GERMANS AT STANDSTILL

MOSCOW--Russian defenders are holding the Germans to a standstill all along the eastern front, Russian military authorities assert. There is no indication that Leningrad is near collapse. Nazi claims that the second city of the Soviet is almost encircled are a fantasy. Indeed several railways are maintaining communication from Leningrad to the rest of Russia. Heaviest fighting is to the south and one statement last night was that the German offensive was foundering. The Germans have been thrown back all along the central front as well as before Leningrad, it was declared, and there were also Russian successes around Kiev. Meanwhile in Berlin a statement was made that Leningrad would be conquered by steady seige without subjecting the city to heavy air bombardment or land shelling such s Warsaw and other cities had suffered.

WILL NOT FIGHT RUSSIA

SOFIA-Bulgaria is rejecting German demands that she declare war on Russia, it is said in authoritative quarters, although she would be ready to fight with Germany on any other front. There is traditional friendship between Bulgaria and Russia. Admiral Eric Raeder is being sent to Sofia to meet King Boris and other Bulgarian leaders.

American Warship Is Attacked By Torpedo From Unidentified Sub

WASHINGTON, D.C., September 5.—The United States Department of the Navy announced Thursday night that the United States destroyer Greer, enroute to Iceland with mail for American troops, had been attacked by firing of torpedoes from a submarine of undisclosed nationality in mid-Atlantic. The torpedoes missed their mark and it was not disclosed whether the submarine had been damaged when the Greer replied with depth charges.

The attack is belived to have taken place by day and it is considered possible that the submarine might have been a German mistaking the American destroyer for a British warship. The Greer is of the same type as the destroyers which the United States turned over to Great Britain.

It is the first time that a United States warship has been in action since the war began.

We have felt at various times that Russia, as the home struck the first coin. of the Bolshevik movement, has been too ready to interfere with the internal affairs of other countries. She has evidently got over that now and we see only a country defending her right to govern herself in her own way. In that stand she is being backed up by the British Empire.

There are still a great many people who would like to see Russia smashed by the Germans, each suffering equally. We cannot say that we agree with this view. Russia has a right to any kind of government she wishes as long as she does not try to force her views upon other countries. Perhaps her association with the British will be good for her and we shall both be better for that association. At any rate we seem destined to be allies for some time to come and we shall have to learn to understand each other better. If we have nothing else to learn from them we can learn how to fight effectively against a very powerful foe.

Tankers Arriving - - -

It seems evident that, if the Japanese had wished to do so, they might have intercepted the first American tanker arriving at Vladivostok for the Russians. Instead she has been threatening what she may do and backing this up by total mobilization of her forces. This in the old days was considered almost equivalent to a declaration of war but today it may not mean very much. It still seems. to us that Japan will hesitate a long time before plunging into a war with United States.

Men Clients Mostly and No High Pressure Methods, She Says

Edna Duschnes, a grandmother, has sold more than \$7,000,000 worth of insurance in 19 years by a system that shuns high pressure salesmanship.

The fruits of that system have made Mrs. Duschnes a life member of the Women's Quarter Mil-S lion Dollar Round Table, whose annual membership is limited to agents selling at least that much

insurance during the past year. "I'd no more think of going in to a person and asking him to buy life insurance than I'd jump out 2 for \$1 of the window," says Mrs. Duschnes. "It's a stupid thing to do.

"The idea is to find out what ! your client's life plans are and what he wants to accomplish. Then show him how he can do it. Twenty years ago men bought policies—chiefly for life insurance. Today we sell ideas-food, shelter. education.'

Women's Entree

Mrs. Duschnes told some of her other rules for success. Know your work, Be sincere. Don't bluff. Put yourself in the other fellow's place. She sells mostly to men, including a lot of Wall Street big-shots. Does no "cold canvass" (attempting to sell people who have never heard of her). Works only on contacts who are primed to see her. And, in spite of that no highpressure salesmanship creed, picks up her clients' ears in the first two minutes.

> " A woman can get in to see a man quicker than a man. He'll see her-but every barrier is up She can't get by with coquetting but she must be womanly. A man doesn't want to interview a woman that acts like a man. She has to say something in the first two minutes of that interview to catch his interest and she's got to know her stuff."

How She Starts

Mrs. Duschnes' favorite interest catcher is: "Mr. Jones, can you tell me how much privileged property you have?"

wr. Jones is an unusual man if he fails to fall for this one.

"What is privileged property?" he generally asks.—and the talk is on. (For your information privileged property is insurance. Much of it is untaxed).

Mrs. Duschnes thinks women make better insurance agents than men. "Not in the volume sold," she says, "but in the care with which it is sold, kept from lapsing, and readjusted. Women understand a man's home problems. They know the children have to have lunches and galoshes and that provision has to be made for those things whether there is in-
