Unrelenting Advance Kept Up

Proud Nazi Force Routed;

Weakened by loss of thousands of men captured, killed, wounded or isolated in their desert strong points, the ence proud Axis army was in full flight today across western Egypt in the hunt for a position to avert destruction. Only a rearward moving screen of anti-tank guns and tanks shielded the bulk of Marshal Rommel's African Corps from the pressing advance of the British Eight' Army while a comparatively impotent air force sought to parry combined blows of Allied air forces.

Is Driven Back 70 Miles

While nine thousand prisoners by count in nine hours streamed to the British rear, Allied aircraft kept hitting at the foe and the main coastal line of retreat was described as a graveyard of smoking twisted tanks, armored cars and trucks.

Axis communiques admit the withdrawing to new lines and Rome indicated the depth of the British drive when it told of fierce fighting between El Alamein and Fuka. Fuka is about seventy miles west of El Alamein.

SECOND IN COMMAND OF ENEMY IS KILLED AND OTHER GENERALS SURRENDER -ITALIAN ARMISTICE PROPOSAL REFUSED -ENORMOUS CASUALTIES AND MATERIAL LOSSES.

LONDON, Nov. 5 — The British Army has scored a brilliant victory in the North African Desert. One of the greatest Allied advances, for the Axis it has been one of the worst defeats of the Second World War. Eighty per cent of Adolf Hitler's air strength in the area has been destroyed and more than half of his tank and gun strength has been lost. The enemy is estimated to have had nine thousand men taken prisoner and has suffered large casualties including the second in command to Marshal Erwin Rommel killed. At least one and probably other German and Italian generals have been captured.

EDITORIAL

A Word for the A.R.P....

An unfortunate attitude of indifference appears to be developing as far as the A.R.P. in Prince Rupert is concerned. We have this despite the fact that the actualities of war are closer to us today than ever and, in the view of those who are in a position to competently estimate, may come a good deal closer yet - and that possibly before long.

We are not asked, for the time being at least, to carry on A.R.P. work on the basis of anything more than a sideline to our normal activities. It is not a very creditable spirit for those who decline or hesitate to do even that.

Here in Prince Rupert it would seem fitting that the citizens who have no other particular war work to do would be hastening to volunteer for assignments in connection with civilian protection rather than having to be persuaded or cajoled into making themselves ready to protect their town, their homes and their families.

It is quite conceivable that A.R.P. may become something much more than a part time job. We should be training ourselves to be ready for such an eventuality. We should be organized and instructed and in a position to meet the need when it comes.

Certainly those who are able to and will do nothing about it now will have no reason to expect assistance when the emergency arises.

The least we can do now is to find out what to do and be in a position to do it.






