War Clouds Are Lower

BULGARIAN BREAK IS IMMINENT

Great Britain May Be At War With Bulgaria At Any Moment Now

LONDON, March 4: (CP)— An authoritative source said that Great Britain might break off diplomatic relations with Bulgaria within the next twenty-four hours. The departure of the British minister, George Rendel, is expected by that time. He is said to have been unable to secure any guarantee that Germany does not intend to use Bulgaria as a springboard for an attack on Greece. Berlin said that Rendel had already left Sofia.

A virtual promise is said to exist whereby Great Britain will attack Germany in Bulgaria as soon as diplomatic relations are broken off. The almost certain attack will take place where German troops are located in Bulgaria.

In Berlin it was stated today that Germany was now ready to smash any adversary that might offer resistance in the Balkans. There were adequate German forces ready to meet any challenge.

All military establishments are being moved out of Sofia in order to establish it as an "open city" in the hope that it will be spared from British bombing.

Air War Kept Up

LONDON, March 4:— The Royal Air Force carried out another heavy bombing attack during the night on Cologne as well as elsewhere in Western Germany, the Ruhr and Channel invasion ports. The Welsh city of Cardiff was subjected to a blitz attack by the Nazis last night. Heavy damage was done and there were many casualties, mostly among women and babies.

Bulgarian Assets Are Being Frozen

United States Takes Action As Bulgarian Nation Yields To Germany

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 4: (CP)— An order was signed last night by President Franklin D. Roosevelt freezing all Bulgarian assets in the United States. The action followed German troop occupation of Bulgaria.

WHAT WILL TURKEY DO?

Hitler Said to Have Served Demands On Ankara—Seeks Breaking of British Pact

ISTANBUL, Turkey, March 4: (CP)— A German mission arrived by air at Ankara today and delivered to President Inonu of Turkey what was believed to be a message from Chancellor Adolf Hitler. The message was reported to have assured Turkey of Germany's "peaceful intentions" but it was also said that there was a threat of "definite action" unless Turkey abandoned her alliance with Great Britain.

In spite of the reported German pressure, the official Turkish radio last night indicated that it was the intention to resist this pressure. The people were warned that Turkey was nearer war as a result of the German invasion of Bulgaria.

Turkish officials were said to consider the non-aggression pact with Bulgaria nullified as a result of Bulgaria having now become a "Nazi province."

TODAY IS DEADLINE

Tokyo Wants Reply By This Evening From France In Regard To Thai-Indo-China Dispute

TOKYO, March 4: (CP)— Domei, Japanese news agency, indicated today that Japan, for the second time in a week, had sent a time limit for reply by France to proposals for settlement of her Indo-China border dispute with Thailand. The News Agency said that Foreign Minister Matsuo is believed to have told the French ambassador, Charles Henri, that a final answer was expected by Wednesday noon or 7 p.m. Pacific Standard Time tonight.

Matsuo and the ambassador met today to discuss a modified plan advanced by Japan but authoritative sources said they failed to reach an agreement.

Tone Of Market Better Although Averages Lower

NEW YORK, March 4:—The tone of the New York Stock Exchange appeared somewhat improved today although averages during the first hour of trading were down slightly. The industrial average was 120.77, off .11, and rails, 27.28, off .04.

Governor General Coming To Coast

Their Excellencies Are Planning on Spending Two Weeks at Victoria

OTTAWA, March 4.—The Governor General, the Earl of Athlone, and Princess Alice will leave Ottawa May 29 for a trip to the Pacific Coast. Two weeks will be spent at Government House in Victoria.

NEW YORK COPPER

NEW YORK, March 4:—Copper price was unchanged on the New York metal market today with May at 11.80c per pound.

Consolidate Industries In England

LONDON, March 4: (CP)— The government decided today to shut down or consolidate more than fifty civilian industries, employing one million workers, and to shift all available man power and materials to arms manufacture. The first industries to be affected will be hosiery, pottery, textiles and leather.

AGREEMENT COMPLETED

Greece And Great Britain In Accord On All Important Questions

ATHENS, March 4:— Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden and the Greek government have reached complete agreement on all important questions, it was announced today. This is the result of conferences which Eden and General Sir John Dill, British chief-of-staff, have had with the Greek authorities in regard to the Balkan situation.

HAS RUN BLOCKADE

German Ship Arrives At Rio De Janeiro From French Port With Nazi-Made Goods

RIO DE JANEIRO, March 4.— Having successfully run the British naval blockade and reporting an uneventful voyage, a North German Lloyd freighter of 3000 tons arrived here yesterday from unoccupied France with German-made goods.

Senate Reopens Session Tonight

Is Reconvening Following Recess Which Commenced Last Fall

OTTAWA, March 4.—The Canadian Senate reconvenes tonight after having been recessed since last fall. Business is expected to be entirely of routine nature. There are Senate vacancies from Saskatchewan and Quebec.

LONDON IS DISDAINFUL OF RUSSIA

Protest To Bulgaria At Occupation By Germans Regarded Merely As Weaw "Face Saver"

LONDON, March 4:— Official London treats with disdain the protest of Soviet Russia to Bulgaria at permitting the entry of Nazi forces. The protest is described as "half-hearted and weak" and is regarded only as a "face saver." It is doubted if it will be followed by any action on the part of the Soviet. Significance is attached to the fact that Moscow's protest is made only to Bulgaria and not to Germany itself.

Yesterday Tass, official Russian news agency, announced the protest having been made by the Soviet government to Bulgaria at permitting the Nazi occupation. The occupation, it was pointed out by Moscow, constituted a threat of extension of the war to the Balkans, bringing the conflict perilously close to Russian interests.

Russia, the protest said, could not support Bulgaria's action in opening the country's borders to the entry of German troops. Further it was denied that the Soviet had given its secret blessing in advance to the Nazi advance into Bulgaria. The Soviet Union had not been informed beforehand of such a move and, indeed, had not learned of it officially until Saturday when the invasion had already begun. Such was the first official disclosure of Russian attitude toward German policy in the Balkans.

It was not disclosed at first whether a similar protest had been made to Germany but it later became known that it had not.

BRITISH PROGRESS

More Towns Captured In Italian Somaliland—R.A.F. Busy In Eritrea and Ethiopia

140,000 PRISONERS LONDON, March 4.—Answering a question in Parliament today, Rt. Hon. David Margesson, Secretary for War, announced that Italian prisoners in Africa now numbered 140,000.

NAIROBI, Kenya, March 4: (CP)—British forces have occupied Isola Baldo and Buloburti in Italian Somaliland, a communique announced. The total number of captives there is now approaching ten thousand.

While the British continue their advance in Italian Somaliland, the Royal Air Force continues active in Eritrea and Ethiopia. Cheren, important Eritrean centre, is still being concentrated upon.

War News

COLOGNE IS ATTACKED

LONDON—Cologne was the main target of attacks which bombers launched last night on objectives in German Rhineland. The Royal Air Force also swept along the German held coast. In the attack on Cologne the right bank of the Rhine was concentrated upon and large fires were started. Berlin announced officially that the Royal Air Force had penetrated western Germany, including the Ruhr, making heavy attacks, asserting that the attack was mainly upon civilian population.

CARDIFF HEAVILY RAKED

CARDIFF, Wales—Cardiff was raked for hours last night by a hail of incendiary bombs in what officials described as one of the greatest fire raids of the war. Great fires raged at the height of the attacks but all were under control by morning. Smoking ruins marked a trail of destruction across the city, churches, shops and homes being razed. The number of casualties was not at first determined. They were known to include many women and babies. The enemy planes concentrated in waves on the city in the raid which was of blitz proportions. Points in the southeast Midlands, western England and east Scotland were also struck by the enemy last night.

FORCES ARE MASSING

BELGRADE—Seventy-five thousand German troops are reported massed on the Bulgarian frontier of Greece and many more than that on the Turkish frontier.

CALLED TO BERCHTESGADEN

BELGRADE—Prince Paul and the Yugoslav foreign minister are reported to be called to Berchtesgaden to receive Chancellor Adolf Hitler's demands.

ULTIMATUM TO RUMANIA

LONDON—It is reported unofficially that Great Britain has sent an ultimatum to Rumania demanding that German forces be expelled from that country on pain, through failure, of bombing starting on Rumanian objectives.

BATTLE OF ALBANIA

ATHENS—Heavy artillery activity and aerial combat has been carried out by the Greeks and British on the Albanian front. Yesterday two Italian planes were brought down.

LOSSES AT SEA

LONDON—The Admiralty announces today that thirteen British ships of tonnage totalling 60,989 tons were lost as a result of enemy action during the week ending February 23. One Allied ship of 7,034 tons was lost.

ITALIAN CITY BOMBED

ROME—The Italian port of Bari was bombed by the Royal Air Force last night. Fires visible for fifty miles were started.

EDITORIAL

Proposes Reconfederation - - -

After perusing the verbatim report of the recent short-lived conference at Ottawa on the Sirois report, H. G. Perry, M.L.A. for Fort George and well known Prince George editor, has come to the conclusion that to try to fix the blame for the abortive end of the conference "gets us nowhere." The discussion of who scuttled the conference is positively causing disunity throughout Canada. Times are much too grave to add fuel to the flames of discord by censuring anyone.

"To secure harmony and concord and to expedite final legislation," Mr. Perry believes that a national constituent assembly composed of all the Parliaments of Canada should be called to consider ways and means of redefining the powers of their respective parliaments in the light of necessities of way, considering the experience of the depression, the planning of economic structure after the war, assuring security for the people against want and poverty, re-establishment of defence forces and thoughtful consideration of the recommendations made by the Rowell-Sirois commission.

Such an assembly might be larger in numbers than the House of Commons is at present, Mr. Perry admits, but it would not be as large as many political conventions.

The conference of ministers only has already proven abortive. Such a conference merely represents the executive of the government. What is needed, Mr. Perry believes, is a re-Confederation.

Hints For Correspondents - - -

"There are certain points you ought to remember when dealing with editors," says the publicity director of the Red Cross. We reprint the points as they are timely and might guide correspondents generally. They are:

"First, the editor is publishing a newspaper to make his living. He wants his paper to be read and, if he prints your story, he wants it to be news which is written in a style his readers will enjoy.

"The editor is a busy man—so take well prepared news copy to him. He is usually racing against time and he wants news when it is news—today, and not a week later. He doesn't want to write a story at the last minute or rewrite one you have written wrongly. Try to follow his style.

"He wants to be treated fairly. He doesn't want to publish your news and then have you knock the paper.

"He wants to run his own business in his own way and he doesn't want you to tell him how to run his business, where to place your story and how to write the headline.

The editor has a passion for accuracy. He doesn't want to have to apologize later for mistakes, to have people complaining about misspelled names and inaccurate stories. He doesn't want people saying: 'You never can believe what you read in that paper!'

"He's actually a pretty good fellow and you can't blame him for these things if you really consider his point of view."

FINE WORK LAST YEAR

Much Accomplished To Assist In War—Annual Meeting Of Municipal Chapter—Mrs. Teng President

A year of valuable work, particularly in support of war causes, was indicated in reports presented last night at the annual meeting of Municipal Chapter, Imperial Order, Daughters of the Empire, at the Boston Cafe, some sixty-five members being in attendance. Reports presented included those from all the subsidiary chapters, each showing the amount of work done during the year.

Amounts donated to various war causes included the following: I. O. D. E. Bomber Fund \$304. National War Guests Fund \$126. United Services Hut \$120. Socks for Navy \$142.

Soldiers comforts made included 161 pairs of socks, 43 scarves, 114 sweaters, 222 helmets, 29 pairs of gloves, 204 handkerchiefs and 25 laundry bags, the total being 798 garments.

British relief clothing work included one refugee quilt, eleven pairs of pajamas and twelve pairs of boys' socks.

For camp libraries fifty books had been donated at a cost of \$10. In addition to the war work, donations had been made to Lakelse and Sealy Lake schools and there had been relief work for needy families.

**HIS CAREER
WAS HECTIC**

Trouble Both in Family and Royal Life Was Dead Alfonso's Lot

Domestic incompatibilities left the exiled King Alfonso of Spain with only his younger daughter, Maria Cristina, as his "home" companion. He met his estranged wife on several occasions, notably at the funeral of Prince Gonzalo and at christenings of the grandchildren, and there were frequent reports of conciliation. But none of these eventuated, nor did the equally frequent rumors that their marriage was to be annulled. Alfonso's former position as "Most Catholic Majesty" in Spain was emphasized whenever the Vatican had occasion to deny annulment reports.

Meanwhile the ex-monarch's political position developed disappointingly. When leaving the throne he had said: "My conscience tells me that this shunting of popular feeling (away from the monarchy) will not be for long."

Three years later a swing of the republic's electorate towards the conservative parties gave point to this prophecy but it was short-lived. Then when civil war started in Spain on July 17, 1936, with a revolt of monarchists, rightists and military men against the leftist government, Alfonso and his heir moved mysteriously about Europe and were said to be preparing for a restoration of power.

Another development was peace with the Carlists. That old line of rival Spanish kings had maintained its claims to the Spanish throne for a century but the death of Don Jaime of Bourbon, six months after Alfonso's dethronement, had removed the last active pretender of the family. Carlist adherents in Spain enlisted along with Alfonso's retainers in the 1936 insurrection.

Timely Recipes

GOLDEN SALAD

- 1 cup boiling water
 - 1/2 cup cold water
 - 1 tablespoon gelatine
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 4 tablespoons sugar
 - 1 1/2 cups grated raw carrots
 - 1/4 teaspoon grated onion
- Soak gelatine in 1/2 cup cold water. Add boiling water. Add salt, sugar and vinegar. When jelly begins to set fold in carrots and onion. Pour into small moulds. Chill.

Then the fascist regime in Italy and the nazi government of Germany gave it active support. Pope Pius XI pronounced it a "just cause" and Alfonso took pains to renew his allegiance to the Vatican.

But as the insurgents drove to the outskirts of Madrid and won control of two-thirds of Spain, the monarchists in the organization fell into disfavor with General Francisco Franco, commander-in-chief. Alfonso's hopes were dashed when Franco was named "el caudillo" Spanish equivalent of "il duce" or "der Fuehrer," of the movement and then, in February, 1937, proclaimed that "the new Spain will represent a national family, one without masters or vassals, without poor or potentate."
