RUPERT'S GLORIOUS EMPIRE DAY IS DETAILED

IDEAL OUTING ON EMPIRE DAY AT TERRACE

With Baseball and Football, Boxing, Dancing, Rambling and Scrambling, Lunching, Laughter and Songs, a Big Party of Prince Rupert People Made Merry Holiday Yesterday

Terrace, B. C., May 24.—Queen's weather greeted the three hundred Prince Rupertites that just comfortably crowded the cars of the excursion train to Terrace today. A perfect trip along the beautiful tide water shores and up the banks of the swift Skeena, brought the pleasure seekers to the busy little town at the entrance to the Kitsumkalum Valley.

Ideal Spot
After a welcome lunch served by Boniface Gordon at the Lake-else Hotel, the crowd dispersed to seek enjoyment as they would. Some chose to linger in the shade, some to walk up the track as far as the Little Canyon, and some went down to Kitsumkalum. Yet others took their positions in the natural amphitheatre, the floor of which George Little had converted into an admirable recreation ground. It would be difficult to praise too highly the result of his upsparring expenditure and enthusiasm for this splendid park.

The Ball Game

MARTIAL DRILL BY EARL GREYS

Empire Day Celebrated by Feud-Joie with Cheers for the King and the Royal Salute—Regiment Looked Soldierly.

Those who were out early enough yesterday morning were favored by witnessing a martial ceremonial performed by Earl Grey's Rifles which gave the necessary touch of militarism to the celebration of Empire Day in Prince Rupert, and was most effective.

At 9 a. m. the company marched out of the drill hall and formed in "company line" on the smooth surface of Second avenue, specially sprinkled by the fire department. Here a feu-de-joie was fired, three rounds of ammunition being shot into the air, followed by the royal salute and three cheers for the King.

Afterward the company marched around the parade ground and then executed the "march past" most effectively, the soldierly appearance of the regiment being remarked upon by all. Later the company be-took themselves to the ranges across the harbor, where a successful match was shot off with the civilian riflemen.

YOUNG BOY'S EARLY DEATH

BANKS AND LOAN COMPANIES.

It is said that those who see danger in the merger of banks are exaggerating the importance of these institutions and not paying enough attention to trust and loan and insurance companies. The latter concerns may require attention.

It is not the main function of banks to lend money on mortgages on land, or in any other manner which will lock up their funds for long periods. On the other hand, it is not the function of trust and loan companies to transact mercantile business.

NEAR TRAGEDY AT NIAGARA

Buffalo Man Was Close to Death When Escaping and Novel Rescue Was Made—Saved by Human Chain.

Niagara Falls, N. Y., May 20.—One of the most daring rescues in the history of Niagara Falls was effected the other day by Aram Kevorkian, an Armenian, who waded out waist deep into the rapids, a short distance above the cataract, and pulled to shore with a pole the unconscious form of Henry J. Smith, 50 years old, of Buffalo.

David Gordon and Paul Constable Harrington assisted in the rescue by forming a human chain, anchoring the Armenian to the shore and enabling him to assist the current, which was especially strong owing to the high water.

Smith was walking along the narrow path skirting the river about 600 feet above the falls when he missed his footing and fell into the turbulent stream. He soon became exhausted in the effort to reach shore and was floating with his head under water when caught by Kevorkian, less than 100 feet above the brink. Smith soon was resuscitated.

JOY RIDERS' RIVER DOOM

Search for Bodies Continues in Chicago River—Details of Accident Come to Light.

Chicago, May 21.—Although divers are searching the river for the victims of the joy ride mishap, no other bodies had been recovered up to a late hour this morning. The driver of the machine saw the danger when twenty feet from the draw and tried to run head-on into a stone abutment. He had the car turned half way around when it suddenly skidded, crashed through the safety chain and dropped into the water.

Examination of the car definitely established that it was owned by Mrs. C. F. Spaulding, 1300 Astor street. It was driven by John Buchanan, a chauffeur temporarily employed by Mrs. Spaulding, who took the car without permission and invited two girls and two boy acquaintances to ride with him.

INTEREST'S SOURDOUGHS

Mumboldt-White Pass Case to Be Reheard.

Washington, May 20.—In view of the decision of the Supreme Court of the United States that the railroads of Alaska are subject to the regulations of the Interstate Commerce Commission, the commission today ordered a rehearing of the case of the Humboldt Steamship Company against the White Pass & Yukon Railway route and other Alaska transportation companies.

NOT SPANISH GOLD Coins Recovered from Wrecked Ship Turn Out to Be Copper.

New York, May 20.—A London cable says: "As a relief from the output of stone cannon balls and metal plates from the sea bed where the supposed Spanish Armada treasure ship lies off Toborony, there have now been recovered thirty-two copper coins. Twenty-four of them came up in a cluster. Two are dated 1579 and 1582 respectively, and are clearly marked 'Philip'."

These are the first Spanish copper coins of the period of which there is any record. It had been believed that Spain, then by far the richest kingdom in the world, handled money imperially and did not deal in small copper coins.

HYDROPLANE FOR TORONTO

One of the World's Fastest Power Boats Will Skim Across the Surface of Lake Ontario This Summer.

Toronto is to have a real high speed motor boat—one of the famous hydroplane type.

Built in England, she is already in Toronto, and will be dropped into the water for a trial next week. She is owned by one of that famous yachting family—the Gooderhams—to be really explicit, W. H. Gooderham.

The new flyer is a 26 foot mahogany craft. She is of over eight feet beam and is built of three veneers of mahogany sewn together with mahogany wire. This embodies both lightness and strength, and what it costs per square foot would buy a row boat.

The new craft, which is engaged by an eight cylindered "V" type Woolsey engine of 60 horse power, was designed and built by the Fauber-Simms firm, which built the Duke of Westminster's famous 40 mile an hour hydroplane, Maple Leaf III.

She is expected to better 35 miles an hour and will go to the big races.

AN IDYLL OF DEATH

The Final Story of Mr. and Mrs. Straus Will Live Forever.

We wish to have the final story of Mr. and Mrs. Isidor Straus put on record in these columns. Colonel Gracie heard them discussing the matter between themselves, and agreeing that if they must die they would die together. VANCOUVER INTERESTED IN A STRANGE CASE

Circumstances of Trial of a German Named Betschowo Seem to Suggest Conspiracy

Vancouver is interested in a peculiar case of alleged conspiracy to defeat the ends of justice, in which figures prominently a German named Betschowo. Particulars of the case as gathered from the Vancouver World, the newspaper responsible for the attraction of public interest to the matter are as follows:

(1) That one Betschowo, a German unable to make himself understood in English, charged a man named Hoffman, with running off with his wife and goods.

(2) That the day before the case was to be heard in court, Betschowo was arrested on a charge of vagrancy, and that although he had seventy dollars in his possession he was detained for three days.

(3) That meanwhile the case came on in the provincial court house where Betschowo was not

represented, first, because he himself was in the city jail and, second, because his legal representatives were told the case would be heard at three o'clock, whereas it was called at two.

(4) That the magistrate was informed that Betschowo was in a lunatic asylum.

(5) That in consequence the accused Hoffman was allowed to go, the case being dismissed.

A number of German residents in Vancouver are determined to pursue the enquiry into the Betschowo case to a finish. Several gentlemen waited on Mr. J. W. de B. Farris the other morning. Mr. Farris consented to appear before the mayor or to represent Betschowo at the enquiry and also in any further proceedings.
