The Great Northern train was outbound to Seattle and the Canadian National coming in from the East.

An official statement was issued last night saying that the C.N.R. train had the right of way.

LONDON, July 25: (CP)-Incredible feats of endurance during the advance of British forces from Kenya to Addis Ababa were described by two officers who took part in the gruelling campaign.

## Japan Will Not Be Allowed To Carry On Aggression; Counter Moves Are To Be Carried Out

Upwards of One Million Nipponese Are Being Called to Arms—Details of Indo-China Concessions

## Far East Roundup

Japanese warships are said to have been sighted off the coast of southern Indo-China. The French authorities released their air-tight censorship this morning and the news flashed from Saigon. Japanese ships are reported at two points, off the great unfinished naval base of Camranh and down the coast at Saigon.

tomorrow. London reports this morning that Great Britain and the United States are in close consultation re-

garding the far eastern situation. A British naval commentator says flatly that Japan's move toward southern Indo-China cannot be considered a defensive measure.

Reports from Shanghai say flatly that Nippon will occupy the bases in the southern part of the French colony.

If Japan moves troops into the area, the Japanese will be thrusting a spear-head at Britain's stronghold of Singapore, the Dutch East Indies and the Philippine Islands.

Each of these points is about 700 miles from the port of Saigon in Indo-China.

# NEW RAIL CHIEF IN

R. C. Vaughan Appreciative of Staff -Discusses Situation in Business-Like Way

MONTREAL, July 25 .- The Canadian National Railways has a loyal and efficient staff of officers and employees and I am satisfied that, with their assured co-operation, we will be able to handle the ever-increasing business of the country expeditiously and efficiently, R. C. Vaughan, newly appointed president of the National System, stated in a press interview here today.

"Our net earnings have greatly timproved this year which indicates what can be accomplished when we receive a satisfactory volume of business" Mr. Vaughan continued. He added: "every company has a pay point, that it, a definite gross revenue which must be carned to cover fixed expenses. This cannot be avoided, no matter how drastic the curtailment, but, as gross earnings exceed that pay point, net earnings increase rapidly. Under normal conditions Eire consumes about 2,500,000 tons of coal a year, of which only five per cent is produced locally. The other

195 per cent must be imported. Production of peat in Eire, normally about 3,500,000 tons per year, will have to be almost doubled to ! replace coal. Use of peat in larger, quantities will entail the changing of coal burning furnaces and stoves to peat burners, and will cause many diffisulties in industry where coal is used to produce power.

Reforestation in Eire, a major government plan in recent years, has not yet reached a stage where the wood is of much economic use.

Consumption of oil in Eire as a heating fuel is very limited. The main effect of the fuel oil shortage will be on road transport services.


