BIG HULL JOB HERE Joint Statement of War Aims Work on United States Transport Kvichak to Cost \$150,000 Of Churchill and Roosevelt

The Prince Rupert dry dock is today only awaiting the "go ahead'signal before commencing on the contract of complete rebuilding of the steel hull of the United States Army motorship transport Kvichak which stranded and sank a few months ago near Milbank Sound, later being towed here by the Armor Salvage Co. It is a \$150,000 job and is to be completed in eight weeks. One hundred and thirty steel plates are involved as well as keel, posts, frames, etc. The dry dock crew is ready to start on the work at

After the hull has been renewed, the Kvichak will be towed to Seattle where shafts and propellor work will be carried out. The two 500-diesel engines have already been renaired here. Also at Seattle will be carried out complete rebuilding of the superstructure to better fit the vessel for transport of troops and supplies to the Alaska defences.

AT A SOUTHEAST ENGLISH COAST TOWN-A large number of British planes roared across the Channel this afternoon to attack targets in German-occupied regions.

FRIGHTENED BY BOMBERS

LONDON-The new American fortress bombers, now being used by the British in air raids on Germany and German-occupied territory, are throwing fear into the people of the Reich. It cannot be told they are overhead until they have started their damage. There is reason to believe they will have a serious effect on morale both of civilians and fighting forces.

AIR WAR IS QUIET

LONDON-Bad weather over the continent last night prevented the Royal Air Force from carrying out the usual overnight forays against Germany. The German air force also failed to make raids on Great Britain.

RUSSO-GERMAN WAR

MOSCOW-Moscow admits Nazi gains in the direction of Moscow and Leningrad and the capture of Smolensk. There was an overnight Iull, however, and today the Germans were being hammered by counter-attacks in four different sectors-Kiev, Odessa, Smolensk and Leningrad. Guerrilla warfare is hampering the Nazis, particularly in the Ukraine. The invaders are now 130 miles from Leningrad. The war appeared to be settling down to a state of siege today.

FINNS ADVANCING

HELSINKI-Finnish sources said today that the advance of the Finns towards Leningrad was continuing with the Russsians losing heavily in men and materials. Since the campaign against the Soviet commenced, Finland claims that its navy has sunk seventy-two Russian vessels including three submarines and six Russian transport ships. Up to August 12, 262 Russian airplanes had been brought down by Finnish fighters or anti-aircraft batteries and 440 tanks and 31 armored trucks have been captured or destroyed.

BADER IS PRISONER

LONDON-Wing Commander Douglas R. Bader, legless ace of the Royal Air Force, earlier reported missing, is now believed to be a German prisoner, it was stated by an authoritative source today. He was forced down on German soil during the big attack on Cologne Tuesday.

HITLER IN UKRAINE

BERLIN-Chancellor Adolf Hitler has flown to the Ukraine to give new impetus to the Nazi forces there, it was announced today.

ASSASSINATION ATTEMPT

TOKYO—An attempt was made today to assassinate the pro-Nazi vice-premier of Japan. He was shot in the neck but not fatally. His would-be killer was immediately collared.

Enlistments In Fighting Forces - - -

A great many Canadians are opposed to enforced national service because they do not like to be forced to do anything. They say that the voluntary method of enrolling men for service either in this country or overseas is the only proper method in a democracy. We are told that to force men to serve is to imitate the totalitarian states. Further it is argued that, if there is a vigorous recruiting campaign, sufficient men can be secured without forcing men who do not want to enter the army, navy or air torce.

The chief argument used against national service is that it is opposed by the French-Canadian people. These people have been enlisting just as freely as other Canadians, an indication that they are not opposed to serving in defence of Canada, either at home or abroad.

The argument in favor of a system of conscripting for national service is that it is the natural thing for people living in a country to wish to defend it. It is the system adopted in such countries as Switzerland which are said to be the most democratic in the world. Under that system all share alike in the country's defence. Every man is taught to be a soldier and is able to join one of the national services if called upon to do so. It seems like the fair way of enlisting young men.

Under the present method it is not unusual to see whole families of boys remaining at home, taking advantage of the high wages prevailing in war time and taking no part whatever in the defence of the country. On the other hand we see men with wives and families joining one of the services and drawing allowances for these dependants. If anything happens to the men the cost to the

country in pensions will be very high. We have always felt that the system of compulsory service is the correct one but, under the conditions in which Canada is divided, it is quite possible that, as Major Sutherland recently argued, the unity of effort was much more important than the equity or otherwise of the method used.

It looks now as if we shall soon be ready for complete conscription. Already young men of certain ages are taken and trained and most of them volunteer for overseas service. Possibly no further legislation will be necessary than that already in use. It is just a matter of enforcing the present law.


Is Representing Them In Civic Centre Contest



Ice Anaesthetic Arctic Practice

Veteran Officer Recalls Its Use at Least 30 Years Ago

DRUMHELLER, Alta., Aug. 14: (P) -Reports from the United States that use of ice as an anaesthetic is "new discovery," seemed puzzling to James Somers, Drumheller veteran of the Royal North-West Mounted Police, who claimed that the ice anaesthetic was used in the Arctic in 1911.

Somers said he assisted Dr. C. W. Wilson of Edmonton complete a successful operation at Fort Mr-Pherson, N.W.T., 30 years ago when ice was used to freeze the flesh of an Indian woman who had been severely burned.

The doctor, Somers said, used a razor as a grafting scalpel. He held ice on the woman's thighs, where the skin had not been charred, until the flesh froze and then Dr. Wilson removed more than 30 strips of healthy skin to cover burned parts of the Indian's body, Somers said.


