Britons Endure It—

BATTLE OF PURSE IN OLD LAND

Engage Attention on All Fronts— 28 Percent Jump in Living Cost.

LONDON, Oct. 23: (CP)—Life on the home front for many Britons today has become a stern struggle against the rising tide of prices. The ministry of labor, which keeps a careful monthly check on price trends, estimated the cost of living rose approximately 28 percent between the outbreak of war in September, 1939, and July 1, 1941.

The battle of the pocket book is being waged in every household. The food that is eaten, the clothes that are worn, the domestic necessities that are bought, all cost considerably more than two years ago. The government has controlled the prices of many commodities, particularly foods, but these prices in nearly every case are substantially above the pre-war level.

Sharpest increase has been in clothes prices. Ministry of Labor figures show that last July 1 the retail price of clothes of the type usually bought by working class families was 80 percent above the level of Sept. 1, 1939. Thanks largely to government control food prices were only about 21 percent above the levels prevailing in peacetime.

Fuel Prices Mount
Fuel and light prices were 25 percent higher on the average. Coal went up 21 percent, gas about 23 percent, lamp oil, candles and matches about 27 percent.

The ministry of labor explained about 1 1/2 percent of the increases were due to higher taxes on sugar, tobacco, cigarettes and matches and some three percent due to the purchase tax which came into operation in the autumn of 1940.

Conservative Leader Suggests That Three Parties Form Union Government.

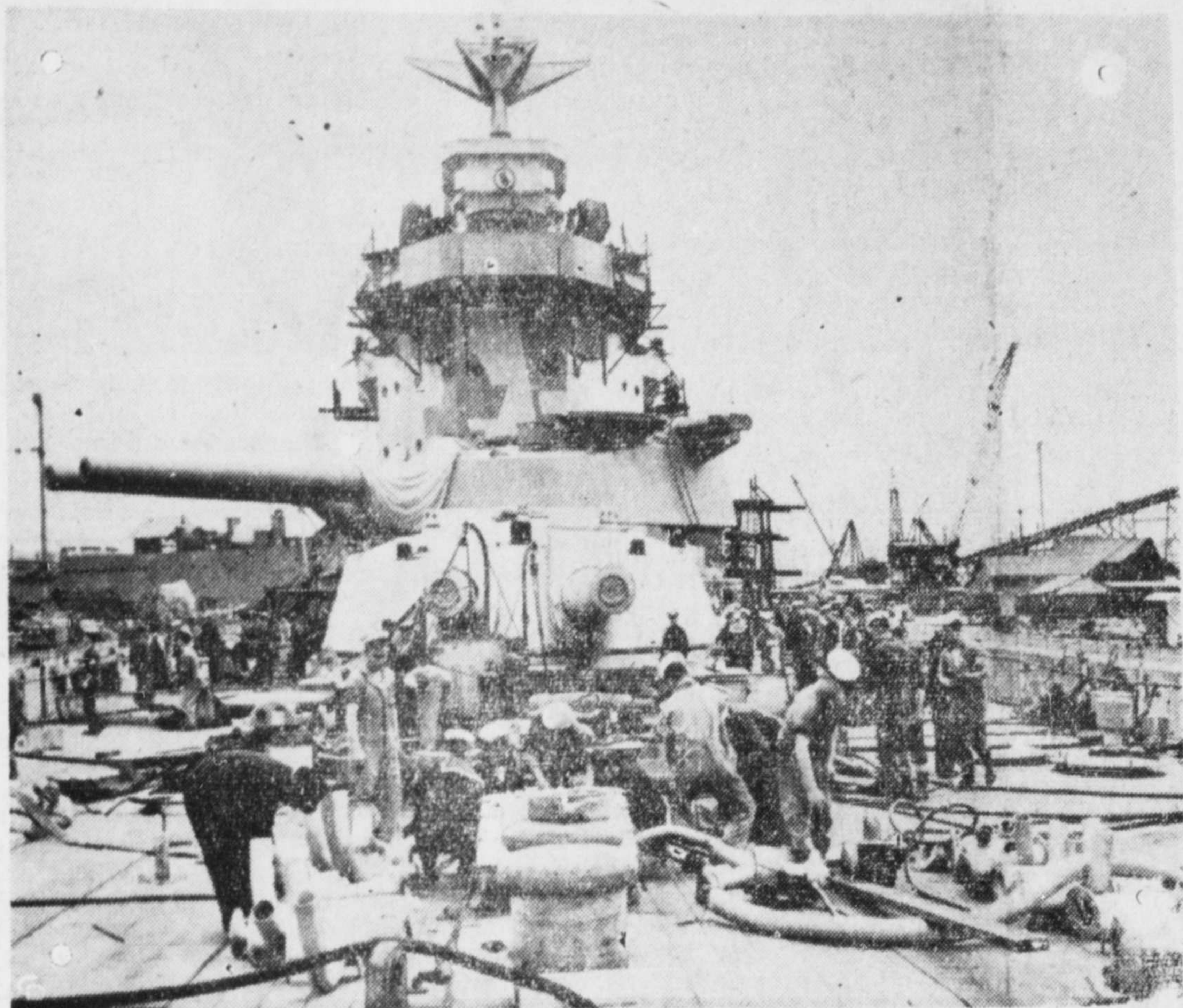
VANCOUVER, Oct. 23: (CP)—R. L. Maitland, K.C., Conservative leader, today issued a statement suggesting the establishment of a union government of Conservatives, Liberals and Co-operative Commonwealth Federation. He said that an opportunity was now offered for the parties to put into practice their declaration that "achievement of maximum war effort is the principal concern of the province and country as a whole."

Premier Pattullo did not comment and Harold Winch said he was calling a meeting of the C.C.F. legislative group today.

N. S. STANDS BY TWO OLD PARTIES IN POLITICS AT ELECTION NEXT WEEK

Some History of Elections in Coast Province Going to Polls Oct. 29.

HALIFAX, Oct. 23: (CP)—Strength of Liberalism almost consistently since 1867, the year of Canada's confederation, Nova Scotia goes to the polls Oct. 29 to elect its 18th legislative assembly. With the exception of the periods 1878-82 and 1925-33, when the Conservatives were in power, Liberal governments have always directed the political affairs of Nova Scotia, as a province.

At dissolution of the 18th legislature Premier A. S. MacMillan had the support of 22 members. The Conservatives under Leonard W. Fraser had five seats; Douglas McDonald of Cape Breton Centre was the lone representative of the Co-operative Commonwealth Federation and there were two vacancies.

Two of the 18 counties in the province—Halifax and Cape Breton—are divided into five ridings each. Four others—Colchester, Cumberland, Lunenburg and Pictou—each have two representatives while the other constituencies each constitute a single riding.

For 43 years before Hon. E. N. Rhodes, Conservative, later Canadian Minister of Finance, became premier in 1925 in the wake of a violent strike in the Cape Breton coal fields, Liberal regimes had held office.

Some Traditions

Nova Scotian elections have spawned two traditions. One is that which causes many to vote as their grandparents did, for Howe, Liberalism and against confederation; or for Tupper, Conservatism and confederation.

The other is the tendency of urban populations to vote Conservative and rural people to favor Liberal. However, heavy Liberal majorities in the last two legislatures have done much to shatter this tradition.

The first house, after confederation, sat Jan. 30, 1868, under Liberal Premier William Annand. He had become premier the previous November upon the resignation of Hon. H. Blanchard who had formed

a government on July 4, 1867, in opposition to confederation in which Nova Scotia entered under the leadership of Sir Charles Tupper.

Leader of the anti-confederatists before this event was Joseph Howe, but, like Tupper, he never sat in the provincial house after 1867. When Blanchard formed his government, Howe was in England trying to have Nova Scotia removed from the Dominion and restored to colonial status by London.

Howe changed his views a few years later and served under Sir John A. MacDonald in the federal cabinet. Just before his death, he became lieutenant-governor of Nova Scotia. The agitation against confederation was continued, however, by his former supporters until the Liberals were defeated in 1878.

Conservatives remained in power until 1882 under S. H. Holmes and J. S. D. Thompson who later became prime minister of Canada. At that time, Sir Charles Tupper, the Conservative leader in confederation days, was active in federal politics. Like Thompson, he became Canadian prime minister for a short time, in 1896.

From 1882 to 1925, Liberals held sway at Halifax under premiers W. T. Pipes, W. S. Fielding, later federal minister of finance, G. H. Murray and E. H. Armstrong. Then came the Conservative regimes of Rhodes and G. S. Harrington.

In 1933, Angus L. Macdonald smashed an eight-year Conservative dynasty and restored Liberal rule. He was returned in 1937 and when he was called to Ottawa in 1940 to become minister of defence for naval affairs, A. Stirling MacMillan became premier.

DEMAND M.P. QUIT

LEISTON, ENG., Oct. 23: (CP)—The local Constitutional Club has demanded the resignation of Edgar Granville, Liberal National M.P. for Eye because he crossed the house to sit in opposition.

The case of Mrs. Victoria Pedersen, charged under Defence of Canada Regulations, has been adjourned until next Monday.

Tokyo Gives Last Chance

TOKYO, Oct. 23: (CP)—Japanese newspapers today gave Great Britain and the United States their "last chance" to use Japan as an intermediary in the European war or risk "chaos in the Pacific." The Japanese press accused United States of trying to get bases in Siberia which they said "belongs to Asia."

RESULT IN PR. RUPERT

Four Isolated Polls Still Remain To Be Heard From

Reporting twelve votes for Premier T. D. Pattullo, Liberal, and sixteen for George Weaver, C. C. F., Digby Island yesterday afternoon sent in its returns for Tuesday's provincial election. This morning Wark Channel came in with six for Pattullo and one for Weaver. The total vote to date, with forty-two out of forty-six polls accounted for, is: Pattullo, 1607; Weaver, 1527.

In yesterday's tabulation an error made Wark Channel read 24 for Pattullo and 28 for Weaver. Instead these figures were for absentee to date, Cumsheva Inlet, Limestone Island, Oona River and Sewell Inlet have yet to be heard from.

RHINELAND IS RAIDED

LONDON, Oct. 23: (CP)—British planes raided the Rhineland, including the industrial centre of Mannheim, and also attacked docks in German-occupied French ports last night. Five planes are missing.

LATEST ELECTION RETURNS

The latest election standing for British Columbia shows 29 seats for the Liberals, 14 for the C.C.F., 10 for the Conservatives, and one for Labor. With four small polls remaining to be heard from the majority for Premier T. D. Pattullo in Prince Rupert stands at eighty.

AMERICANS MISSING

WASHINGTON — A lifeboat from the American freighter Bold Venture, sunk by a German torpedo, is still missing with nineteen men on board. Another lifeboat landed crew members on Iceland.

LEASE-LEND PROGRESS

WASHINGTON—Organized opposition to the United States administration's \$5,985,000,000 lend-lease bill collapsed in the senate yesterday and its proponents predicted its speedy approval this week.

WAGE BOARD

OTTAWA — Machinery being set up under the new compulsory wage policy of the Dominion is such that disputes will be dealt with by regional boards and, if necessary, by the National War Labor Board, Labor Minister Norman McLarty said yesterday.

TOM MOORE CRITICAL

OTTAWA—Tom Moore, president of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada, said "it was incomprehensible" that Canadian workers had not been given the fullest opportunity to express their views on the federal wage and price stabilization program before final action was taken. Mr. Moore said that, both its terms and the manner of its introduction, the government program "is the longest step yet taken by any democracy towards the establishment of a totalitarian state."

MOVE AGAINST AXIS

TEHRAN, Iran.—A week-end decision by the government of Afghanistan to expel all German and Italian nationals closed the last remaining gap in the 2000-mile political and military front which Britain has built across southwestern Asia.

CANNOT BE SEPARATED

BERLIN—A German spokesman expressed strong resentment yesterday at remarks by United States Assistant Secretary of State Breckenridge Long, on alleged German intentions toward Italy and said it was a "lowdown trick to intimate Germany and Italy ever could be separated."

HELP TO RUSSIA

HYDE PARK, N.Y.—A conference on help for Russia was held by President Roosevelt yesterday with W. Averill Harriman, head of the mission to Moscow, and Harry Hopkins, supervisor of lease-lend operations.

CLOSED HEARINGS

WASHINGTON—With opponents crying "gag rule," the United States senate foreign relations committee voted 12 to 9 Tuesday to hold closed hearings, beginning yesterday, on the house-approved ship arming bill.

AFTER THAT, WHAT?

Defence of Moscow Is Tightened; To Be Made Into Another 'Verdun'

"Twenty to One They Will Never Take It This Winter," Says London Authority in Commenting on Situation of Capital.

LONDON, Oct. 23: (CP)—General Gregory K. Zhukov has supplanted Marshal Semeon Timoshenko in supreme command of the western zone of the Russian army, it was disclosed today, and his forces were credited with already having tightened Moscow's defence despite admitted numerical superiority of German tanks and infantry being hurled in mass assaults at the approaches to the city. There was no report of a new post for Timoshenko.

In Berlin Chancellor Hitler's headquarters claimed today that German forces have broken through the outer defences of Moscow from the southwest and west, spearheads having reached a point about thirty-eight miles from the Russian capital.

In London it was reported that strong German forces were striking hard to the southeast in Russia, punching for a soft spot through which to launch a drive for the oil-rich Caucasus. This was declared by an informed British source. He said that the Russians were turning Moscow into another Verdun and the Germans were finding the going increasingly hard on the central front, adding "it is twenty to one they will never take Moscow this winter."

Plane of Royal Force in Crash

GREAT VILLAGE, N.S., Oct. 23: (CP)—A flaming Royal Air Force training plane, which crashed here today, brought almost instant death to four British airmen operating the craft.

Election Echoes

The vote at Terrace in Tuesday's provincial election was 219 for E. T. Kenney, Liberal, and 119 for W. J. O'Neill, Conservative. Copper City voted 16 for Kenney and 7 for O'Neill. Little Canyon nine for Kenney and one for O'Neill, and Kwintsa seven for Kenney and four for O'Neill. Sixteen out of 74 polls in Skeena gave Kenney 701 and O'Neill 469.

In Omineca 28 out of 38 polls gave M. M. Connelly, Liberal, 700; A. K. Hemstreet, Conservative, 237, and W. Menzies, C.C.F., 435.

The latest word from Fort George, 24 out of 40 polls, showed H. G. Perry, Liberal, with 942 votes; A. McB. Young, Conservative, 275, and J. H. Penberthy, C.C.F., 676.

War News

NAVY PERSONNEL DOUBLED

LONDON—The Admiralty disclosed yesterday that the Royal Navy had more than doubled itself in personnel in the last 18 months. The announcement added that tens of thousands of men and boys from every trade and profession have joined the service.

ARMENIANS TO FIGHT

DAMASCUS, Syria.—The Armenian community informed the government of Syria today it had organized a league to fight against Germany on the side of Russia and her allies.

AXIS SHIPS TORPEDOED

LONDON—The Admiralty announced a British submarine had torpedoed two Libya-bound axis supply ships in a convoy. Another submarine was credited in the same communique with shelling an airdrome at Cirenaica in Libya.

AURANIA SUNK

BERLIN—Berlin claims that Nazi U-boats sunk four vessels in a British convoy including the transport ship Aurania, formerly of the White Star Line.

FRENCH ASSASSINATIONS

LONDON—The British radio yesterday referred to the futility of the French assassinating German officers. They would be better to concentrate on sabotage. This was after Marshal Petain called on Frenchmen to cease killing German officers in order to prevent reprisals on hostages.

ENGLAND IS BOMBED

LONDON—German bombers last night attacked the Midlands, East Anglia and points along the Mersey.

Don't Be Too Sure . . .

The result of the provincial election proves that it is a mistake to be sure about anything. At least two local organizations were very sure of the outcome of the poll this week. Neither had cause to be cocksure.

It is usually when electors get the habit of winning and cease to be keen on winning that defeat comes. When J. C. Brady was elected here as member at Ottawa, the Liberals felt sure of winning—too sure to do anything—and at the next federal election the confidence of Brady caused the loss of the seat to the Conservatives.

Nelson's Prayer . . .

This week saw the anniversary of the Battle of Trafalgar and the death of Admiral Lord Nelson. His prayer for victory just before going into battle is looked upon not only as a model prayer but as a model of literary effort. It was:

"May the great God, whom I worship, grant to my country and, for the benefit of Europe in general, a great and glorious victory. May no misconduct in anyone tarnish it and may humanity after victory be the predominant feature in the British fleet. For myself, individually, I commit my life to Him, and may His blessing alight on my endeavors for serving my country faithfully. To Him I resign myself and the just cause which is entrusted me to defend."

Too Many Rats . . .

Now that the elections are over it might be well to consider what is to be done about the local rats. The city seems to be overrun with them. Not only are they a nuisance to businessmen and residents but they are a grave danger to the health of the community. As colder weather comes on, the rats move into the basements or else insinuate themselves beneath the foundations or into any place that is warm. What seems to be needed is a concerted movement toward eradicating the pests.

LONDON IS DESIGNING

War-Blitzed Britain Has Time to Talk 1942 Spring and Summer Prints.

LONDON, Oct. 23: (P)—Two scarves which Dorothy Thompson, American columnist, took back to the United States after visiting Britain will be shown in the London Style Designers' Export collections which open in New York in November.

One scarf, called "Happy Landings," is as blue as the sky and has the wings and emblems of the Royal Air Force and catch phrases engraved across it. The other scarf is dedicated to Free French naval forces and carries the French emblems and the cross of Lorraine.

One version of the "Happy Landings" silk print has been kept only for export because of the modesty of Britain's airmen. The print includes the words of Premier Churchill: "Never was so much owed by so many to so few." The wives and fiancées of airmen, said they could not wear a silk print with those words on the design because men of the Royal Air Force would consider them a form of self-advertisement.

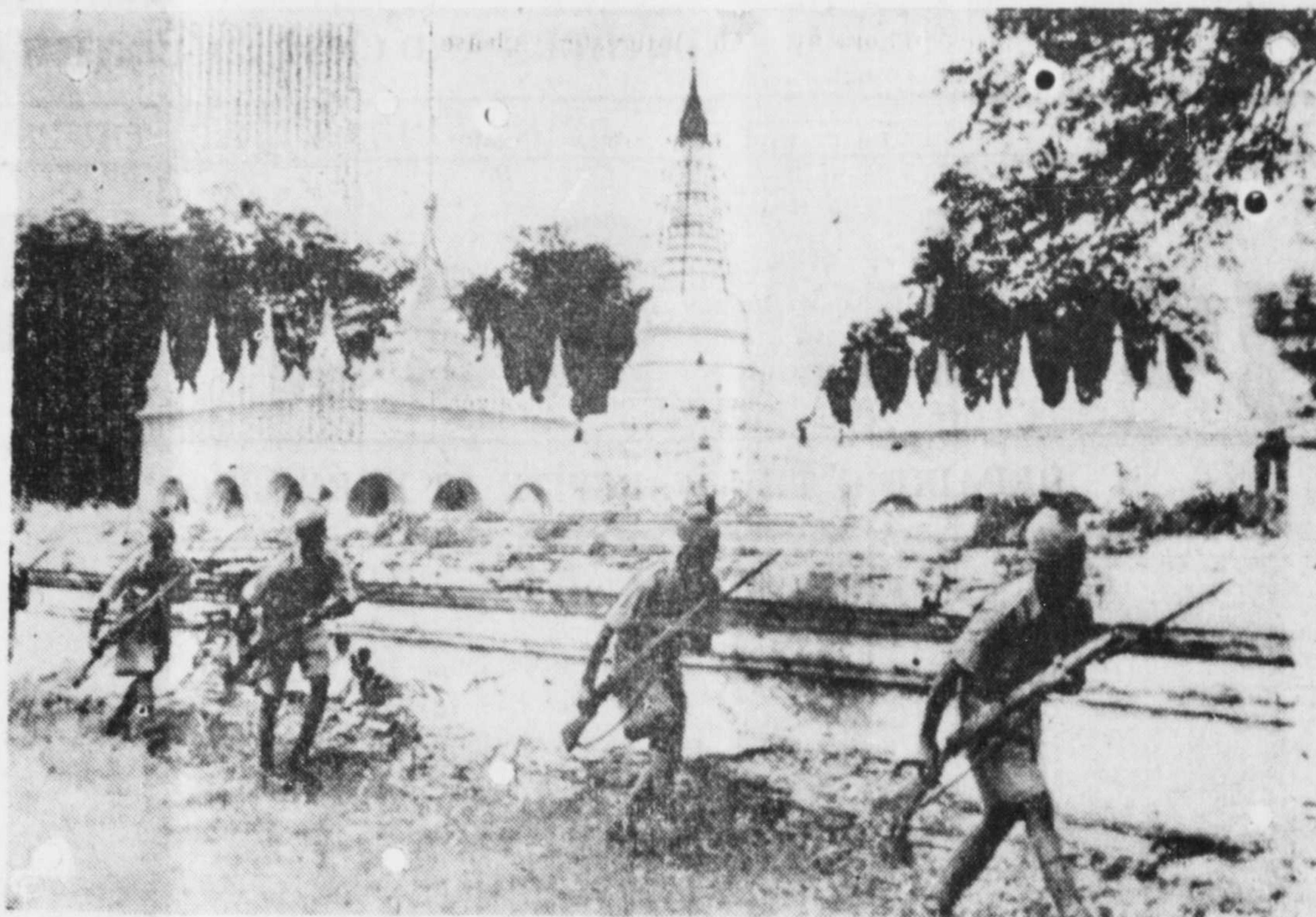
Armhole Problems

One designer sharing the use of the silk prints for coming collections is not using the "relaxed armhole" or any suggestion of dolman line. She considers the underarm wideness of fabric too difficult for women of medium stature.

"For the short and broad, who after all must be considered in dress designing, it widens the silhouette at the most unbecoming point," she said. Only a Vivionette-like skill can use loose fabric with such a cut that it flatters the silhouette.

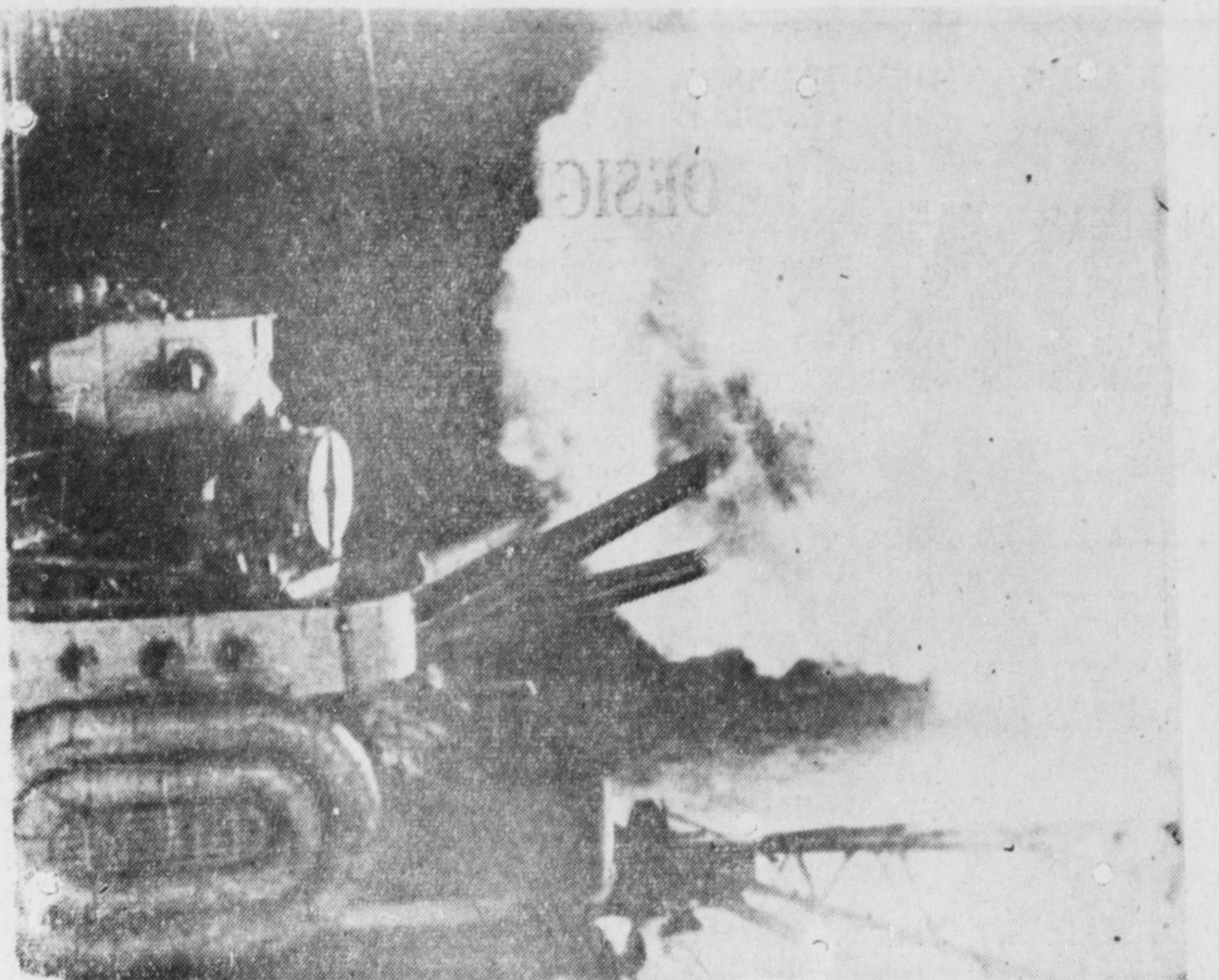

No Complaint At Sugar And Butter Restriction As Everyone Treated Alike

LONDON, October 23: (C) — People of Britain accept rationing and wartime shortage of supplies in a manner that makes a visiting Canadian marvel constantly.

You don't hear such comments as "the so-and-so government won't give us any" when a store runs out of things—which happens often. The saleswoman just smiles and says "very sorry, we have none." And that's that. As for food rationing, a ministry official said "We find very little complaint. So long as the people are sure everyone is being treated alike they are satisfied."

Asked whether the eight ounces a week sugar ration and the two-ounce butter ration might not impair the nation's health, the official said the ministry was confident the health would not suffer.

"We are providing them with ample calories but would like to add more protein," he said. "That's why we are so anxious to get all the Canadian cheese we can. Fish is also high in protein and we are looking forward to the shipments of salmon from British Columbia."

Candy And Apples

Few stores have any candy. When a visitor noticed a shop in the Strand famous for chocolates he hurried in but was too late. It was noon and the day's supply—ministry official said "We find very little complaint. So long as the people are sure everyone is being treated alike they are satisfied."

Elimination of waste campaigns have been successful and once you are here a few days the waste prevention habit catches on. The visitor was ashamed one day to have left a water-tap running. Everywhere you see posted appeals to use as little water as possible.

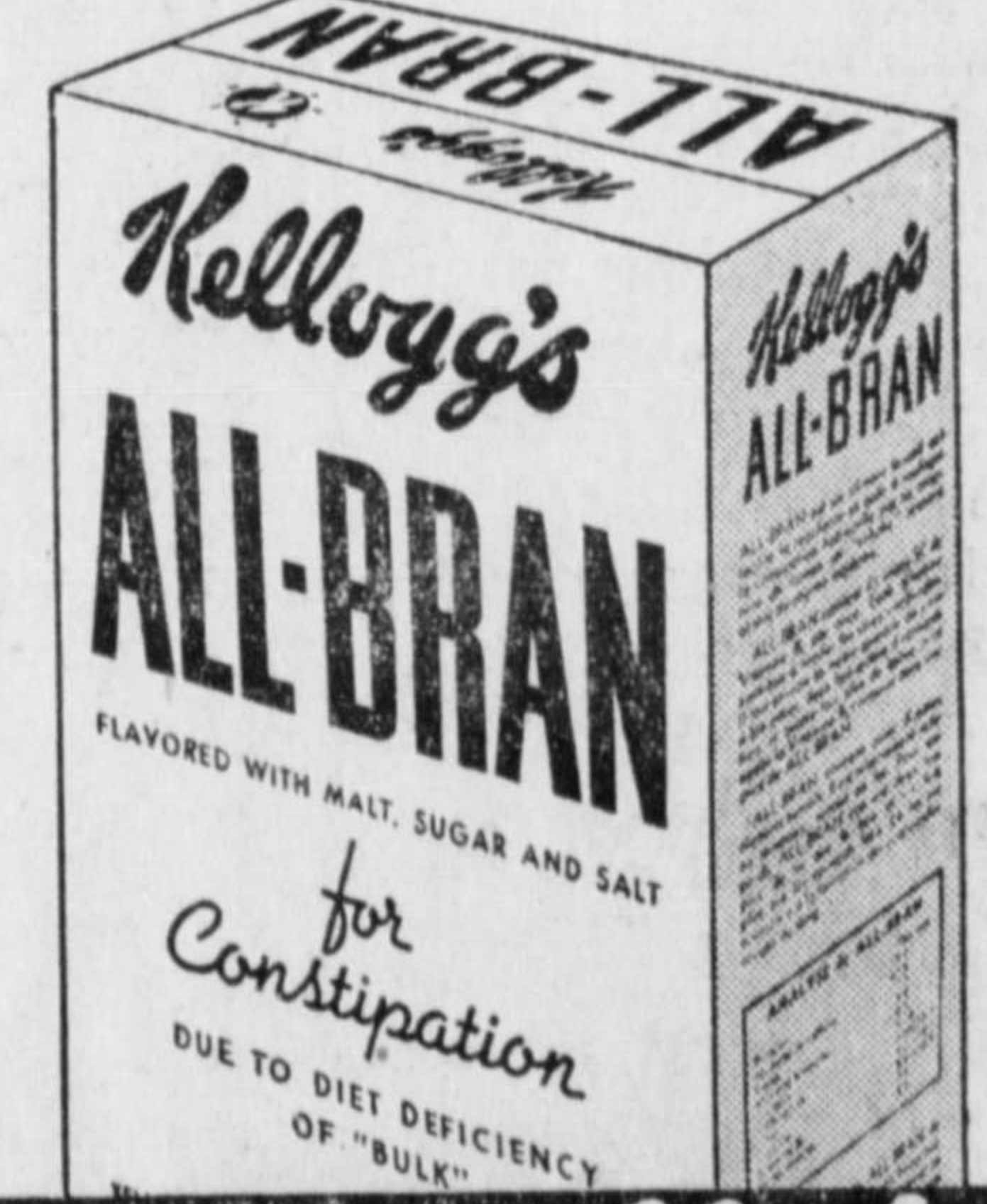

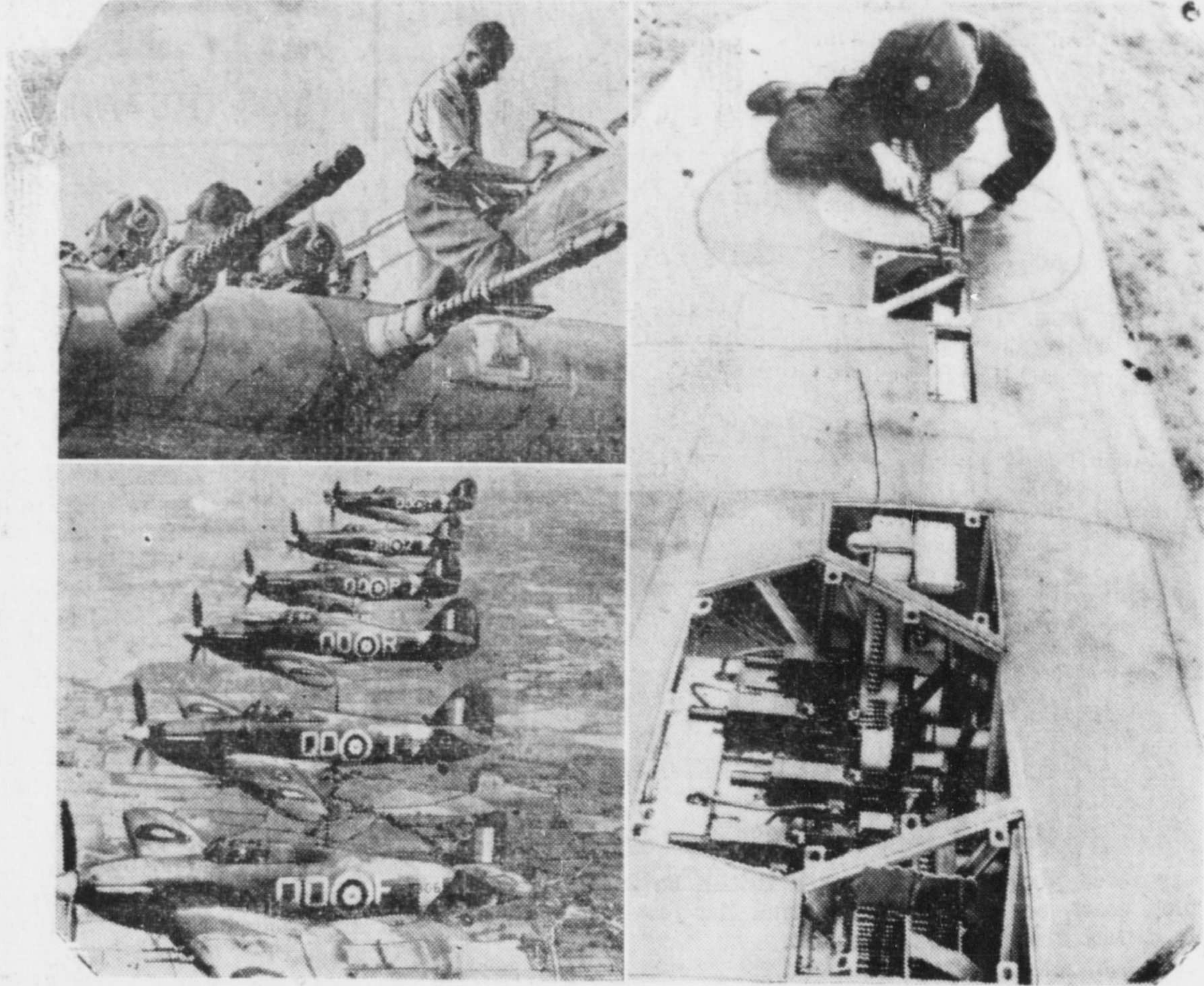

rates—showed the smallest increase of any group, only one percent.

Rail fares are now 16 2-3 percent above the level in September, 1939. There was an increase of 10 percent in May, 1940, and a further 6 2-3 percent rise last December.

Entertainment costs also have risen. Meals eaten in restaurants are considerably more expensive—and not so good. For those who own cars gasoline and annual licences cost about 20 percent more than before the war.

Real Income Taxes Biggest slice of all out of the payroll goes for income tax. In the summer of 1939 the standard rate was seven shillings in the pound. Now it is 10 shillings.

This doesn't mean that the man with an income of £200 (\$900) pays half of it to the inland revenue authorities. The graded system by which the tax is applied makes the levy a little less steep than that. A single person with £200 (\$900) pays £16 13 shillings fourpence (about \$75). At £400 (\$1800) the rate varies from £70 five shillings 10d (about \$326) for a single person to £3 6 8 (about \$15) for a married man with three children.

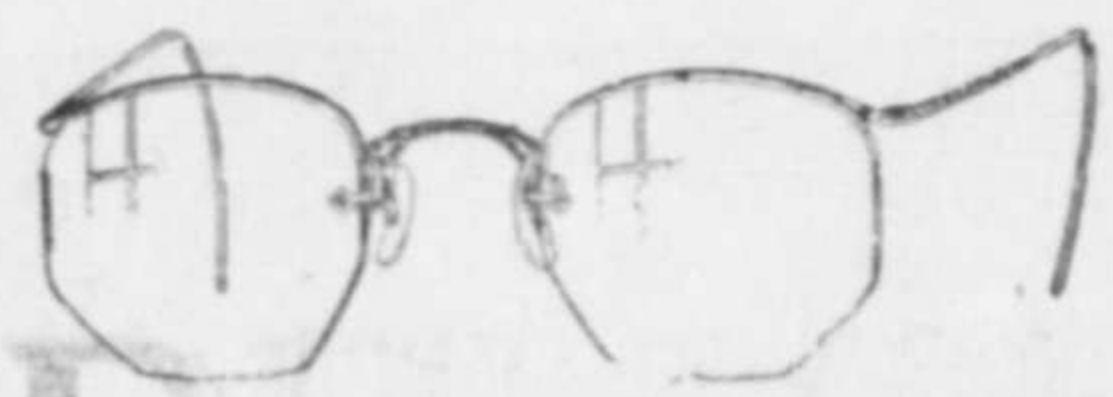

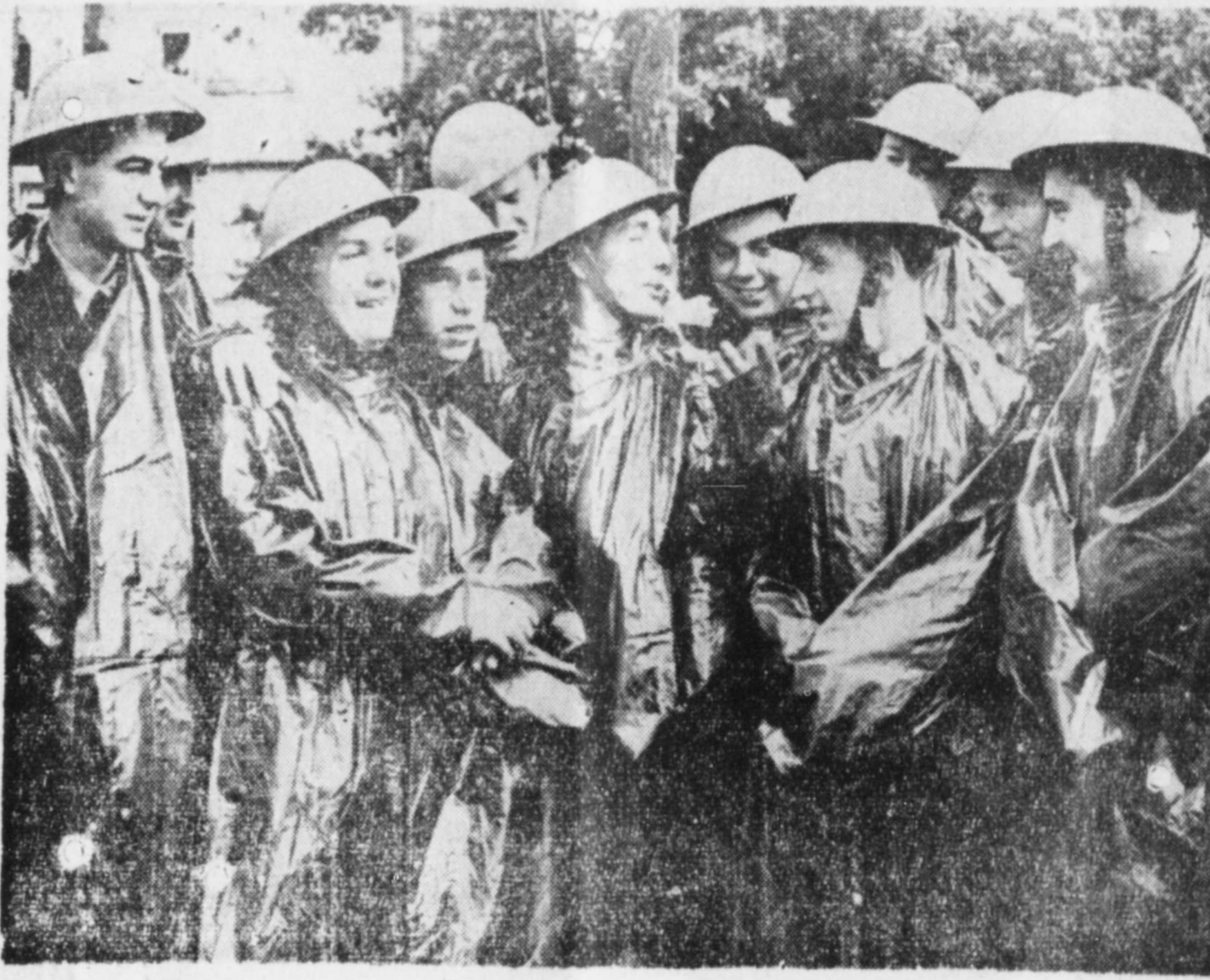

Hospital Matron Is Raid Heroine

Marjorie Stepnall, Who Saved Staff, Has Been Awarded An M. B. E.

LONDON, October 23: (P)—Heroism of Miss Marjorie Stepnall, matron of the Royal Eye Hospital, saved the hospital and staff when it was bombed in a heavy raid on London last May. Miss Stepnall has just been honored by citation as a member of the order of the British Empire.

She directed operations of the fire fighting party from an iron bridge until it was demolished by high explosives. Though injured she managed to extricate herself from the debris.

Then she dragged her car from the blazing garage and salvaged hospital equipment. Despite danger of falling walls she entered the hospital frequently. Only when every patient was comfortably resettled in a convent, with blankets she had stored her life to get, did Miss Stepnall consent to go to a hospital herself for treatment.

Whifflets From The Waterfront

Prince Rupert cannery of Nelson Bros. Fisheries Ltd., the final salmon cannery to remain in operation this season, is closing down this week-end as far as salmon packing is concerned. The plant will be changing over to machinery to pack herring when those fish begin to run in quantity, possibly around December, although last winter it was considerably later.

Northland Transportation Co.'s steamer North Coast, making her first call here in some time, arrived in port at 4 o'clock this morning from Alaska and, after discharging frozen fish for transshipment east over Canadian National Railways, sailed early this afternoon in continuation of her voyage to Seattle.
