HOLIDAY SPORTS

MANY BOMBS ARE HURLED LONDON—Large forces of British bombers, despite adverse weather conditions, have dropped tons of bombs on Germany nightly since Friday night when main attacks were directed against the industrial districts of Frankfurt and Mannheim.

Japanese Zone of Safety

Entire Ocean Around Nipponese Islands Would Be Included in Plan to Hamper Shipping to Soviet

TOKYO, September 2: (CP)—Premier Konoye was reported to be considering the establishment of an ocean safety zone around Japan as the first step bearing United States aviation gasoline to Russia approached the Nipponese Empire's waters.

General Hayashi, director of the powerful Asia Development Federation representing sixty Nationalist groups, told the Federation today that Konoye had agreed to consider its proposal for a safety zone embracing the entire ocean area around Japan.

Will Not Hesitate to do so if Necessary to Combat Encirclement by Great Britain and United States

TOKYO, Sept. 2.—A Japanese military spokesman said yesterday that Japan will not hesitate at using force if necessary to combat encirclement by Great Britain and the United States, even if it involved Japan in a long war.

Admiral Darlan Is Reorganizing Is Making Changes in High Naval Command and in Merchant Marine of France

VICHY, Sept. 2.—Admiral Jean Darlan has instituted a shake-up in the naval high command and is also reorganizing the French merchant marine.

An official decree signed by Marshal Henri Philippe Petain and Admiral Darlan yesterday provided punishment ranging up to ten years imprisonment for deserting French seamen. The seamen have been signing aboard merchant ships to escape from France.

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Emergency Operating Room Here

A complete emergency operating room outfit was delivered to the Prince Rupert branch of the Canadian Red Cross Society at the end of the week for use here in the event of disaster such as air raid or some such calamity.

MOSCOW, Sept. 2.—The eleventh week of the war shows Russian forces holding firm all along the line.

Germany is making strenuous efforts to strike effective blows before the winter sets in and seems to have made a few gains but nothing spectacular.

The Russian high command is gathering its forces for a decisive blow against the German invaders, the Red Army's official organ, Red Star, says.

The German news agency DNB said that Soviet forces have made several more attempts in the past 24 hours to land on the Dnieper River bank and a number of troop laden boats were sunk by Nazi guns before they were able to reach shore.

The German High Command Saturday claimed that at least forty-three and possibly 82 Russian transports had been sunk in the Gulf of Finland by German mines and aircraft in the Russian evacuation of Tallin, the capital of Estonia.

Tass (Soviet) News Agency, however, circulated a dispatch in Moscow from Tallin reporting that Tallin was still in Soviet hands.

The Finnish command announced Saturday at Helsinki that Finnish forces have captured Vilpuri, 75 miles north of Leningrad, in a drive toward the Karelian Isthmus.

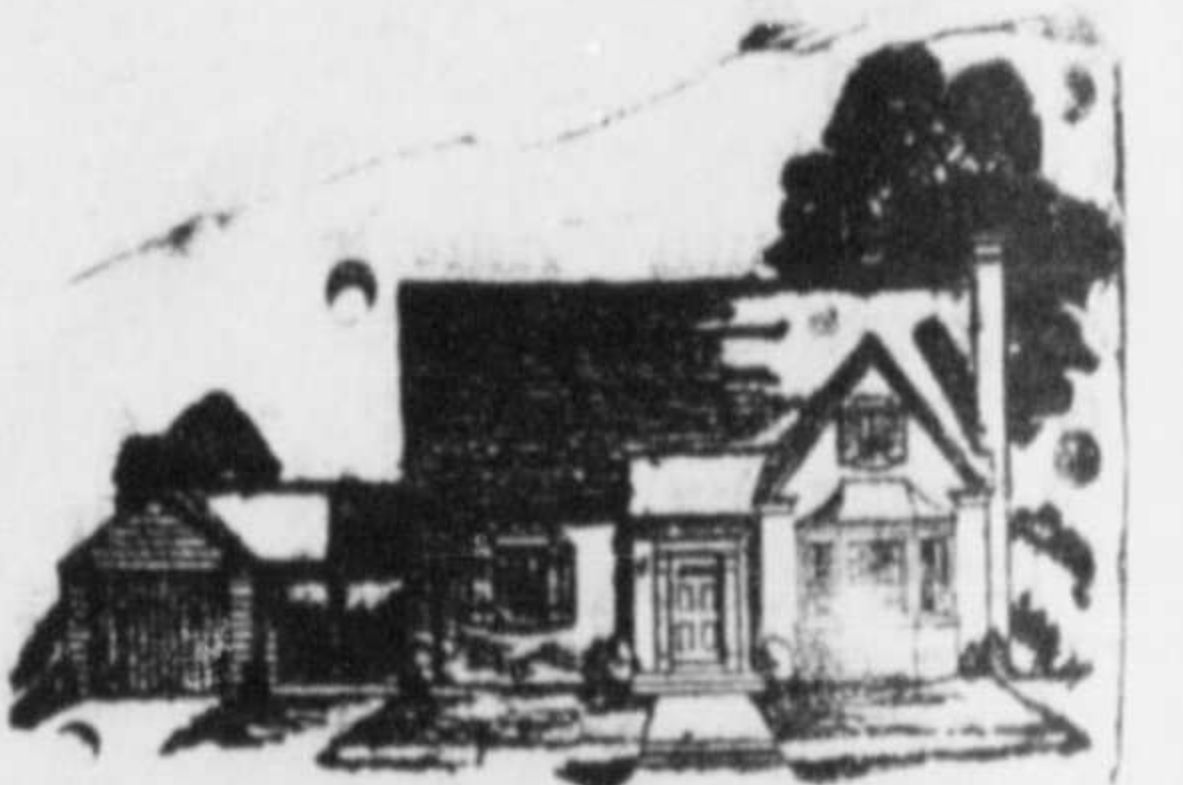

Whifflets From The Waterfront

Labor Day morning saw the waterfront busy at Prince Rupert with quite a line-up of coastal ships strung out along the docks. C. P. R. steamer Princess Louise, Capt. S. K. Gray, was at the government wharf from 9:30 until 11:30, being on her way from Vancouver to Skagway. She had on board 209 passengers of whom 31 disembarked here, five going north from Prince Rupert. Southbound Saturday she will have a capacity list. Right after the Louise arrived the C. N. R. steamer Prince Rupert, Capt. Neil McLean, southbound from Skagway to Vancouver, which sailed at 4 p.m. She had 212 passengers of whom five got off here. The Union steamer Catala, Capt. Ernest Sheppard, arrived at 7 a.m. from the south, sailing at 11 a.m. for Stewart and other northern points whence she returned here this afternoon at 2 o'clock southbound. At the Ocean Dock was the Northland Transportation Co.'s motorship, liner Northland which arrived at 9 a.m. and, after discharging salmon from Ketchikan, sailed at 7 p.m. in continuation of her voyage to Seattle. Boats from the south brought among their passengers many city and district school teachers.

Making her final call of the season at this port, C. P. R. steamer Princess Charlotte, Capt. William Palmer, arrived in port at 4:15 Saturday afternoon from Skagway and other Alaska points and sailed at 6 p.m. for Vancouver. 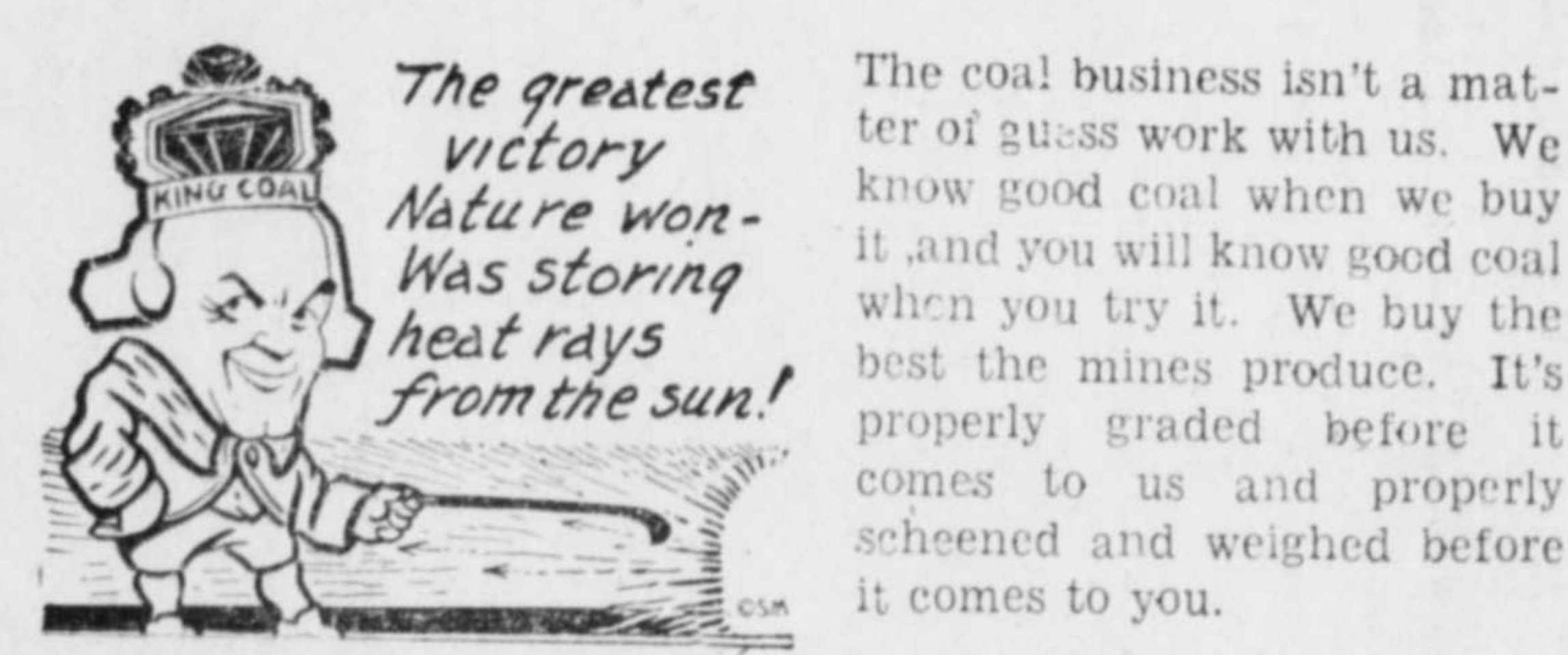
