Program Of Road Work For Prince Rupert; Improving Of Prince Rupert Highway

Before leaving for the south last night Premier T. D. Pattullo announced a program of roadwork in Prince Rupert constituency for this year. The Northern Trans-Provincial Highway will be re-surfaced for about five miles out and several curves will be straightened or widened.

Other projects include work at Port Simpson, Oona River, Jap Inlet, Dodge Cove Trail, Salt Lake trails and Osland.

On Queen Charlotte Islands a considerable program of improvements will be undertaken on the Queen Charlotte City-Port Clements road, including elimination of planks and construction of solid road bed. Work will be started on the road between Port Clements and Massett. At Massett several sections will be improved between New Massett and the cannery at Old Massett and also between Massett and Tow Hill.





Justifies New Report Cards

Inspector Of Schools Asks Teachers And Parents To Be Receptive Modern Ideas

During these years of educational expansion, dissatisfaction grew with the old methods of reporting pupils' progress and a great deal of study was made by prominent educationalists to construct report cards which would be consistent with the multiplicity of subjects studied and with modern methods of instruction, said Inspector of Schools Alex Turnbull in addressing the Prince Rupert Parent-Teachers' .. Association .. Wednesday night. Some of the earliest of these studies discovered serious faults in the old method of reporting by means of percentage marks and rankings based on such marks. Experiments recorded in both America and England, for all COMEDY of which there is documentary of which there is documentary LONDON, Feb. 21: (CP)- The evidence, showed extreme variabilway from 64 to 98. One hundred and eighteen teachers graded a geometry paper all the way from 28 to 92. In some cases the element of fatigue caused a teacher marking a large set of papers in one evening to vary his standard of marking considerably. On the whole these experiments proved that the old system of marking with "passing" or "failing" marks was influenced to a high degree by unpredictable personal equations from one teacher to the next, all using a set of arbitrary values. each unrelated to the other. Coupled with the o'd system of marks was the method of comparative ranking which had many objectionable features. Too many parents were concerned with nothing

but their child's mark in class.

Old System Weak To offset the weakness inherent in the old system of assigning arbitrary values use was made of the normal curve of distribution. At this juncture. Mr. Turnbull explained what was meant by the normal curve of distribution and how it was applied to give better grade ratings which to a large extent reduced the former variable factors in grading.
