Yet there is no isolation hospital here.

The practice of treating isolation cases in the general hospital, it is agreed, is a risky business even under the best of technique precautions.

We understand that it is within the power of the hospital authorities to refuse admission to such cases. Why they have hesitated about doing this, it is explained, is beeause they do not wish to risk criticism through what might happen to the cases were they refused admission and treatment. The hospital might feel itself morally obliged to admit such cases, when no other accomodation is! available (although we fail to see why they could not be isolated and treated at home or wherever they originate) but it might run into a situation where it would be legally responsible if, through admission of such cases, legitimate patients in the hospital were to contract the malady.

It might be that the quickest and most effective way of getting action would be for the hospital authorities to stand by their legal rights and refuse to admit infectious cases. They would at the same time be protecting their legitimate patients If the really responsible authorities are delaying, as has been suggested, in the matter of an isolation hospital, it is about time drastic steps were being taken to force them to take action"
