Vancouver and Back from Prince Rupert in a Hundred Hours with Heavy Freight Calls at Way Ports Included.

Arriving at Vancouver on Monday evening at 7 o'clock, she remained there only seven hours before setting sail for her return trip north. After calling at Union Bay again and taking on 300 tons more coal, she arrived in Prince Rupert at 6:30 yesterday (Wednesday) evening.


