FALL CAMPAIGN IN RUSSIA

BERLIN-Berlin admits that there must be a fall campaign in Russia owing to the unexpected resistance and seemingly never-ending reserves of the Soviet. Some believe that Hitler is in as much trouble in Russia as was Napoleon. The oil situation in the Reich is now critical and food and clothing are almost as bad. Decisive victories or early peace must be had by the Axis.

### BOYS ARE DECORATED

MOSCOW-Two fourteen-year-old Russian boys have been given special decorations—one for killing eighteen Germans in five days in guerrilla warfare behind the advancing lines and the other for causing the wreck of a German troop train. Women and children are engaged in effective sabotage in those sections of Russia occupied by the Nazis.

### VICHY GOING OVER

LONDON-The Vichy government is believed in reliable sources in London to be deciding to cast her lot with the Axis although, so far, a final decision is held up by General Maxim Weygand who is unwilling to agree with Admiral Jean Darlan's plan to turn finally against Britain.
