DOLPH HESS, HITLER'S SECOND LIEUTENANT, COMES DOWN IN SCOTLAND FOLLOWING FLIGHT CONTRARY TO ORDERS .

LONDON, May 12: (CP)—Rudolph Hess, No. 3 Nazi leader, has landed in Scotland, it was officially announced tonight.

Earlier it had been announced in Berlin that Hess, Adolf Hitler's No. 2 political heir, had crashed in his plane on a flight made contrary to Der Fuehrer's orders. This was announced by the Nazi party.

Hess' adjutants, accused of permitting the flight, have been ordered arrested in Germany. The brief announcement in Berlin did not

make it clear to what extent, if any, were the party deputy's injuries but Hess is said to have been in ill health.

The radio statement heard in London said that Hess took off from Augsburg, Germany, Saturday and had not been heard of since.

The announcement, continuing, said that Hess, piloting his own plane, was believed to have either crashed or fallen from the machine.

The Berlin announcement said that Hess left behind a confused letter.

BRITISH REVENGE

Mighty Bombing Raids Have Disastrous Results on Hamburg, Bremen and Other Reich Centres

LONDON, May 12: (CP)-British pilots wreaked vengeance on Germany last night in reprisal for the damaging raid on London Saturday night by beating at the port of Hamburg and Bremen again with mighty bombing attacks which left vast areas of flaming destruction. Hamburg was the focal point of the new assaults, the Air Ministry said, and "disorganization of vital parts" of that biggest of German harbors resulted. .. Shipbuilding yards for a distance of nine miles lining the banks of the River Elbe were crisscrossed with British fire, high explosive and incendiary bombs.

Last night's massive raids on Hamburg and Bremen followed similar attacks of equal intensity by the Royal Air Force on Thursday and Saturday nights. In all these raids widespread damage was done, enormous fires and explosions being caused in industrial plants, docks and other important military objectives.

Casualties were heavy, Germany admitting officially that ninety-four persons were killed in Hamburg alone on Thursday night.

The British raids have also included Emden, Berlin, Rotterdam, LaRochelle and other points along the invasion A German naval vessel and

Of Value To Prince Rupert - - -

Last week we published a story about the completion of the preliminary development of the Northern Pyrites Mine on the Ecstall River and the shipping away of the machinery. But for a typographical mix-up the article would have mentioned that the sulphur from the mine! might be used in connection with a pulp mill at Prince Rupert. However, the main idea was that the mine was pretty sure to be operated soon and that the mining operation was a large one and would mean a great deal to Prince Rupert when it got under way. Buildings and machinery installation will take a year or two and employ many men and after that there would be the shipping of the ore from Prince Rupert or Port Edward in ships calling regularly and carrying it to the smelter at Galveston, unless a smelter was established locally.

This is a property that will produce ore in quantities soon and the future of Prince Rupert will be vitally af- HOUSE centrally located or near ed with heavy losses. fected by it. It is about fifty miles from Prince Rupert but the ore must be shipped either from the docks here or from some other deep sea harbor and the only other harbor available is Porpoise Harbor, nine miles from Prince! Rupert. If between one and two thousand tons of ore a! day is shipped, anyone can figure out the number of ships,

that would be required to handle it.

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
