> The American landings this year amounted to 9,802,000 pounds in comparison with 11,005,000 pounds in 1940.

The Canadian landings in 1941 BROOKLYN were 5,661,000 pounds as against 6,523,500 pounds.

Factors to be taken into consideration in connection with the deyear are that a considerable quantity of halibut was landed at Namu, where the B. C. Packers have a new cold storage plant, by Prince Rupert vessels which otherwise would have brought their catches to the home port. It is also quite possible that there was an increase of Canadian halibut landings this year at the Canadian Fishing Co.'s cold storage plant at Butedale.

Landings at Prince Rupert for September this year amounted to 2.031,500 pounds compared with 2.411.000 pounds in the same month last year. The American landings this September were 1,-303.000 pounds as against 1,864.000 pounds a year ago while this Sentember's Canadian landings aggregated 728,500 pounds or an increase over last September's 547,-000 pounds.

War Across English Channel To Be Called Off This Week-End While Wounded Transfer

LONDON, Oct. 2: (CP) - Great Britain and Germany will take time out from the war in and across the English Channel this week-end to assure safe passage for three thousand wounded prisoners of war-half the number British and half German.

Two British hospital ships will try to make the crossings by daylight but, if tides prevent the landing in time, the ports will be lighted and the ships will carry lights. They will be the first exceptions in the black-out since the war began.

The first month in 1941 to show a decrease, the log scale in Prince Rupert this September is lower than the same month last year. However, the total for the year to! date still runs substantially ahead of 1940.

Death Sentence on Former Head The log scale for this September totalled 16,570,896 board feet compared with 29,487,556 board feet in September 1940. This brings the total for this year to date up to 165,327,885 board feet as against 149,714,009 board feet in the first nine months of 1940.

The scale per species this September was as follows:

Fir, 159,988 board feet. Spruce, 7,972,009 board feet. Cedar, 39,472,753 board feet. Balsam, 1,531,302 board feet. Hemlock, 3,185,943 board feet. Jackpine, 128,539 board feet. Miscellaneous, 120,362 board feet.

Good Head Start . . .

The Liberal party made a good start on Nomination day when it nominated forty-eight candidates, four more than either of the other parties. One of the constituencies where the Conservatives fell down was Prince Rupert. It is rather to their credit that they refused to put up a candidate thus making the contest a clean-cut one between the Liberals and the C.C.F. They could not win here so why confuse the electors?

Building Records Up . . .

Building records are up and so are customs and excise receipts as a result of the general improvement of business in the city. If the government had taken out permits for all its projects the building record would have been the highest the city ever had. Building is only just starting and seems likely to increase judging by the number of lots that have recently been acquired by people wishing to erect houses for themselves.

Financial Problem

Three years ago critics of the Pattullo governmentand some of its friends as well-pointed to 1941 as the year that would present a financial problem to British Columbia to which not even the wizardry of Hon. John Hart would be equal, says the Victoria Times. How much gloomier would have been their outlook in those days if they had known that 1941 would have seen us and most of the rest of the world in the throes of the greatest, costliest and bloodiest war of all time we do not propose to try to describe. But the Minister of Finance knew that during the period between November last year and the corresponding month of the present year maturing obligations of practically \$30,000,000 would have to be met. He made his plans; on the 26th day of next month Mr. Hart will write a cheque for \$2,000,000, and that will! be the end of this year's debt retirement of no less a sum! than \$29,667,342.48, all of which has been liquidated! without borrowing a cent-an achievement of which any Minister of Finance might well be pardonably proud.

Along with Hon. John Hart and W. T. Straith, former members for Victoria as candidates in the provincial election at Victoria, will be Mrs. H. P. Hodges, newspaper woman, who was the closest runner-up at the last election and is well known in Victoria and has relatives in Prince Rupert. She is a woman who takes an active interest in all public movements, particularly those pertaining to women. Should she be elected she would make a valuable addition to the legislative strength of the government.




