

EDITORIAL

Shortage of Manpower...

Probably at no place is the shortage of manpower being more acutely felt than right here in Prince Rupert. It is few, if any, employers do not feel the effect directly or indirectly and some have been quite badly hit. Keeping of help is one of the most difficult of many new problems which have arisen, more especially during the past fewmonths, for those who have the responsibility of carrying on industries and business.

The government has already made some moves in the direction of controlling the movement and utilization of manpower but the tendency has been to move slowly and there has not yet been the direction and stabilization that there must be very soon if the best use is to be made of the manpower which is available and which must be so carefully conserved.

The position now is approaching the point where it may soon become chaotic unless firm and drastic action is taken in the near future.

Lack of Housing ...

Acute shortage of housing, lodging and even feeding facilities in Prince Rupert is also becoming an increasing difficulty. In some cases real distress is being felt and, with fall and winter weather conditions now coming up, the position will be even more serious. Reckless of what the prospect may be for securing accommodation, people continue to move into Prince Rupert, many leaving comfortable homes elsewhere to do so. Apart from Wartime Housing which takes care of only a certain section of the working population, no concerted measures have been taken to relieve the situation.

It would appear that the time has arrived when it might be well to at least discourage from coming here any persons whose usefulness does not fit in with the exigencies and circumstances of the present situation.

Extending Dimout . . .

Announcement from the south is to the effect that more drastic dimout regulations have been extended from the United States coast to Victoria and elsewhere on southern Vancouver Island. The reason is, no doubt, the presence of enemy submarines off the coast as indicated by the torpedoings of a few days ago near Oregon. There need be no surprise or alarm if such extended dimout regulations should be applied further along the coast. It might be well, however, to be prepared for them. It is quite possible that the coming winter may be a dimmer one right here in Prince Rupert.

Canada Year Book ...

The 1942 edition of the Canada Year Book, published by authorization of the Hon. James A. MacKinnon, Minister of Trade and Commerce, is announced by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. The Canada Year Book is the official statistical annual of the country and contains an up-to-date account of the natural resources of the Dominion and their development, the history of the country, its institutions, its demography, the different branches of production. trade, transportation, finance, education, etc.—in brief, a comprehensive study within the limits of a single volume of the social and economic condition of the Dominion. This new edition has been thoroughly revised throughout, and includes in all its chapters the latest information available up to the date of going to press.

The 1942 Canada Year Book extends to over 1,000 pages, dealing with all phases of the national life and more especially with those susceptible of statistical measurement. A statistical summary of the progress of Canada is included in the introductory matter. This gives a picture in figures of the remarkable progress that the country has made since the first census of the Dominion

was taken in 1871.

Special articles that are shown in this edition of the Year Book have been selected to illustrate the effects of the war on the Canadian economy and to show such changes and developments as have taken place to date.






