# Allies Improve Positions

## FREE HAND FOR JAPAN

### Agreement With Russia May Result In End Of War With China, Enabling Attention Elsewhere

TOKYO, April 14.—By ensuring protection of Japan's back door, the friendship and neutrality pact concluded between Japan and Russia at Moscow yesterday will facilitate Japan's drive to establish a "new order" in the southern Orient, it is agreed in this Japanese capital.

One of the results is expected to be the end of the war with China through the withdrawal of Soviet support to General Chiang Kai Shek who may be offered a "free hand" in the southern part of his country.

The navy minister said today that the international situation was fraught with grave implications for Japan and increase of naval strength was vitally needed.

## TOBRUK IS HELD

### Germans Break Through But Are Driven Back With Severe Losses

LONDON, April 14.—The War Office announced tonight that twenty Axis tanks supporting infantry crossed the outer defences of Tobruk in North Africa this morning but were ejected with severe losses and the situation in that place was "completely restored." German losses were said to be heavy both in tanks and man power.

Newspapers here today are severely criticizing the conduct of the war in North Africa and suggesting there had been too much talk and not enough action.

## N. AFRICA SITUATION

### Fierce Fighting In Effort To Stop Lightning Axis Drive

CAIRO, April 14.—Fierce fighting continues in North Africa, centering around Tobruk in Libya and Saloum in Egypt, as the British endeavour to stay the lightning drive of the Axis towards the East. An active defence of Tobruk is proceeding. Following Bardia yesterday, Saloum was reported to have been captured today by the German and Italian forces. Swarms of British fighter and bomber planes are harassing the Axis land forces. Although the release of British forces from East Africa following the rout of the Italians there improves the British military situation in Egypt, there is no attempt to minimize the seriousness of the situation both as regards Alexandria and Suez.

## Severe Losses Inflicted On Germans Today In Greece And New Positions Then Are Taken

### Landing In Norway Made

LONDON, April 14.—British troops have made another daring landing at an unidentified port on the Norwegian coast. They went ashore from a destroyer and, assisted by anti-Nazi Norwegian volunteers, destroyed harbor facilities which were being used by the enemy.

## NAZI MECHANIZED COLUMNS HAMPERED BY MUD AND SNOW—"S.S. ADOLF HITLER" MOTORIZED DIVISION ROUTED WITH HEAVY LOSSES—BATTLE IN S.W. YUGOSLAVIA

ATHENS, April 14.—German mechanized columns, hampered by mud and snow have failed in the push against strengthening the British-Greek front from the Albanian passes to the Gulf of Salonika, Greek despatches said today. Fresh troops were being moved to threatened positions while allied patrols slashed at several points with armored scouting forces from Nazi ranks. Allied planes harassed German communications through Bulgaria. Reports from the front said the Germans were pre-occupied in mopping up Yugoslav forces in the rear.

LONDON, April 14.—British infantrymen, fighting in Northern Greece, have routed Germany's "S.S. Adolf Hitler" motorized division with heavy losses, it was officially announced today and Yugoslav forces are believed to have captured the strategic seaport of Durazzo, 25 miles west of Tirana, the Albanian capital.

A battle between the British and Germans is apparently being fought between Phlorina in Greece and the Bitolj Gap in southwest Yugoslavia.

ATHENS, April 14.—The Royal Air Force has launched an offensive designed to cripple Germany's mechanized columns. A communique today announced a large number of sorties against German columns in Greece with direct hits by most of the participating planes.

### FINAL COMMUNIQUE

LONDON, April 14.—The withdrawal of British forces to new positions in Greece was announced in a war office communique tonight. The British forces retired after inflicting casualties on the Germans, the communique said.

## BABY ALIVE AFTER THREE DAYS ENTOMBED



Pictured as she slept peacefully in her hospital cot is 10-month-old Irene Marriot, who was buried for three days in the ruins of her Merseyside home when bombs wrecked the house. Little Irene's body was protected by that of her father, who was found dead. One of the baby's arms was broken and her head was injured but doctors say she will recover.

## War News

### POPE PRAYS FOR PEACE

ROME—In an Easter Sunday message to the world delivered from the Vatican, Pope Pius appealed to the belligerent nations to feel some charity in warring upon civilian populations and to refrain from even more homicidal instruments of war. He also appealed to the nations occupying country by conquest to deal justly and humanely with people coming under their domination. It was a sorrowful Easter morning indeed, declared His Holiness. He prayed that Catholic people redouble their efforts for "early, just and universal peace." The Pontiff pledged himself to battle for an honorable peace but saw little hope for an early termination of "this useless conflict."

### GREAT BRITAIN QUIET

LONDON—Bad weather Saturday night and Easter Sunday slowed down the Battle of Britain. There were few raids in any parts of the British Isles although a South Wales town and one in southeast England were briefly attacked. One German plane was brought down yesterday off the Cornish coast.

### AXIS FORCES IN EGYPT

CAIRO—Continuing their lightning drive eastward, the Axis forces yesterday captured Bardia, 35 miles west of Egypt, and continued into Egypt at Saloum. Tobruk has been completely encircled and the British forces there are said to be in danger though endeavouring to fight their way out.

### FIERCE BATTLE RAGES

ATHENS—The fiercest battle so far in this war, in which are employed all manner of fighting devices, Great bombing and fighting planes in the air and huge tanks with cannons and flame throwers on the ground, is in progress in Northern Greece between Phlorina and Bitolj with the progress in favor of the Allies. Athens claims that the first major German thrust was thrown back. Berlin claims to have broken through the main Greece-British defence line. Berlin also claims that German forces entered Belgrade on Sunday.

### AIR ACTIVITIES

LONDON—British bombers attacked Merignac airdrome and Bordeaux docks last night, it was announced. The air activities over Britain were described as light.

### CLAIMED TO BE RECAPTURED

NEW YORK—An Italian news broadcast today claimed that Koritza, the first major Albanian base captured by the Greeks had been retaken by the Italians. There was no confirmation of this in Allied quarters.

## BOSTON WINS STANLEY CUP

Completed Four Game Sweep In Best Of Seven Series On Saturday  
DETROIT, April 14.—Boston Bruins wrote final to the professional hockey league season Saturday scoring three times in the second period to beat Detroit Red Wings three goals to one and complete the four game sweep in the best of seven in the Stanley Cup.

## Hockey Series Is Now Tied Up

Saskatoon Quakers and Winnipeg Rangers Each Win Two Games In Memorial Cup Play-Off Series

SASKATOON, April 14.—Saskatoon Quakers defeated Winnipeg Rangers 10 to 5 here Saturday night to tie up the western play-off series for the Memorial Cup, emblematic of junior hockey championship, at two games each.

## WINS FIRST HOOP GAME

University Of British Columbia Beats Winnipeg 43 To 31

VANCOUVER, April 14.—University of British Columbia Thunderbirds defeated Winnipeg St. Andrews by a score of 43 to 31 Saturday night in the opening game of the Western Canada Senior A basketball finals. Half time score was 25 to 10 for Varsity, the Winnipeg team outscoring the British Columbians 21 to 18 in the second half.

Second game will be played tonight and the third Tuesday night if necessary.

## AIR WAR GOES ON

Northwest English Town Pounded—R. A. F. Hits Channel Points

LONDON, April 14.—A northwest English town was heavily pounded during the night by the German Luftwaffe but the Royal Air Force was by no means idle. There was a fierce raid by British bombers on the coastal port of Bordeaux, docks and a nearby airdrome being attacked. Off the Belgian coast two German supply ships and a patrol vessel were struck. The German battleships Scharnhorst and Gneisenau at Brest and the submarine base at Lorient were also attacked again during the week-end by the Royal Air Force.

## No More Street Cars In Seattle

Last One Makes Its Run In Puget Sound City—Trackless Trolleys And Motorbusses Now

SEATTLE, April 14.—The last street car ran at midnight Saturday in Seattle. Henceforth the city will be served by trackless trolleys and motorbusses. Eventually all the tracks will be taken up.

## RETURN OF GOV'T SURE

### No Serious Opposition To Bracken Administration In Manitoba's General Provincial Election

WINNIPEG, April 14.—Return of the coalition government of Premier John Bracken at the forthcoming Manitoba provincial election is assured. In the nominations Saturday were acclamations in sixteen of the fifty-five seats. All the acclamations were government candidates including Premier Bracken in the P. and five of his cabinet ministers. There are twenty Opposition candidates in the 39 remaining seats.

## DEFENCES ARE FIRM

### Advance Of Nazi Hordes Appears To Have Been Stopped Everywhere In Balkans Today

ATHENS, April 14.—Anglo-Greek defence lines, following the initial German successes, were holding firm today. In patrol clashes the Nazi mechanized forces had suffered heavy losses.

In Yugoslavia, after the first shock, the picture appeared to be much the same. Yugoslav counter attacks appeared to be meeting with success, the enemy, despite his strength, being driven back at many points.

Although Belgrade had been occupied by the enemy and Sarajevo devastated by enemy aerial bombing, the important Albanian port of Durazzo was reported captured by the Yugoslavs from the Italians.

## Broke Prison And Retaken

### Getaway Cost The Lives Of Four When Two Convicts Escaped From Sing Sing

OSSING, N. Y., April 14.—Two long term convicts who shot their way from Sing Sing prison infirmary in a sensational break costing four lives, were captured a few hours later today in the woods across the Hudson River. The pair were still armed with smuggled guns with which they and a confederate later slain, had broken prison.

## Governor General Visits Up-Island

### Earl Of Athlone And Princess Alice At Nanaimo, Qualicum And Comox

VICTORIA, April 14.—The Governor General, the Earl of Athlone, and Princess Alice, made a trip up the Island on Saturday visiting Qualicum Beach, Comox and Nanaimo. They were given enthusiastic receptions at each point visited.

This morning Their Excellencies arrived in Vancouver where they were received at the City Hall by Mayor and Mrs. J. W. Cornett and attended a reception where a souvenir book was presented. This afternoon the vice-regal party drove through the streets of Vancouver and were taken on a harbor cruise, visiting shipbuilding plants.

## YUGOSLAVIA FIGHTS ON

### Messages Exchanged Between Premier Churchill And Simovic

LONDON, April 14.—Reply to a message of comfort and encouragement sent to his country last night by Prime Minister Winston Churchill of Great Britain, Premier Dusan Simovic of Yugoslavia said today that Yugoslavia had no idea of surrender but would fight until Balkan security and European freedom was secured. Prime Minister Churchill assured Yugoslavia that "Great Britain is fighting with you and behind you; is the States with its great resources. Our sympathy is with you for our cities have been bombed and our women and children like yours have been murdered and our suffering and our sorrows have been like yours."

## SETTLEMENT OF STRIKE

### Agreement Expected To Be Reached Between United States Steel And Employees

PITTSBURG, Pa., April 14.—Negotiation of an agreement settling the strike of the United States Steel Corporation, threatened for tomorrow and involving 240,000 workers, is likely. Signing of a new contract is expected.

## Danish Envoy Ordered Home

### Minister, However, is Not Expected to Heed Command to Return to Copenhagen

COPENHAGEN, April 14.—The Danish government (Nazi-controlled) has ordered the return home of the Danish minister to United States who signed the agreement with the American government for the turning over of air bases in Greenland to the United States. However, it is expected the order will be ignored by the minister who says it was made under duress and that he considers it his duty to remain in Washington.

A statement by the U.S. State Department said the United States refused to recognize the action of the German-occupied Denmark in recalling the minister and notified the envoy that he would be considered the duly authorized Danish minister here.

### EDITORIAL

#### Will It Be Helpful . . .

In considering any public question these days, the first thing to think of is "will it be helpful in the war effort?" Other questions are of minor importance. While it is sometimes a good thing to turn our minds to smaller subjects we must not attempt to become engrossed in anything but war effort. To do so would not be in the best interests of the nation.

We all have our petty problems, our business problems, our civic problems, our provincial and national problems but the one big problem is how to win the war and everything else must subordinate itself to that.

#### The Press And War . . .

As a link between the public and the war front the democratic press bears a very real responsibility, says the Vancouver News-Herald. In informing the public of the trend of battle its tidings have a direct effect on national morale.

When the news in the press is good spirits rise. When it is bad they fall.

Now all this is commonplace, but it is given special significance by the circumstances of modern warfare—the rapid shifts on the many fronts on land, sea and air. These combine to place the press in the position of interpreter. It frequently must choose on the same day between featuring news of Allied victories or reversals.

The natural tendency may be toward magnifying successes, minimizing defeats. But, and from the viewpoint of morale, it does not follow that this is a commendable course to take.

In the long run an adequately informed public is a better guarantee of national morale than an over optimistic public—ill-prepared for anything save golden victory.

As we see it then the duty of the democratic press in war time includes telling the truth—even when it hurts.

#### Regularity Important . . .

One of the Daily News subscribers on Thursday paid a compliment to one of the Daily News delivery boys by remarking that one could almost tell the time by noting the time when the paper was delivered at the home. That is a very important thing for a lad to learn and it is also important to the newspaper and the subscriber to have such a lad. We wish we had more of them.

#### Dastardly Murders . . .

The bombing of the undefended city of Belgrade by the Germans was nothing better than dastardly mass murder. Not only men but thousands of women and children were innocent victims. It is in line with the German brutalities carried out in other countries. It is an example of German "kultur."

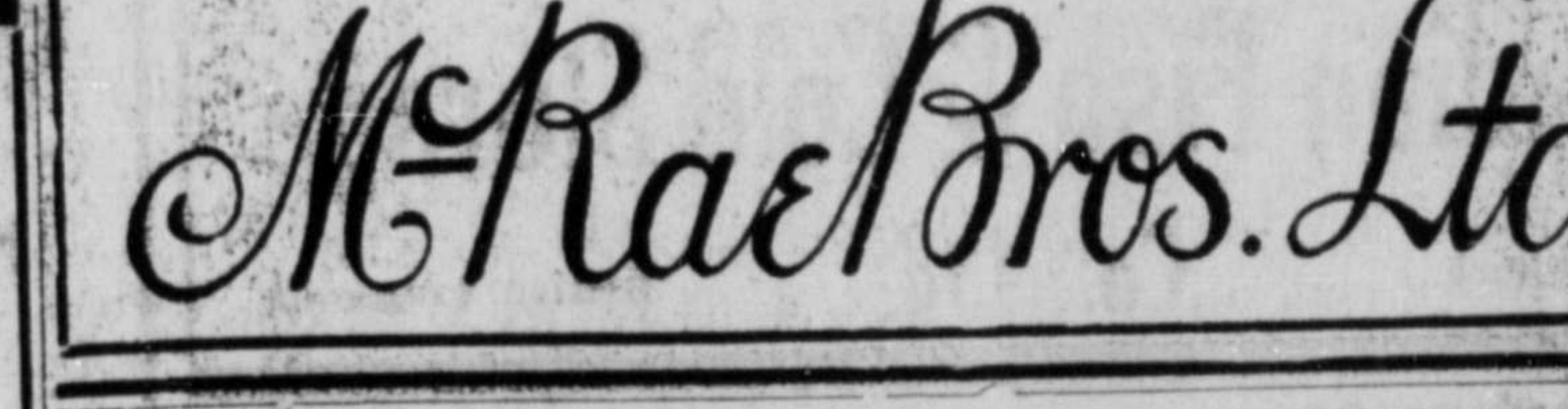

From The Waterfront

Dr. Large's New Boat Launched—Whaling Crews Arrive on Islands—Week-End Steamer Movements

An event of interest on the local waterfront at the week-end was the launching about midnight Saturday from the Suehiro boat yard in Cow Bay of Dr. R. G. Large's fine new 50-foot yacht which will be the largest of the Prince Rupert Rowing & Yacht Club fleet. The vessel took smoothly to the natural element and was later towed to a berth at the Yacht Club floats where she was a centre of interested inspection. The 175 h.p. Hall-Scott engine, with which she is to be equipped, will now be installed and the vessel will then have her pilot house and upper works completed. It is expected she will be completed and ready for operation by early summer.

J. J. Perry, who will be manager of the Naden Harbor station of the Consolidated Whaling Corporation this summer, came north to the Queen Charlotte Islands from Victoria on the Camosun this trip, accompanied by some thirty members of the crew. The Camosun also brought north the balance of the Rose Harbor crew. For the first time in some years, both Queen Charlotte Island whaling stations are to be operated this season.

Making her final voyage of the spring season on the Skagway route, C.P.R. steamer Princess Norah, Capt. William Palmer, arrived in port at 8:45 yesterday morning from Vancouver and sailed at 10 a.m. in continuation of her voyage to Alaska whence she will return here Thursday afternoon southbound. The Princess Norah brought in 105 passengers of whom ten disembarked at Prince Rupert, nine embarking on the vessel here for the north.

Union steamer Catala, Capt. Ernest Sheppard, arrived in port at 9:45 last night from the south, sailing at midnight for Skagway and other northern points whence she will return here tomorrow afternoon southbound.

The big seiner, the Zenardi, Captain Charles Haan, left Queen Charlotte City for Vancouver recently. The vessel will be overhauled in the south. Accompanying Capt. Haan were Mr. and Mrs. Gus Skog, Miss Beth Rudge, Frank Gale Jr. and Edmund Stevens.

Union steamer Camosun, Capt. James Watt, arrived in port at 9 o'clock Sunday morning from Vancouver via the Queen Charlotte Islands and, after running the special excursion to Port Simpson today, will sail at 10 o'clock tonight on her return south over the same route.
