MARQUESS OF WILLINGDON  
FORMER GOVERNOR GENERAL  
CANADA, PASSES AWAY



HAD VARIED AND BRILLIANT CAREER

LONDON, August 12: (CP)—The Marquess of Willingdon, aged 74, former Governor General of Canada and holder of many other most important Imperial commissions including the Vice-Royship of India, died here today. Few men had more varied experience in the highest service of the King than Earl Willingdon. In his earlier years he rendered useful service as a soldier, Parliamentarian and diplomatic missioner. To these parts he added those of student and sportsman. He achieved more than ordinary success in all his endeavours, earning a sheaf of royal honors and whole-hearted approval of all citizens of the Empire with whom he came in contact. (During his tenure as Governor General of Canada, Willingdon visited Prince Rupert, winning many admirers here due to his splendid personality.)

## BIG LINER RETURNING TO NIPPON

Asama Maru Not Running Risk Of Seizure At Frisco With Rich Silk Cargo

TOKYO, August 12: (CP)—The Japanese liner Asama Maru, en route to San Francisco with a number of Americans among her passengers and a big silk cargo, has turned back toward Japan from Honolulu, Koh Ichi, cabinet information bureau spokesman, said today. The N. Y. K. luxury liner is returning home rather than run the risk of seizure should relations between Japan and the United States deteriorate. She was bound for the United States with a silk cargo valued at \$3,000,000. At Honolulu 45 American passengers left the vessel to continue home on the liner Lurline. As the Asama Maru returns to Japan there are still ninety-eight passengers on board including forty Americans. Two Japanese tankers are still at anchor off Los Angeles without the oil cargo for which they had gone to the United States.

## BIGGEST ASSAULT

Cologne Subjected To Heaviest Daylight Attack Yet Made By Royal Air Force

LONDON, August 12: —British bombers made a bold daylight attack on the big German Rhineland city of Cologne today, while other great waves of planes attacked the coast of German-occupied France. Details of the attack, the third daylight assault on Cologne, were not available immediately although later it was described by the Press Association as possibly the heaviest daylight attack yet made on Germany. The city of Cologne straddles the Rhine River and contains many vital industries. It has been raided approximately one hundred times by night. Several squadrons of Blenheim bombers were believed to have carried large cargoes of bombs to blast the Rhineland industrial area.

## Bulletins

In London there was still silence today as to the whereabouts of Prime Minister Winston Churchill and Harry L. Hopkins, United States "lease lend" director.

## Petain Yields Completely To Hitler; To Collaborate In Full With Germany Now

VICHY, August 12: (CP)— Marshal Petain, French chief of state, committed himself to full collaboration with Germany in a radio address given to the nation tonight a few hours after Vice Premier Jean Darlan was given supreme military powers in the Vichy regime.

## TO CHANGE IN POLICY

General Weygand Leaves Vichy Without Reaching Agreement

DARLAN TAKES OVER  
VICHY, August 12: — All military powers in unoccupied France are concentrated in the hands of Vice-Premier Admiral Jean Darlan in a decree drafted for publication today. It was learned, and Chief of State Marshal Henri Phillippe Petain will address the nation this evening to explain the move.

VICHY, Aug. 12.—It is considered likely that an important announcement on foreign policy will be made in the near future by the Vichy government. General Maxime Weygand has left Vichy without attending a final cabinet meeting at which territory under his charge was discussed. Weygand does not favor complete co-operation with Germany.

Admiral Jean Darlan, vice-premier, has become minister of home defence and General Charles Hunsperger Secretary of State for War. The cabinet reorganization concentrates all military powers of France in the hands of Darlan as new minister of defence. The decree gives him greater powers than any person or combination of persons except Chief of State Petain. The German controlled Paris press has lately been insistent that French and German collaboration include military as well as political and economic matters and has urged that such co-operation be extended to cover the defence of Dakar and other strategic points in French Africa.

## BEING SENT TO LONDON

Australian Cabinet Asks Menzies To Proceed There For War Council

CANBERRA, August 12: — The Australian cabinet has unanimously requested Premier Robert Menzies to proceed to London for a war council with the British government in view of the situation in the Far East.

Premier Menzies states that he will not leave until conferences have been held with all party leaders of the Commonwealth.

John Curtin, Leader of the Labor Opposition, is one of the principal advocates of Premier Menzies proceeding to London. Curtin declares that the future of this country is now at stake after two years of war during which the scene of conflict has been gradually moving closer this way. He urges speedy organization of the fighting forces on a defence basis with their disposition in the right places.

## VIOLATE FOOD LAWS

LONDON, Aug. 11: (CP)—Since start of the war more than 20,000 persons have been charged for violating food regulations. Convictions were registered in more than 19,000 cases.

## Legless Air Hero Missing

LONDON, Aug. 12: (CP)—Wing Commander Douglas Bader, 30-year-old legless English airman, who led the so-called All-Canadian squadron of the Royal Air Force through the Battle of Britain a year ago, was reported missing today. Bader personally was credited with shooting down fifteen planes.

## Shipbuilding Head Coming

H. R. MacMillan Expected in Prince Rupert Within Next Two Weeks

H. R. MacMillan, head of Wartime Merchant Shipping Ltd., Canada's government owned and operated ship corporation, which has given the contract to the Prince Rupert dry dock for construction of ten freighters, is expected to visit the city in the course of the next two weeks. Mr. MacMillan, it is expected, will inspect the local dry dock situation. He also has business on the northern trip in connection with other interests.

## SMOLENSK WIPED OUT

Once Stately Russian City is No More—Germans Evidently Making Headway Now

SMOLENSK, Russia, Aug. 12: (CP)—Smolensk, once a stately Russian city on the banks of the upper Dnieper River, has taken its place among the communities wiped out by war. An Associated Press correspondent, Alvin Stainkopf, first American newspaperman to reach this section of the central front, walked over the ashes of the ruined city which the Germans claimed to have captured July 16 although the Russians declared as recently as last week that at least some sections were still in Soviet hands. A German officer estimated that ninety per cent of Smolensk has been destroyed, declaring that most of the damage was done by Russian troops carrying out orders to destroy everything before retreating. In addition to the intense warfare in the Smolensk area, the Russians also reported fighting in another new sector south of Leningrad and seventy miles east of the Estonian frontier. Rapid progress everywhere in "pursuit of the retreating enemy in the southern Ukraine" and developments according to plan on all other sectors of the eastern front is claimed in a Nazi communique. The war bulletin thus reverted to terse generality after the voluminous claims of last week.

## Unemployment Insurance Man Is Coming Here

E. V. Whiting, relief officer at Prince George since 1935, has been appointed manager of claims at Prince Rupert for unemployment insurance and will arrive in the city this week to assume his duties. Mrs. Whiting and family will arrive later.

## War News

### MORE FORCES AT SAIGON

SAIGON, French Indo-China—Additional units of the Japanese fleet arrived at Saigon, the capital of French Indo-China, today.

### WAR IS INEVITABLE

SHANGHAI—Pointing to unmistakable signs of inevitable war in the Orient, a Shanghai newspaper today pointed to the fact that 600,000 Australians were mobilized and ready for action and that in the Philippines there have been black-outs and full defensive measures.

### R.A.F. ON OFFENSIVE

LONDON—The Royal Air Force carried out heavy raids across the English Channel during the day, dropping heavy loads of bombs after a night in the course of which there were heavy attacks on western Germany, northern France and Holland. Industrial targets in western Germany and northern France were hit and docks at Rotterdam. No British planes are reported missing. There was no German retaliation anywhere on the British Isles where not a single bomb has been dropped since early Monday morning.

### NAZI OFFENSIVE ADVANCES

LONDON—Although Russia officially makes only guarded admissions, it appeared evident here today that the new German offensive against the Soviet is making headway in the direction of Leningrad and Kiev.

### MORE BOMBERS NEEDED

LONDON—Great Britain is pressing United States to speed up on the delivery of bombers. There are plenty of pilots and crews here. The most effective way of breaking German morale and ending the war is by intense and more intense air assault. Reliable British militarists believe the time is not opportune for a land invasion of German-occupied territory.

### SECOND EAGLE SQUADRON

LONDON—A second American Eagle squadron is now co-operating with the Royal Air Force in raids against Germany.

## Nazis Launch Large Offensive Towards Leningrad and Kiev

Odessa is Also One of Main Objectives as Huns Endeavour to Take Ukraine—Intensified Military Activity

### HAVE REACHED BLACK SEA

BERLIN, August 12: (CP)—Advance units of Germany's armored divisions in the Ukraine have reached the Black Sea coast at several points, Nazi military sources claimed tonight.

LONDON, August 12: (CP)—Authoritative quarters here estimated today that a "small number of German armored forces" are about forty miles from the grain port of Nikolaev, Russian Black Sea outlet at the mouth of the Bug River. The main German drive to the Black Sea is developing from the Uman area, it was said, with the Nazis throwing full weight there while armies on the northern and central fronts hold their gains. German forces, on the way to Odessa, have crossed the Dneister River, it is admitted here.

## Killed In Air Force Accident

MONTREAL, Aug. 12: (CP)—Twenty-two men, eight from Canada, were killed in a flying accident in the United Kingdom on August 9, it was announced here today by the Royal Air Force ferry command. Seven were from the United States. The Canadian victims included Radio Operator J. B. Drake of New Westminster.

## IS NIPPON WEAKENING?

Government Said To Be Seeking Means Of Improving Relations With United States

JAPANESE THREAT  
TOKYO, Aug. 12: (CP)—The militarist daily Kokumin said today that the United States and Great Britain had been warned that any further anti-Japanese pressure by them would bring about "nothing but the worst situation" and that Japan will go ahead with grim resolve toward the establishment of her sphere in East Asia. Kokumin said in an editorial that special emphasis had been given in a warning to the United States. At the same time authoritative quarters in London declared that, "if Japan wants war in the Pacific, there will be war. If she wants peace there will be peace."

TOKYO, August 12: — It was stated today that the Japanese government was canvassing the situation with a view to the possibility of making readjustments in relations which might lead to a resumption of normal trade relations between the two countries. This follows a statement by Secretary of State Cordell Hull of the United States to the effect that there can be no improvement of relations between the two countries unless Japan is willing to submit her international problems to peaceful negotiation rather than settle them by force. Great Britain has bluntly called upon Japan to choose by her own actions between peace and war. Japan is told to stay out of Thailand and is told by Great Britain that she will alone be to blame if war comes to her shores.

## Envoy's Are In Huddle Before Big News Break

LONDON, Aug. 12: (CP)—A Reuters News Agency dispatch from Tokyo in which it was stated "important developments" were expected shortly did not say what was expected but linked the prediction with the return to the city of the United States and British ambassadors who, apparently, have been away for a long week-end.

Conscription . . .

The Victoria Times discusses conscription in a practical way as follows:

"Resolutions demanding conscription for the most part are phrased in generalities and some of them—by no means all—are more marked for their political implications than for an apparent desire to discuss the matter objectively. Would it not now be possible, therefore, for the statisticians at Ottawa to publish a simple analysis of Canada's manpower and the maximum number of men that could be drawn into the armed forces of the nation without jeopardizing present and potential contractual obligations, other requirements of the war effort, or those services essential to our national life?"

"The Bureau of Public Information tells us in its latest issue of Canada's War Record that by the end of March next year approximately 575,000 men will be in the uniforms of the armed forces. Several able Ottawa correspondents already have broken down in considerable detail the statistics obtained from the results of the National Registration undertaken by the Dominion last August. But the average individual may not have grasped their significance or has not taken the trouble to try to understand what they mean. He would like to know, for the sake of argument, how many men Canada requires for the essential war industries and services directly related to the war effort; what is the number required for the production of the irreducible minimum quantity and variety of consumer goods; how many are required, in short, for: 1, the farms; 2, the factories; 3, the mines; 4, the fisheries; 5, the forests; 6, for the varied rural and urban activities indirectly involved in the war effort; 7, how many at present in uniform would be rendering better war service were they in industry instead of in uniform."

"To proceed with the argument further: After these statistics have been worked out and tabulated in simple form, how many men would there be left, as potential selectees under some form of compulsory military service, between, say, the ages of 18 and 25, 30, 35, 40 and up to 55 in graduations of five? What would be the potential surplus of nonessential manpower labor? How would the ever-expanding industrial effort affect this potential volume, and to what extent? In other words, is the government yet in a position to say how many men comprising such surplus could be drawn into the armed forces by law, say, in the next six, 12 or 18 months? If it is, the sooner the Canadian people are given such information, the sooner would this discussion be lifted from the academic realm into that of practical policy."

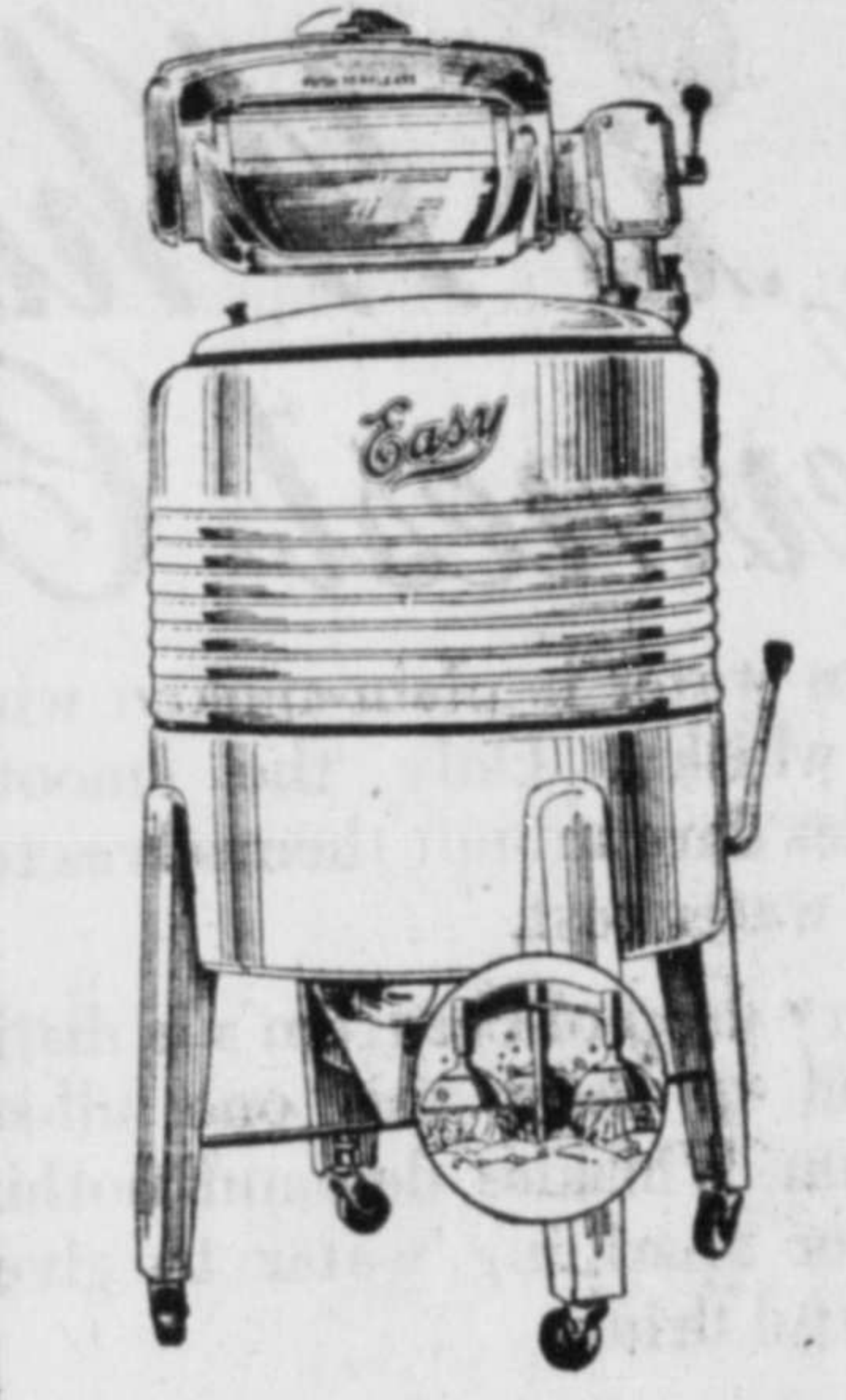

Left hand hitters are leading both leagues at bat, Ted Williams in the American and Pete Reiser in the National. Joe DiMaggio of the Yankees is the only right hand hitter among the top five sluggers.

Old John Cooney of the Boston Braves is the lone right hander among the big five National loop batters.

#### Pace Setters

As the August campaign began, Williams of Boston, DiMaggio, Cecil Travis of Washington, Jeff Heath of Cleveland and Roy Cullenbine of St. Louis were the American league pace setters while Reiser of Brooklyn, Cooney, Nick Etten of the Phillies, and Enos Slaughter, John Hopp and Johnny Mize of the Cardinals were out front in the National.

For the past decade the National League has been a left hander's circuit and the American League a right hander's. And by the same margin. Left handers have won the National League batting championship seven times in 10 years, while right handers have won the American league honors seven times.

#### Remember These?

Chick Hafey, 1931; Joe Medwick, 1937, and Ernie Lombardi, 1938, were the National League right handers who won the hitting crowns. Frank O'Dould, 1932, Chuck Klein, 1933, Paul Waner, 1934 and 1936, Floyd Vaughan, 1935, Mize, 1936, and Debs Garms, 1940, were the portsideers.

Lou Gehrig, 1934, Buddy Myer, 1935, and Charles Gehringer, 1937, were the left handers who won the American League championship in that period. Al Simmons, 1931, Dale Alexander, 1932, Jimmy Fox, 1935 and 1938, Luke Appling, 1936, and Joe DiMaggio 1939-40 were the right handers.

Mize in the National and DiMaggio in the American are the only former champions who are making much of a serious fight for this year's crown.

MELBOURNE, Australia, August 12:—A car that bends in the middle when rounding corners has been invented by Cornelius Murnane of Melbourne. It is 8 feet long, 4 feet wide and will do 60 miles to the gallon. Driven by a 7 horse power two stroke engine it can travel at 50 miles an hour.

Great Armies of Men, Women and Boys Begin Gathering in Record Yields

LONDON, Aug. 12: (P)—A mighty army of men, women and boys have begun to harvest Great Britain's biggest crops in history. Four million new arable acres will yield their harvest this summer in addition to millions of acres of regular

crop lands growing corn, wheat and hay.

Most of the harvesting will fall to the skilled men whose callup was postponed until at least the fall, but the Minister of Agriculture expects to be able to draw upon an additional 30,000 to 50,000 hands.
