

NAZI SUPPLY SHIPS SUNK

LONDON-The Admiralty today announced that the Royal Navy had sunk three supply ships and an armed trawler intended to supply the German battleship Bismark and other Nazi warships.

SYRIAN CLASH IMMINENT

NEW YORK-Dispatches received here indicate that a clash between Great Britain and Germany in Syria is becoming increasingly imminent. German forces have occupied Damascus, the National Broadcasting Co.'s reporter in Ankara, Turkey, said last night in a broadcast to the United States. Airnorts elsewhere in the French-mandated country are also being occupied. Plane after plane of Axis forces are being flown into Syria from the Dodocanese Islands and it was estimated last night that five thousand were already in the country. There are indications too that the British are preparing to move in Palestine. British bombers attacked Italian aircraft in an airdrome at Aleppo yesterday, destroying one craft by direct hits and reporting hits on hang: "s and runways, according to Royal Air Force Announcement.

BREAK OFF RELATIONS

WASHINGTON- United States Ambassador to Great Britain, John G. Winant, is understood to have recommended to President Franklin D. Roosevelt and the Department of State that the United States break off diplomatic relations with the Vichy government in view of extending collaboration with Nazi Germany.

CHUNGKING HEAVILY HIT

CHUNGKING-Japanese bombers subjected Chungking, provisional capital of China, last night to the worst air raid it has yet suffered. Seventy-two Nipponese planes took part, starting many fires and causing numerous casualties and widespread damage to the city. It is estimated that five hundred persons have been killed this week in Japanese air raids on Chungking.

HORE-BELISHA ON WAR

LONDON-Rt. Hon. Leslie Hore-Belisha, former war secretary, speaking before the National Scottish Association, advocated common citizenship for the British Empire and United States in bringing about a new order. He also advocated a single allied council of industry in prosecuting the war. Hore-Belisha criticized the defence of Crete as a "military disaster" and warned against the "narcotic of false confidence in the future." The present situation aroused "serious forebodings." The first factor in defence was air protection. A 1921 war could not be won with 1914 methods.

SECRET MEETING

VICHY-It is rumored here that Chancellor Hitler of Germany and Premier Stalin of Russia have had a secret meeting at which widespread collaboration was agreed upon including arrangements for supplies of wheat from the Ukraine wherever there might be a shortage in Europe.

EDITORIAL

Wins Last Battle - - -

It has often been pointed out that Britain usually loses every battle except the last. While that is not literally true it indicates something that is not usually understood. Take a case like that of China. According parade and other counter-attracto all the old standards she was beaten years ago yet tures, scheduled for last night, now we find Japan practically admitting that she is un-were postponed. able to finish the job and gradually retiring from the field. The indications are that China will win the war, if she can hold her armies together. A local Chinese resident spoke of the attack on the Chinese capital yesterday as a last gasp.

In the first four years of the last war with Germany, the British fought mostly losing battles but they won the war. Just now it seems as if the Germans were spreading themselves out too much. The British are growing in strength while the Germans are gradually growing less able to defend the huge territory they have taken.

They will lose, as they did before.

Need of Ships - - -

As the need for ships grows greater the importance of Prince Rupert increases. The taking over of control of the shipyard by the government means that it is part of the permanent war work and each man is an important unit in the defence of Canada. Ships are needed, not only little corvettes but big freighters. Probably the freighters are now more important than the litle war vessels. The great thing from this time on will be to get them built as quickly as possible so that more will be built as soon as they are finished.

Intimidation Policy - - -

Germany is again following out the policy of intimidation which she has carried out throughout the war.! Announcing what she is going to do seems to be the settled policy of that country. She announces now that she is going to clear out the Eastern Mediterranean, take the Suez Canal and North Africa including Egypt. She also, plans to take the oil wells, using Syria as the route to be followed. The British Mediterranean fleet is to be annihilated and nothing will remain to the poor British people once Hitler is through with them. That is the bombastic threat sent out on the radio.

out. He has not been able to take Britain.

It will be noted that accompanying these threats and FOR SALE—'30 Chev. sedan, good Spitfire and Hurricane reached the movement of Japan against the Dutch East Indies, peace rumors are being sent out, evidently from the ton, Inlander Rooms. same source. The fact is that Hitler knows he is overreaching himself in the Meditteranean and would like a rest before turning his attention to Russia.

We do not quite understand the rumors coming out of Turkey to the effect that plans are being laid for an attack by the Germans on Russia. At one time it is Germany and Rumania and at another Germany and Poland. It is quite possible that Russia is prepared to dispute Germany's claim to the oil fields of Iraq and Iran and that this is a good time to implement the objection while the Germans are fully engaged with the British. Should the Russians move now and the Free French' movement, encouraged by such a move, gain impetus in Africa, the Germans might find themselves surrounded and in a perilous position. But this is all speculation.




