Lindbergh Is Before Committee

Negotiated Peace Is Preferred By Flier; Invasion Impossible

Does Not Think Either Side Can Win War — Western Hemisphere is Well Able to Defend Itself, He Believes

WASHINGTON, D.C., January 23: (CP)—Col. Charles A. Lindbergh asserted his belief today that a combination of the United States and Great Britain could not win the war "on the present basis" and urged what he called a "negotiated peace." The famous flier told the United States House of Representatives foreign affairs committee that he did not believe anything "short of war or beyond war" would win the struggle unless there was collapse behind the lines on one side or the other.

Britisher Is Shot By Jap

SHANGHAI, January 23 (Canadian Press)—W. J. Keswick, British chairman of the Shanghai municipal council, and two Japanese council officials were slightly wounded today in a shooting precipitated by Japanese disapproval of a council vote. Y. Hayashi, Japanese union official, was taken in custody after spectators said he was seen to jump on the platform at the meeting with a pistol in his hand.

PRISONERS IN CANADA

German Fliers and U-Boat Men Landed—Sullen and Bothersome Lot

TWO MAKE ESCAPE AT AN EAST CANADIAN PORT. Jan. 23: (CP)—Two German prisoners escaped after arrival here yesterday from England for internment in prison camps in Canada. One was recaptured a few hours later but the other is still at large.

AT AN EAST COAST CANADIAN PORT, Jan. 23.—Hundreds of German airmen captured in the Battle of Britain together with a few members of U-boat crews were disembarked here yesterday from England and were speedily whisked off by special train for inland internment camps there to remain for the duration of the war. Most of them were of the usual stolid, sullen appearing type although a few grinned. Their guards described them as a bothersome lot, not causing serious trouble but grumbling continually. Special guards were attached to their train to ensure against any of them escaping. For those whose own clothing was not adequate, heavy mackinaws and underwear were provided.

Nazi Ace Among Them A high-ranking Nazi flier—apparently Major Helmuth Wick whose loss was reported by the Germans on December 4—was among the German prisoners. Officials did not name the pilot but it was learned he was one of three credited by the Nazis with highest scores in downed planes. Other details also fitted Wick's description. As the huge consignment of German officers and men moved away from seaboard, officials revealed they were the bulk of the German air force which had been brought down safely over England up to the time of sailing.

CONFERENCE IN BERLIN

VERY QUIET IN ENGLAND

Little Air Activity on Part of Enemy Is Reported—Alarm Today But No Bombs

LONDON, Jan. 23.—Although Nazi planes were reported roaring over East Anglia just before midnight last night apparently bound for interior points, no serious raids developed in Britain and for London it was another quiet night.

Early today there was an air raid alarm in London but no bombs were dropped. The striking hard at the Dusseldorf area in the Ruhr Valley during the night followed up on fighter assaults yesterday on objectives in Nazi-occupied France. Two daylight machine gun raids splattered German aircraft with lead and peppered troops and ground defence forces.

BRITAIN IS INVINCIBLE

Spirit Cannot Be Beaten, Declares Col. Ralston—Canadian Troops In Fine Fettle

OTTAWA, Jan. 23.—"The spirit of the people of the Island Fortress cannot be beaten," declared Hon. J. L. Ralston, minister of national defence, following his return from a six weeks' visit to the British Isles. "They never falter," said Col. Ralston "even under bombs, fire, destruction and death." The minister also had high praise for the Canadian military forces "over there," also the naval and airmen.

VANCOUVER, Jan. 23: (CP)—Mrs. Amelia Pillsbury, aged 64, one of Prince Rupert's early pioneer women, passed away here last night following a collapse. She was the wife of J. H. Pillsbury, a pioneer engineer of Prince Rupert harbor and townsite and now a commissioner of the Workmen's Compensation Board. Six years ago she moved from Prince Rupert to Vancouver to take up residence.

There will be general sympathy for the well known and highly esteemed family. The daughters are Mrs. H. L. (Katherine) Keenleyside, Ottawa; Mrs. Richard (Lucy) Van Cleeve, Seattle; Mrs. Ronald (Alice) Prosser, Kelowna, and Nursing Sister Amelia Pillsbury, Esquimalt. The son, Richard, is in Vancouver.

R.A.F. IN GERMANY

Attacks on Naziland Are Resumed in Spite of Unfavorable Weather

LONDON, Jan. 23.—In spite of bad weather, Royal Air Force bombing planes again attacked targets in western Germany and occupied France last night with marked success. The industrial city of Dusseldorf was heavily hit with large explosions and fires as a result of a two and a half hour attack on the industrial area. Airdromes in Nazi-occupied France were also attacked.

MOPPING UP AT TOBRUK

British Forces Getting Ready to Advance Further West From Newly Captured Stronghold

CAIRO, Jan. 23: (CP)—Australian advance forces penetrated the last defences around the harbor and town of Tobruk yesterday morning and entered the town at noon. British dispatches from the front said. The British, also assisted by Free French forces, are now in complete control.

Mopping up operations are now proceeding with a view to consolidating for a continuation of the drive westward through Libya and along the coast towards Bomba and Derna, the next objectives.

Already 14,000 prisoners are counted at Tobruk and the number will probably reach 20,000 or 30,000. Three generals and an admiral are among the captured.

Four generals and an admiral are among the captured. British casualties were less than five hundred. British headquarters today officially announced that the capture of Tobruk had been completed last night and that more than fourteen thousand prisoners had been taken. The communique said that the prisoners included four generals, one corps commander, another divisional commander and an admiral. The British casualties were less than five hundred.

Isolated Italian units are being mopped up west of Tobruk which capitulated after a 36-hour frontal assault following a sixteen-day siege. The siege was very similar in tactics to that of Bardia which lasted twenty-five days.

Capture of the port—best harbor between Alexandria and Tunis—gives the British forces undisputed control of eighty miles of Libyan coastline and an ideal base from which to continue the westward drive.

The British were firmly established today overlooking the harbor. Two hundred guns and other materials were captured by the British in the fall of Tobruk.

RUMANIAN POSITION CRITICAL

Reports as to Actual Internal Situation in That Troubled Balkan Country

CONFLICTING CLAIMS BUDAPEST, Jan. 23: (CP)—The Rumanian government, it was claimed today in Budapest, had quelled the "communist rebellion" after many persons had been killed. Diplomatic sources at Sofia, however, expressed belief that disorders were still in progress. Rome heard that the Rumanian vice-Premier and head of the Iron Guards had issued an order to his followers to cease all disturbances in view of negotiations being under way between the Antonescu government and the Iron Guards to clarify the situation.

BEGRAD, Jan. 23.—There are conflicting reports as to the internal situation in Rumania where a civil war is said to be in progress with Iron Guards opposing continuation of Premier Ion Antonescu's regime. The situation appears to be very complicated. On the one hand it is reported that Antonescu, as a result of having assumed a virtual military dictatorship, has to a large extent quelled serious uprisings. Other reports say that an army corps has gone over to the Iron Guards and is marching upon Bucharest.

Rebels would, it is said, wrest Transylvania back from Hungary and are organized there to do so.

Reports vary as to whether the post-office, railway station, radio station and other important establishments in Bucharest are under control of the government or the Iron Guards.

Some reports say that thousands have been killed and injured in street fighting. The United States minister to Bucharest, in a long distance conversation to Washington got as far as saying that "the situation at this moment in Bucharest is critical" when communication was cut off. Iron Guard leaders are said to have left for Berlin to consult with Nazi authorities.

This might be a bad sign for Antonescu. King Michael and his mother, Princess Helene, have attempted to flee the country but were unable to obtain transportation.

CANNOT BE BOLSTERED

Heavy Reinforcements Fail to Put Italian Forces in Winning Form in Albania

ATHENS, Jan. 23.—Notwithstanding the fact that eighteen new Italian divisions have been injected as reinforcements, four heavy Fascist counter-attacks in Albania against the Greeks have failed. In the Tepelini sector an entire convoy of one hundred Italian trucks was caught in a mountain pass and destroyed. First a rock slide was sent down in front of it and then it was bombed. In the same area hundreds of Italian prisoners were taken.

EDITORIAL

Conservative Leader's Views - - -

Mr. R. B. Hanson, premier leader of the Conservative party in Canada, speaking at Toronto, said the Harris Commission went beyond its jurisdiction when it made the report over which there has recently been so much controversy. He said the commission was never authorized by the government to write a new constitution for Canada. It was merely a fact-finding body. He thought it was a decision for any government to delegate to any commission the task of setting up a new constitution for a country.

Fall Of Tobruk - - -

The little port of Tobruk was not very important militarily. It was used as a supply base for the Italian army in northwest Africa. It became important because of that fact and because it was one of the fortified points on the coast. There are several other centres that have to be taken before the Italians are driven out of north Africa.

Australians Again - - -

Australian troops again took a leading part in the clearing of Tobruk. They, alongside a picked British regiment, led the way and they were well supported by air and naval forces. It is one more instance of the solidarity of the Empire in this war and the value of Australia as one of the component parts of the Empire.

Turkey On The Move - - -

Turkish troops are evidently on the move. They are being transferred nearer to the scene of possible warfare. They are being used to strengthen the defences of European Turkey and may have to move farther north yet if the breathless Germans do not stop in time.

The Greeks are still forcing the Italians out of Albania in spite of the strengthening of the Italian air force by German planes.

Departing Gloom - - -

Prime Minister Churchill has talked very bluntly to the people of Britain. He has not tried to deceive them by misrepresentation of any kind. Often he has been looked upon as the apostle of gloom and his "Blood and Tears" speech seemed to indicate that. Now he is assuming a more cheerful aspect. He says: "This great nation is getting into its stride." He sees the time near at hand when Britain will take the offensive on land as it has already done in the air. He says the nation is already making preparations for this move. It is a cheerful note and one we all delight to hear.
