FINE NEW BOAT ON TRIAL TRIPS

Tender Has Just Been Engined at the Rupert Marine Ironworks, after Being Launched at Inverness:

Making good at present after sucessful trial trips out from Prince Rupert is the new power boat built for heavy duty by R. G. Johnson, of Inverness Cannery. The boat was built at the cannery, and after being engined at the Rupert Marine Ironworks ran her trial trips this week. She is 48 feet long, 10 foot beam, and draws 3 feet six inches of water. Her power is a 20 h.p. Frisco Standard engine, and she is able to develop a speed of eight knots.

Built according to Mr. Johnson's own knowledge of the requirements of the service to which she is to be put, the new. boat which has not as yet been named is a very substantial one. Her framing is of oak, her stem and stern-posts of yellow cedar and her planking of fir. She made excellent speed and showed thorough seaworthniess in rough weather the other day on

Crazed Husband After Separation from Young Wife Returns to Shoot Her and Attempts the Life of His Own Child.
