

FIRST MEETING LAST NIGHT IN NEW CITY HALL

REAL ESTATE EXCHANGE AND THE CITY ASSESSMENT ROLL

QUESTION OF HOW FAR THE DOCUMENTS AND BOOKS OF THE CITY DEPARTMENTS SHOULD BE ACCESSIBLE TO THE GENERAL PUBLIC COMES UP IN COUNCIL.

Members of the Real Estate Exchange of Prince Rupert, through their affiliated body, have applied to the City Council of Prince Rupert for permission to examine the books of the City Assessor's department so as to ascertain facts regarding transfers, ownership of lots, etc., to facilitate their business.

The question of how far the public, whether real estate men or not is permitted to consult the assessment records came up in council last night and was closely investigated.

City Assessor McLennan stated that the Municipal Clauses Act provides for a charge of 25 cents per lot search. The assessor was in favor of granting facilities for the public to consult the records provided his department was not hindered in its work. The Mayor and some of the aldermen expressed themselves as under the impression that all city hall records were open for inspection at all lawful times by the general public. This, however, does not appear to be

quite the case, and the matter of the real estate men's request stands referred to the Finance committee for consideration with power to make arrangements convenient.

ASSISTANT ENGINEER OF THE RAILWAY COMMISSION EXPECTED

RAILWAY SOON TO BE OPENED TO REGULAR TRAFFIC AS FAR AS SKEENA CROSSING—BALLASTING COMPLETED—SUPT. SAYS BRIDGE WILL BE FINISHED IN JULY.

In response to the question as to why the railway was not opened to general traffic from Newtown to Skeena Crossing, General Superintendent Mehan of the Grand Trunk Pacific said this afternoon that the work of ballasting was practically completed and that the company only awaited approval of the board of railway commissioners before inaugurating their regular schedule, which has already been prepared.

Mr. Mehan said that Assistant Engineers Kerr of the railway commission is expected to arrive on the next boat to examine and report upon the line. Mr. Mehan will suggest to Mr. Kerr that his report to the commission be made by telegraph so that the schedule can be put into force as quickly as possible after Mr. Kerr's examination.

The new time card, which has already been arranged by the Grand Trunk, provides that a passenger leaving Prince Rupert on a Wednesday afternoon, for instance, can reach Skeena Crossing by 6 o'clock p. m. and

by transferring to river boat will be enabled to arrive in Hazelton by 7 or 8 o'clock the same day. A trip which formerly required many days by steamer can soon be accomplished in one day by train and steamer. This year the traveling public have been particularly hampered by the steamboat service for the reason that water in the river has been exceptionally high and the boats have been unable to navigate regularly through the Big Canyon.

In the event that Mr. Kerr's report is telegraphed to the railway commissioners and they sanction the opening of the line by wire, the new schedule can be expected to be put into operation within a very few days after the arrival of Mr. Kerr. The opening of the line to general traffic as far as Skeena Crossing will be a decided help to the interior and to Prince Rupert.

Speaking of work on the bridge across the Skeena, Superintendent Mehan said that he was confident that the big undertaking would be finished by the first of July.

RIVER STEAMER IS DRAWN OVER FALLS AND BLOWN UP

With Barge in Tow S.S. Mildred Was Approaching Lock on Lievre River When Engine Failed---Crew Leapt for Their Lives as Vessel Plunged Stern First Over Dam Into Rushing Rapids Where She Swamped and Sank, Blown to Pieces by a Bursting Boiler

(Special to Daily News.)
Buckingham, Quebec, May 28.—An extraordinary accident in the process of Lievre River steamer traffic occurred here today, resulting in the total loss of a steamer and barge, but fortunately not with loss of life as well. The accident occurred as the river steamer Mildred was being brought into the lock from above with the stream.

In the strength of the current, The Mildred had a heavy barge in tow, and when the engine stopped the barge swung into midstream dragging the steamer with it. Realizing that the steamer was helplessly drifting into danger by being sucked stern first over the dam, captain, crew and engineers jumped from the deck for their lives.

saw the vessel take the wild leap in the foaming water, which boiled all over and into her as she dipped stern first into the race. She swamped almost at once and sank.

Boiler Blew Up.

As the water closed over the boat there was a terrific explosion which it touched the boiler and furnace. In a burst of spray and shattered timber the Mildred was literally blown to pieces. Her wrecked hull and machinery remain at the bottom of the boil below the dam. The barge broke away from her and was salvaged upturned farther down stream.

Plunged Over Dam.

Scarcely had they got clear of the vessel when the barge was caught by the rush over the dam and plunged downward, jerking the steamer faster still toward the fall. From the bank of the river the crew and other watchers

THE PROV. GOVT. SWOOPS DOWN

Considerate Authorities Demand Payment of City's Debt to Them at Earliest Convenience. Mayor Refers Matter to Finance Committee.

FORTY LOTS TRANSFERRED

Important Sale of Realty in Section 8—\$15,500 Transaction.

English and some local capital has been concerned in the transfer of a number of desirable lots, some forty in all, situated in Section 8. The deal has just been completed, Mr. W. Kissick of Messrs. Pattullo & Radford acting for the seller of the lots, and Mr. H. O. Crew of the Prince Rupert Agencies for the purchasers. Mr. A. C. Mitchell of Tebury, Gloucestershire, England, represents the English capital invested and L. W. Patmore is one of the local men interested. The consideration involved is some \$15,500, the average price per lot being \$390 (not \$290, as erroneously reported in another paper.)

These lots are all picked and have never before been offered separately in Rupert. They were purchased originally en bloc and resold in the same way. They will now probably be put on the market on easy terms through the Prince Rupert Agencies and Messrs. Pattullo & Radford.

WHERE CITY IS LIABLE

In Case of High Lots Overhanging Dangerously on Streets Deep Graded, but Not Where Buildings Are Menaced.

In the opinion of the city solicitor, given at last night's council meeting, the city is liable for removal of any loose rock on high lots facing deep cut streets, but is not liable for danger caused to buildings in deeply excavated lots. The situation is that while in the first case the city's operations have caused the danger, in the other case the lot owners themselves are to blame.

CITY WILL BUY LEAD IN SOUTH

Local Tender May Not Be Accepted, as It Would Establish a Dubious Precedent—Telegraph Trouble Reacts on Local Firm.

Messrs. Crane & Co.'s tender for twenty-two tons of lead wool for hydro electric work at \$7.80 per ton was accepted by the Council last night. The same Vancouver firm's tender for pig lead at a rate of \$32.50 lower than the other tenderers was also accepted. Messrs. Clark Bros. of Prince Rupert were bidders and were some \$88 higher on the lead wool tender than Crane Bros. on their first tender, but had received by wire a lower quotation after the tenders had been opened. There was some little discussion, in which Alderman Clayton favored acceptance of Clark Bros.' local tender. The firm had been under the hardship of having their wires delayed by the bush fires. However, as the precedent of allowing the acceptance of a tender received after the others had been opened would not do, decision was come to as noted.

GOVERNMENT AND RAILWAY COMMISSION.

The Dominion government has reversed a decision of the Railway Commission and created a precedent which is of more than ordinary importance and which may have a serious effect upon the future of this very important body.
Last December the Railway Commission decided that the Grand Trunk Pacific would have to carry out its agreement in the matter of a station for Hazelton. It seems that the company entered into an agreement regarding the location of the station with a prominent person, who was also a leading Liberal. For some reason the Grand Trunk Pacific desired to change its plans. Chairman Mabee held that the railway company would have to honor its agreement and that it was no more exempt from such obligations than a private individual.
The railway company had right of appeal, either to the Supreme Court, where the case would be decided upon its merits, or to the Governor General in Council, which meant the Dominion cabinet. It appealed to the Dominion government.
The government reversed the decision made by Chairman Mabee and allowed the Grand Trunk Pacific to dishonor its agreement.
Upon the merits of the location of the station the Albertian has no information. But there is a question of principle which should be carefully considered. The Railway Commission has been very strong because it has been as independent as a court and has been active and aggressive. It has obeyed the rules of common sense.
But the Dominion government by reversing the decision of the Railway Commission has made the first move to destroy the usefulness of the commission. It has brought the Railway Commission into practical politics.
From this time forward that body can no longer be considered an independent one as it was from its creation by the Laurier government to the present time. From this time forward it must be regarded simply as an adjunct of the Dominion cabinet. No judgment which it may render can be considered binding if political and corporate influence of sufficient weight can be brought to bear upon the government to secure its reversal. The country can no longer have confidence in the power of the commission to protect it against aggression or secure its rights against the encroachments of any transportation company.—Calgary Albertian.

G. T. P. BLAST VS. RICH RUSSIANS
C. N. R. GRADE COMING TO B. C.

Thousands Will Settle Soon in this Province—It is Expected that About One Hundred Thousand Will Cross Mountains
Vancouver, May 28—No less than one hundred thousand Mennonites, a Quaker sect resident in the Geran provinces of Russia, contemplate immigrating to British Columbia. Their representatives have been in Vancouver and Victoria, and have looked over various agricultural and fruit growing districts. They will make a favorable report and expect to bring out an initial contingent of ten thousand people before next fall. They are thrifty and industrious people and while deeply religious they are said to have none of the erratic idiosyncrasies of the Doukhobors, who also came from Russia. The agents now touring British Columbia stated that each head of the family will start with an average capital of four thousand dollars. They expect to transfer the entire Mennonite population of Russia to British Columbia within four years.

THAW CONTESTS WIFE'S DIVORCE

Mrs. Thaw Wants to Return to Utage—Baby Boy Is Her Constant Companion—Her Allowance Is \$5,000.

New York, May 25.—Evelyn Nesbit Thaw, disheartened by the obstacles that debar her divorce from Harry K. Thaw, is directing an effort to collect \$15,000, the amount of three checks given to her by her husband and his mother immediately after Thaw's commitment to Matteawan. Payment on these checks was stopped.
With the beautiful baby boy, whose constant and devoted companion she has been ever since his birth in Europe twenty-one months ago, and with \$15,000 capital, she hopes to cut loose forever from Thaw, abandoning the \$5,000 a year she long has received from him. Her ambition is to return to the stage.
She will not be a witness in the habeas corpus proceedings before Justice Keogh in White Plains next month if she carries out the purpose she has announced to friends. She intends to leave this jurisdiction, she has said, so that she may not be summoned. She is now especially anxious to avoid the public scrutiny due to each successive Thaw hearing.
Such curiosity now repeated would involve probably an exploitation of the infant, to whom she is tenderly attached and who has already had more than its share of mystery.
The child was born in Hamburg, Germany, a little less than a year after the last test of Thaw's sanity in White Plains before Justice Morchauser in July and August, 1909.
Thaw on the stand there disclaimed any animosity toward his wife, though she testified for the State, which she could not have been forced to do and which, therefore, she was assumed to have done of her own wish.
That was the last time Evelyn Thaw saw her husband. In the year following she lived in New York through the winter, went to Hamburg, not to Paris, and spent several months there. In the early summer of 1910 the infant,

who has been with her ever since, appeared.
Immediately after Thaw, because of insanity, had been acquitted of murder and committed to Matteawan on February 1, 1908, a contract was prepared between his representatives and his wife. By it she was to receive \$5,000 cash and \$5,000 a year. Its other terms affected her conduct during the life of the contract. She was debarred from accepting any stage engagement or other occupation which would place her in the public eye and serve to continue by any act of hers the notoriety she had won as a figure in the story of her life with Thaw and before that told at his trials.

Pittsburg, Pa., May 25.—"The report that Evelyn Thaw is the mother of a 21 months old baby is not true," said Roger O'Mara, the detective, today.
O'Mara for years has assisted the Thaw family in the fight for the freedom of Harry Kendall Thaw, the slayer of Stanford White, now battling for his release from Matteawan insane asylum in New York.

ANOTHER TITANIC

New German Liner Will Carry 5,000 Passengers.

Berlin, May 24.—The new giant Hamburg-American liner Imperator was launched today. Emperor William and a notable company of government officials, besides a large number of special agents, were present at the launching. It is expected that the vessel will make her first transatlantic voyage next winter.
The Imperator is the largest German ship and is surpassed in size only by the Cunarder Aquitania, now under construction. The Imperator will be of fifty thousand tons register. She is nine hundred feet long, and will be equipped with internal combustion engines and two 1,500 horse power Diesel motors, and will use oil as fuel.
There will be eleven decks on the big liner, and she will be fitted in the most luxurious style. There will be a number of special suites among her cabins, elevators, private restaurants, swimming baths, tennis courts and roller skating rinks. The Imperator will accommodate 5,000 passengers.

GIRL BANDIT WHO SHOT MEN

Famous Robber's Wife Dies in the East — Claimed to Have Killed Many With Her Rifle—Called Herself Mrs. Jesse James.

Ashbury, N.Y., May 28—After an illness of five weeks Mrs. Della Fox, who once posed as "Mrs. Jesse James," and widow of the notorious "Texas Charlie," who was a member of the James gang of bandits, is dead.
Mrs. Fox in the days of the bandits was counted a crack rifle shot. She reformed after the breaking up of the James gang, and the death of her husband, and published a book in which she admitted that many a ball from her rifle had struck home, and more than one luckless fellow tumbled to his death as the result of her unerring aim.
After her conversion Mrs. Fox or Mrs. James, as she called herself, became a worker in the slums, and was noted for her charity and goodness to the poor. Mrs. Fox leaves no relatives. Her funeral will be held from the residence of a Mrs. Doughty, a warm friend, who has taken charge of the arrangements.

WANT A WORLD WITHOUT ANY LOUD, UNNECESSARY NOISE

SCIENCE NOWADAYS IS BUSY WITH THE PROBLEM OF THE PRODUCTION OF SILENCE, OR RATHER OF THE ELIMINATION OF SOUND IN CARRYING ON WORLD'S AFFAIRS.

Cambridge, Mass., May 25.—Science is planning a comparatively noiseless world—a world in which clamor and clangor are reduced to a minimum. Men of learning, such as Dr. Clarence John Blake, professor of otology at Harvard medical school, says there is absolutely no reason why there should not be such a world in existence if the people of this and supposedly other civilized countries can be weaned away from the survivals of savagery. Noise, at least loud noise, he says is needless.

When five hundred distinguished physicians and savants from all parts of Europe and America meet in the halls of the Harvard medical school next August in the National Otological Congress this matter of noise will be one of the most discussed topics.

It is contended that the hustle and bustle of city life, the tooting of whistles, the roar of trains

and other noises are taking its toll from the health of the community. The ear is becoming abnormal and blunted, the sensitive mechanism of hearing, in an effort to exclude the never ending annoyance, is thickening. Gradually the roar of the city works upon the nerves and brain, producing irritation and exhaustion. Nervous prostration, a disease of cities, is one result; deafness another, and suffering to the weak and convalescent still another.

"Noise," Dr. Blake says, "is barbarous. Its presence in a community points to barbarism. If we pretend to a higher civilization something must be done to prevent it. The question of noise is a question of economics because the prominence of unnecessary noise is a much an indication of a waste of energy as the heating of a bearing in a machine."

The congress next August will go fully into ways and means of making the world noiseless.

NEW BRUNSWICK ELECTION DATE

Premier Fleming Goes to the People for the First Time on Thursday, June 20th—First Election Since 1908.

(Special to Daily News.) Fredericton, May 28.—The order for the dissolution of the legislature of New Brunswick was signed at Sackville Saturday by Lieutenant Governor Woods. Thursday, June 20th, has been named as polling day, with nomination proceedings a week earlier. The last general election in New Brunswick was the memorable one of March 3, 1908, when the old administration, in power for upward of twenty years, was defeated and Hon. J. D. Hazen called upon to form a new government. Last October, when Hazen became minister of marine and fisheries at Ottawa, Hon. J. K. Fleming became premier of New Brunswick, and now makes his first appeal to the people.
