into Capuzzo. A decisive tank battle is still going on.

Big Battle On

New Campaign Against Germans and Italians in North Africa in Second Phase.

German shock troops which drove a new wedge between Moscow and Kalinin and swarmed against the Red Army's second line defences south and west of the Soviet capital put Moscow today in the most serious danger of the war. Military sources declared, however, that on the southern front, where German tanks had battered into the Don River port of Rostov, the Red Army had launched the greatest counter-attack of the war, driving the Germans back in some places as much as thirty-seven miles.

Today's official announcement from Cairo said that British forces are smashing westward into Libya and have captured the important Axis supply centre of Gambut, approximately half way to Tobruk. This success followed on the capture of Bardia—a move by which the British reached the Mediterranean to trap Axis forces entrenched along the Egyptian-Libyan border. An unofficial report said that fifteen thousand Axis prisoners had been taken up to yesterday with Axis armies battered into four separate isolated groups.

A London spokesman said that the second phase of the battle—the "defeat of the encircled army"—was now being fought. Phase one was "moving forward of armored formations to where we wanted them and the start of a shouldering movement against frontier defences." The first phase had gone extremely well but fighting now was "very hard and very confused."

New Zealand forces effected the capture of Bardia and Gambut.

NEW ROAD TO CHINA

Chungking May Put In New Artery From India As Alternative To Burma Artery

CHUNGKING, Nov. 24.—China is planning the building of a new road from India to central China. It would be an alternative to the Burma road. Construction would take six months to a year.

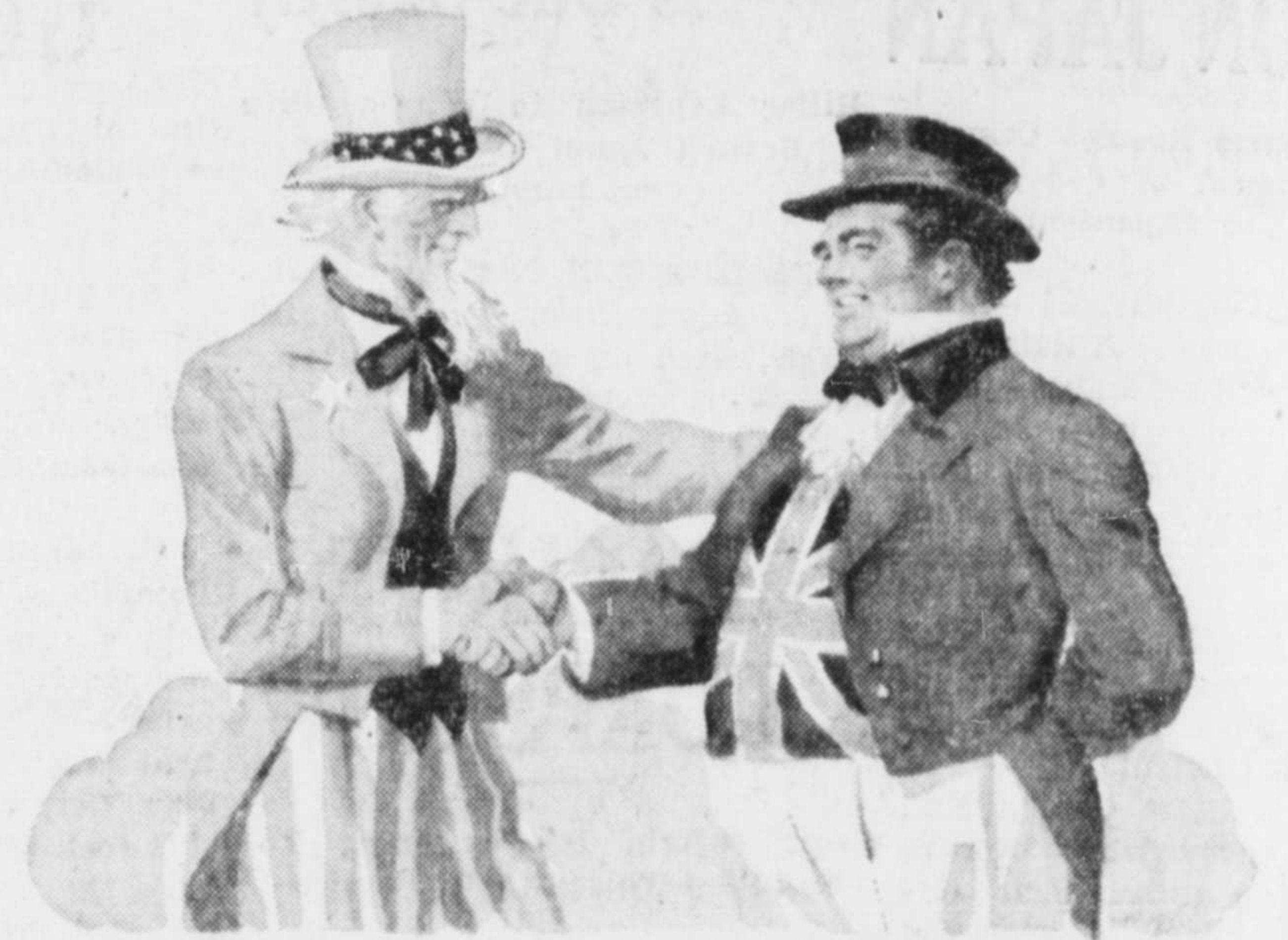

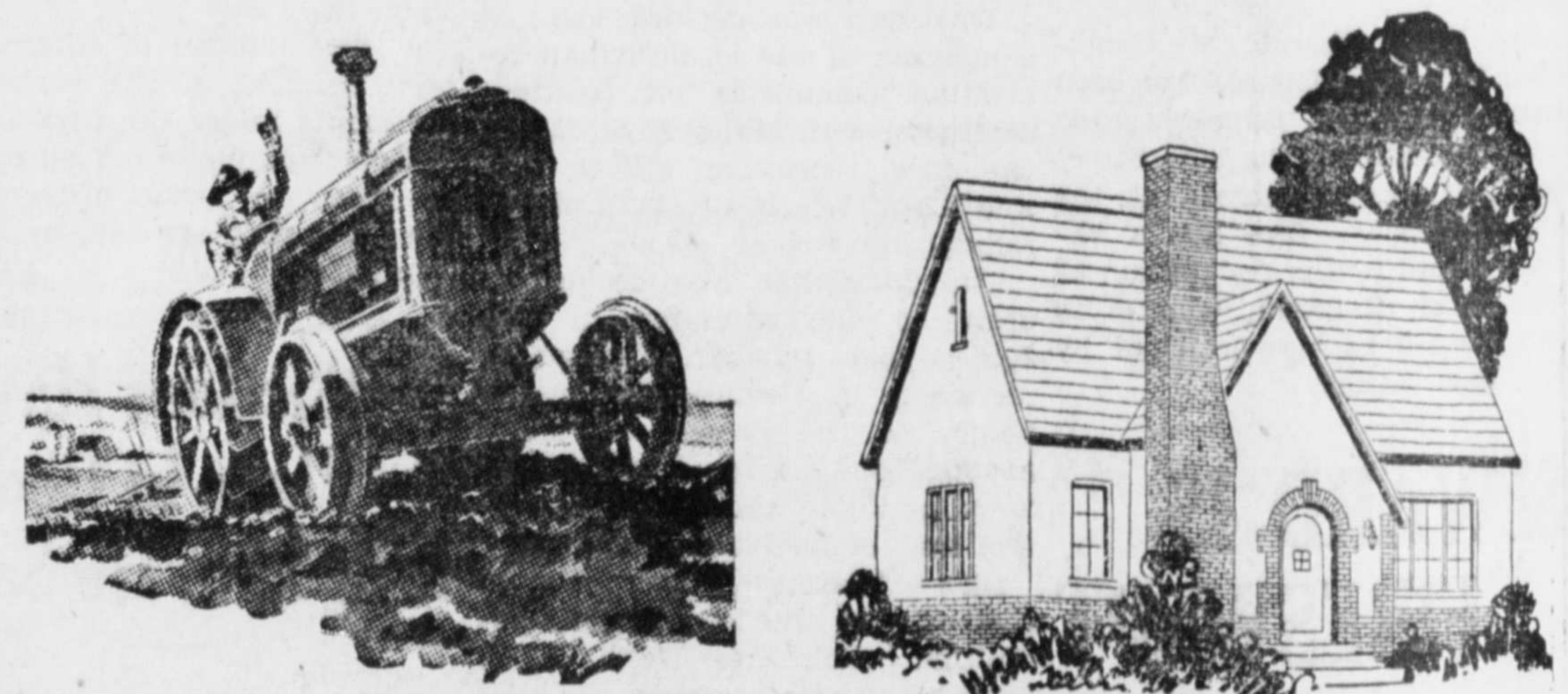

The Canadian Legion of the British Empire Service League
THE LEGION'S CALL for TOTAL WAR

Presented to the Prime Minister of Canada by the Dominion Executive Council, The Canadian Legion of the British Empire Service League, Ottawa, October 21, 1941.

The Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, P.C., C.M.G., M.A., M.P., Prime Minister of Canada.

OTTAWA.

Dear Mr. Prime Minister:—

1. In this grave hour of National Peril, the Dominion Council of The Canadian Legion has met in Ottawa for the express purpose of asking your Government to institute forthwith all necessary measures to place Canada on a "Total War" footing.

2. By "Total War" the Legion means:—

- (a) Immediate, complete and scientific mobilization organization and utilization of all our Resources—Spiritual, Intellectual, Natural, Financial Agricultural, Industrial, Manpower—in such manner that Canada may be geared to produce essential foods and munitions and to wage war to her maximum capacity;
- (b) The services of all men and women to be employed to the best and most useful effect, according to the age, training, physical capacity and ability of the individual;
- (c) By an intelligent extension of the principles contained in the National Resources Mobilization Act and by the elimination of the provisions restricting service to Canada only—our Armed Forces in Canada and overseas, including reserves and reinforcements, to be maintained at the highest possible strength, consistent with our industrial and other requirements;
- (d) An equitable division of the burden of service, sacrifice, contribution and effort amongst all our people to be the basic principle underlying this "Total War" policy;
- (e) The cumulative results of this "Total Effort" to be devoted to the single purpose of destroying the enemy.

3. The Legion advances these views supported by its 1,470 Branches and Auxiliaries across Canada, all of whom have spoken with unanimous voice at Provincial conventions held in each Province this summer. It asks in the name of those who have served and of those who are now serving. The Legion is convinced that its request represents the views of the great majority of Canadians.

4. The need is urgent. Our Russian Allies are fighting desperately, but it is folly to ignore the possibility that the full brunt of the War may soon be thrown again upon the British Commonwealth of Nations.

5. The enemy is strong and completely ruthless. He is now acquiring new resources which will make him stronger still.

Our own destruction is next in line on his program of world conquest. Powerful and unscrupulous accomplices are at hand eager to join in the kill.

6. The stark truth stands out with terrible clarity that Axis conquest means for all of us the end of civil and religious liberties, the abolition of Democracy, and in their place the iron heel of Oppression, Persecution and Slavery.

7. In previous Wars there may have existed differences of opinion regarding Canada's participation. In this War there is none. This is a titanic and fundamental struggle between the forces of good and the forces of evil. The destiny of the whole world will be governed by the outcome. We can be under no illusions as to Canada's fate if Hitler prevails.

8. Not only from a sense of loyalty and patriotism to our country, but in very preservation of our own individual lives as well as the preservation of our fellow-beings and the things we love and treasure most—our homes and families, our churches, our institutions—we know that we must now make the supreme and ultimate effort to destroy this menace before it destroys us. That is why we ask for "Total War."

9. In many ways our War Effort is commendable, and it is one in which we can take much pride, but this can afford us no sense of security. It is not "Total War." Canada's War Effort will not be "Total" until all our resources and manpower are organized and concentrated, and directed against the enemy, wherever he may be.

10. The Legion is convinced that the people of Canada will loyally endure whatever hardships and sacrifices may be involved by the introduction and application of measures necessary to this end. No financial appeal, however great, has fallen upon deaf ears. The limited Compulsory Service already introduced, and all other restrictive measures, have been generally accepted. The chief criticism is that they do not go far enough.

11. Surely it is clear that any and all future requirements will be met in the same spirit. To you, Sir, and your Government, the country looks for the lead. The Legion has already pledged its entire support of the War Effort and promises its fullest co-

operation in the introduction and application of measures necessary for "Total War."

12. We repudiate, and take as a reflection on our Quebec compatriots, the statement often heard that Canada is unable to wage "Total War" because of the reluctance or unwillingness of that Province. To our certain knowledge there are no greater or more fervent patriots in all Canada than the citizens of that great Province, whose history is so closely entwined with the history of Canada since the earliest days. With the assurance of fair and equitable division of the burden among all Canadians—with favour and privilege to none—the citizens of Quebec, we are convinced, are ready to join in all necessary measures for the annihilation of Nazism. Just as at Vimy in 1917 Canadians from all Provinces in one line advanced to glorious victory, so will they march today.

13. Let us destroy forever this falsehood that Canada cannot wage "Total War" without creating internal disunity. Canada has achieved Nationhood and her people can think and act as one; and when the issues are clear, unmistakable and urgent, they will not hesitate to do so.

14. It is frequently suggested that members of this Government are unable to concur in a "Total War" Effort because of certain political pledges given both before, and at an early stage in the conflict. The sanctity of the pledged word is to be respected. But these promises were entered into when the extent and further course of the War could at best be seen vaguely. Devastating events have since occurred. Canada now stands in deadly peril. Measures for our individual and national self-preservation, as well as for the victory of our Cause must, in The Legion's opinion, take precedence over all else.

The Legion feels it should not be necessary for the Government to labour under a handicap of this nature. It feels that a bold and courageous revision of policy, based upon changing conditions and dire and urgent need, would not only be accepted and understood by those directly affected, but would be acclaimed with enthusiasm throughout the whole nation. The implementation by your Government of a determined and uncompromising policy of "Total War" would, we are certain, evoke warm and widespread approval and would eliminate once and for all that sense of frustration now felt by so many Canadians.

The problem is one which transcends and makes it necessary to rise above all considerations of party and privilege.

15. The uncertainty of the present policy is derogatory to the Canadian War Effort. It should be removed without delay. It also has a deterrent effect upon the minds of the people of the United States, whose continued and increasing support we so sorely need. Surely our War Effort should be so complete as to be immune from criticism.

16. A "Total War" policy will not only add immeasurably to our immediate War Effort—but will also cause our country to grow in stature in the eyes of the world. Encouragement will be given to our men overseas—to the stout-hearted British people—and to our Allies. The wholehearted strength of a United Canada will have been clearly revealed.

17. The Legion reminds you, Sir, that it is an entirely non-partisan body. It represents a great cross-section of men and women throughout the country, of all classes and creeds, who have served and are still endeavouring to serve and have no concern other than the truest and best interest of our country.

18. We again emphasize that the representations herein made have the unanimous support of the Legion Commands in all nine Provinces.

19. The Legion takes this opportunity of expressing its pleasure on your safe return from your recent visit to England and of commending the physical courage you displayed under the circumstances.

20. Canada needs and is seeking a courageous, a moral and a spiritual lead. You yourself, Sir, have forcibly and repeatedly made known your own clear knowledge of the issues at stake and of the terrible dangers which lie ahead. Canada wants you to implement to the full your inspired pronouncement:—"There is only one way to meet 'TOTAL WAR' and that is by 'TOTAL EFFORT'—effort not for a day, or a week, or a month, but every day until victory is won."

21. To the Legion the tradition of Victory is ingrained and instinctive. Any other outcome is unthinkable. But by hard experience we know something of the cost of Victory in blood and effort and suffering and sacrifice. That price must now be paid again, in full. There is no escape from it. We must and can and will prevail, but only if we face facts, and meet "Total War" with "Total War." This the Legion urges and will continue to urge, with all its strength and all its sincerity.
