Invasion Attempt In September

BOTH SIDES IN CLAIMS OF VICTORY

Reds Said to Be Swinging Into Offensive as Blitzkrieg Develops Into Old-Fashioned Siege

LONDON, July 29.—Claims and counter-claims come again today from the Russo-German war.

The Russians claim to have captured an island of importance designated as "K" at the mouth of the Danube River.

Russia says that four German divisions of 60,000 men have been destroyed and a fifth partially wiped out.

Germany says that three Russian divisions have been wiped out.

With both sides making highly favorable claims of successes for themselves, the Russo-German war entered its thirty-eighth day today.

Reds On Offensive

Germany's blitzkrieg has broken down into an old-fashioned siege along the whole western front.

A D.N.B. report Sunday night declared that German forces had moved to within 43 miles of Leningrad and that devastating air blows had been dealt to Moscow.

GIVING AID TO RUSSIA

All Possible Immediate Assistance Will Be Provided By United States. Says Hopkins

LONDON, July 29.—Harry Hopkins, director of the United States "lease-lend" program, visiting London, pledged all possible aid to Russia in her struggle against Nazi Germany.

ACTION AT DRY DOCK IS SOUGHT

Early Arrival of Newly Appointed Manager For Plant Urged

Dry Dock administration at Prince Rupert came in for considerable criticism at last night's meeting of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce and the desire was expressed in emphatic terms that there should be more efficiency and expedition in the handling of ship-building and other work at the yard.

"The Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce in general meeting last night resolved to respectfully urge the proposed arrival in Prince Rupert as reported in the press of G. A. McMillan as active manager of the dock and yard be expedited so that he will reach here as quickly as possible in order to cope with the emergency created by the placing in dry dock of the American Army transport Kvichak.

Both William Garlick and Jack Deane, heading a local syndicate which is backing B. W. Hardcastle in a new theatre project for Prince Rupert and for which application has now been made to Ottawa for a permit, are emphatic in their support of a locally owned and operated theatre as Mr. Hardcastle says he plans.

"It is our desire," said Mr. Garlick, to operate the new theatre for and in the interests of the people of Prince Rupert as a whole, retaining here the revenue derived from the theatre so that it may be utilized for the welfare of the city for reinvestment purposes as occasions arise.

Mr. Deane's contention is that, inasmuch as Prince Rupert people support the theatre, it is only fair and just that the earnings should remain in Prince Rupert.

Mr. Hardcastle denies rumors to the effect that an independent theatre could not obtain pictures from distributors.

At the present rate of distribution and exhibiting, Mr. Hardcastle says, there are plenty of releases available for Prince Rupert.

JAPANESE CONTINUE ACTIVITY

Occupation of French Indo-China Goes On—Netherlands East Indies and Nippon Now at Daggert Point

LONDON—A Reuters dispatch from Bangkok today said that Japan had demanded that Thailand join Japan's new order in East Asia in return for Laos and Cambodia which are part of Indo-China.

LONDON, July 29: (CP)—It was officially announced last night that Japan will occupy two points on the coast of French Indo-China and several points in the interior by agreement with the Vichy government.

Japanese troops began disembarking in southern Indo-China yesterday in accordance with a new Japanese-French agreement.

In Tokyo the Foreign Office-controlled Japan Times and Advertiser yesterday described the United States as "hostile" and a leader in a grim economic battle against Japan.

Informed circles, however, said that the action of the Netherlands East Indies in freezing Japanese assets, following the United States lead, might produce even more far-reaching consequences than the American program.

A vital blow was struck at the Japanese fleet yesterday when Director of Economic Affairs H. J. Van Mook informed the People's Council that an agreement of last year whereby Japan was to receive 1,800,000 tons of oil annually from the Dutch East Indies had been suspended and all monetary and commercial dealings with Japan had been placed on a special permit basis.

The Japanese press continues its tirade against President Franklin D. Roosevelt for freezing Japanese assets in the United States.

It is reported that Japan is demanding that Thailand (Siam) join the "New Order" in the Orient, the aim, of course, being to obtain naval and air bases. The Thai cabinet has been called into emergency session.

Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek has offered air bases in China to Great Britain and the United States.

General Douglas MacArthur has been placed in command of the United States territorial army of 200,000 Filipinos in the Philippines.

Warning Sounded By Prime Minister; Army Poised To Repulse It

Churchill Rejects Demands for Appointment of War Production and Deplores Careless Criticism of British Industry

LONDON, July 29: (CP)—Prime Minister Winston Churchill warned Great Britain today of the possibility of a German invasion attempt in September. He rejected demands for the appointment of a minister of war production and spoke with regret of the severance of diplomatic relations with Nazi-associated Finland.

"The invasion season is at hand," Mr. Churchill said. "All armed forces have been warned to be at concert pitch by September 1 and to maintain utmost vigilance."

Mr. Churchill declared that Parliamentary and press demands for a co-ordinator or minister of production would be ignored and deplored careless criticism of British industry for its effect abroad, particularly in the United States and Australia.

Appeals are being entered.

STRIKE IN CAR PLANT

Union Men And Soldiers Clash At Hamilton

HAMILTON, July 29.—The National Steel Car Co. plant, engaged in important war work, was tied up by strike commencing last night when 600 of 2700 employees laid down tools following a steel workers' union meeting at which union recognition was demanded.

Two hundred and fifty soldiers from local training establishments, unarmed and without orders, marched to the plant and stormed picket lines with shouts of "What are you holding production up for? How would you like to work for \$1.30 a day?"

Co-Operation With Ottawa . . .

Now that there is an election campaign starting an attempt is being made to show that the British Columbia government refused to co-operate with the Federal government in the war effort. This of course is wholly incorrect. What Premier Pattullo refused to do was to agree to the adoption of the Sirois report. In that he has been consistent throughout. It was admitted that there was in the Sirois report very much that was good. The difference between the two governments was that the Federal government insisted that the conference was called to consider the report and nothing else. Mr. Pattullo refused to allow the province to be tied and bound by it for all time to come. He always promised full co-operation in war work and this he has given.

Independent Opinion . . .

Here is an independent opinion in regard to whether the Pattullo government is doing the right thing or not just now in appealing to the people for endorsement of its position on all counts. The Vancouver News Herald says: "The announcement from Victoria that the provincial election will be held in October has had a peculiar effect upon some of the self-appointed critics of the government. In one breath they tell us that the government's record in office is 'undefensible'—in the next breath they declare that there is no need for an election at all. The only certain result of an election, they say, will be the disruption of B.C.'s war effort.

"The role of the opposition press is a difficult one in war time, but we had never realized that it was as tortuous as all that. Surely, if the record of the government is as bad as its political opponents would have us believe, there is every good and patriotic reason for an election!

"Actually, politically biased critics aside, the decision to hold an election this Fall simply conforms to a well established precedent. Far from harming the war effort a public discussion of what B. C. is doing in the war should be beneficial.

"The suggestion that the province is incapable of performing a democratic function at this time without harm to the war effort is scarcely complimentary to the public's intelligence."

He is here to supervise moving of local Y.M.C.A. headquarters from the present location in the Stork Block on Second Avenue to the Moose Hall which has been taken over.

Funeral arrangements were in charge of the Canadian Legion.

Co-Ordinating Of Charities

A suggestion from the Canadian Chamber of Commerce that local chambers of commerce take the leadership in community moves to co-ordinate local financial campaigns for such charities as health, medical and hospital care and child, adult, family and indigent welfare was received at last night's meeting of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce and referred to the city commissioner.

The letter from the Canadian Chamber gave the information that the federal Department of National War Services had set aside the period from September 8 to November 3 for the conducting of such financial campaigns. It was admitted that it was imperative to carry on certain civilian charitable activities notwithstanding the demands of war.

NEW DEAL IS ASKED

Chamber of Commerce Takes Up Cudgels on Behalf of Halibut Fishermen

The fisheries committee was instructed by the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce last night to press upon the authorities the necessity of the Canadian halibut fleet getting a longer fishing period than present international treaty restrictions permitted. It was charged that the American fleet was receiving undue advantage. The fisheries committee will go into consultation with representatives of boat owners and fishermen.

With only 58 to 65 days fishing in the year left, the position for the Canadian halibutters had become almost impossible, declared Capt. W. P. Armour who brought the matter up. As soon as the fishing in Area No. 2 had ended and the small Canadian boats had tied up, the price jumped from 8c to 13c and 14c. Something would have to be done unless the halibut fishing was wiped off the map entirely as far as Prince Rupert was concerned. Soon there would be neither fleet nor fishing out of here if the present condition of affairs continued. Now was the time to act.

W. O. Fulton agreed that something should be done and moved that the matter be referred to the fisheries committee.

W. M. Watts suggested that there should be a meeting with halibut boat owners and fishermen to consider their views and offer co-operation.

J. E. Boddie urged the advisability of the fishermen themselves coming to an agreement.

G. W. Nickerson felt that more action could be obtained by winning the support of the federal authorities which would have more influence with the International Fisheries Commission. He saw some merit in suggestions that the two areas be combined, also that boats should be compelled to choose between operating in halibut or salmon fisheries but not be permitted to work in both.

ASK WAR CABINET

Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce Also in Favor of General Conscription

The Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce, at a meeting last night, passed a resolution advocating the formation of a national war cabinet as the first step in the restoration of public confidence in the Canadian war effort. The resolution, would place the Canadian war program on a parity with that of Great Britain, regardless of political repercussions now or in the future.

The cabinets of Great Britain and United States had been reorganized for the prosecution of war and national defence, H. A. Breen said in urging support of the resolution which was presented by a special committee consisting of G. R. S. Blackaby, H. A. Breen and Frank Skinner.

G. W. Nickerson felt the time had come for the formation of a war cabinet of the best men available in Canada. He admitted that he knew of no man in Canada who could better handle the job of heading a war cabinet than Prime Minister Mackenzie King. He believed that best talents should be selected with the exclusive duty of carrying on the war effort, purely departmental activities to be left in the hands of other ministers. Quite possibly, Mr. King should go outside of the present administration for new ministers. The situation had got beyond the stage where a weather eye should be kept out for the next election.
