LOSSES IN AIR WAR

LONDON-Germany lost 113 planes in the air war in April and Britain lost 106, it is estimated. Of the German planes 87 were night bombers. Since the beginning of the war Germany has lost 3306 planes and 863 British machines were lost over Great Britain while 594 failed to return from the continent.

YUGO SLAVS ARRIVE

LONDON-A 11,064 ton YugoSlav submarine and two motor torpedo boats have arrived at a British port, it is announced by the Admiralty. YugoSlav soldiers have also arrived.
