The new British Columbia cabinet appointed by Hon. John Hart should prove quite satisfactory to the people of the province for it is Liberal enough to suit everybody. As the predominant party in the province is Liberal there should be no objection to that as it had been proposed to carry on the party without a majority. .

Mr. Hart should find no difficulty in carrying on the portfolio of finance in addition to leading the government. Mr. Maitland should fit in all right as attorney-general, and Mr. Anscombe should prove himself a capable and efficient minister of mines, minister of trade and industry. Mr. Pearson, Mr. Wells Grey and Dr. Macdonald are back at home in their respective places while H. G. Perry, a somewhat independent member, should add life to the cabinet. On the whole the selections are good and there is no reason to think the cabinet will give the province anything but good government.




