King George V and Queen Mother Mary. The brothers, beside the King, are the Duke of Windsor and the Duke of Gloucester. A fifth brother, Prince John, died many years ago. A sister is Princess

The Duke married Princess Marina of Greece in 1934 and they have two sons and one daughter. The third child was born only a few weeks ago.

Kent was closely associated with the Royal Air Force since the war started and last year he was in Canada to visit air training establishments under the Commonwealth air training scheme across

He had previously toured Canada in 1927 with his brother, the then Prince of Wales, later King Edward VIII and now the Duke of Windsor, Governor of the Ba-

The Duke was on active service when the fatal crash occurred in remote northern Scotland. The entire crew of the plane, which was on a wartime mission, died with him, fourteen in all perishing. There will be an Air Ministry investigation although it is already announced no enemy action was involved in the crash.

This was the first Royal Family war fatality in 100 years.

#### EDITORIAL

#### Civic Administration . . .

· As we suggested yesterday, civic problems might! seem to be just a little inconsequential these days compared with things more vitally and directly associated with the fighting of the war. Nevertheless, it is important that civic functions should be maintained. Here in Prince Rupert these functions are more important today than ever before. They are directly linked up with the various local war activities.

The municipal administration machinery must be kept in motion not only for the direct benefit and service of the people who regularly live here but in support of the local phases of the war effort which is already lean-

ing heavily on these services and utilities.

In considering the immediate future of civic admininistration, brought to the fore because of the decision of the provincial government that we should return to local government soon after years of commissionership, we should be interested in the form that administration should take from one standpoint only—which will be the best and the most efficient for the immediate job of supporting the war effort and, after the war, developing the community along useful and serviceable lines.

It has been suggested that the best thing to do might be to continue a form of commissionership without wasting our time during the war on civic elections which might well have the effect of disuniting us at a time when harmony is a most essential factor. The question then is whether the gains we might make through return to local government would be worth the cost or adverse effects of making the change at this critical time.

If the only things that local autonomy bring would be petty politics and strife between local factions for personal or political kudos-patronage for the business interests on the one hand or the labor people on the other-· it would be as well to carry on as we are for the

duration at least. Meantime a little discussion on the whole question of civic administration, providing it does not develop along unpleasant or bitter lines, might not hurt us—even as a diversion from the more serious things that are gomg on.

There are virtues to be seen in each of the alternative forms of civic government. Each also have their faults! without which either would serve us very nicely.




