MIDSHIPMAN BEARD LOST

LONDON-Midshipman T. N. K. Beard, son of Commander T. Beard, R. N. C. retired, Victoria, is among 1418 officers and men lost in the sinking of the battle cruiser Hood last May 25, the admiralty announced last night. Commander Beard commanded the Canadian auxiliary cruiser H.M.C.S. Prince Robert which captured the German freighter Weser in Mexican waters last fall.

RUSSIANS MAKING GOOD

MOSCOW-The Red Army, in a smashing counter-attack thirty miles northeast of Smolensk, has thrown German forces back westward in an eight-day battle in which more than ten thousand Germans were killed and wounded, Russian dispatches from the front said today. The battle occurred in the direction of Yartsevo which is on the main highway between Smolensk and Moscow. The Moscow radio said that the Russians are now in a position to invest Smolensk. Another dispatch reported the recapture by Leningrad's defenders of a strategically important crossroads village on one of the approaches to the city, a manoeuvre declared by the Russians to have wrecked German plans for a new thrust against Leningrad itself.



Scorched Earth

Many people have asked what is meant by the "scorched earth policy" adopted by the Soviet government. We assume that most people know but for those who do not our understanding of it is that when the Russians retreat they leave nothing behind that can be used by the enemy except the scorched earth. Everything is burned or otherwise destroyed. All supplies used by the enemy have to be imported. Houses have to be built. The country is a desert, uninhabitable. The farms are deserted. This is not so bad in the summer but in the winter it will! be terrible for the invaders. If they could capture Lenin-; grad and quarter the men on the inhabitants, it would not be too bad. Evidently the plan of the Russians is to destroy the city in case they have to leave. That was what was done when Moscow was invaded by Napoleon. It is a terrible thing to do but is effective. What use to the enemy is a burned city?

Civic Centre Helped . . .

The recent carnival came fully up to expectations so far as finances are concerned. Four thousand dollars added to the present nest egg of approximately nine thousand gives the fund quite an impetus and it is hoped that now something may be done toward getting started on the new building. Such a place is needed just now, perhaps worse than it will be after the war. We congratulate the young men of the city on the excellent showing they have made.

Wartime Production . . .

According to the minister of labor, Hon. Norman McLarty, Canada will not reach the peak of her wartime activity until well on in next year. In order to meet · the demand for labor to carry out this work the utmost is being done by industry to train men for the work they are asked to undertake. In spite of the efforts made to carry on the work expeditiously and well there are delays. In the first six months of this year, according to figures supplied to the Department of Labor in Great Britain, the loss due to strikes and various other causes amounted to 41 in every thousand. In Canada the loss was 54 in the thousand and in the United States the loss was 381 to the thousand. This speaks very well for Canada, because in Britain, while the distractions are greater, the people are kept constantly on edge and this must act as an urge to carry on to the utmost capacity knowing that production of work materials is a matter of life and death.




