POISED FOR BIG BATTLE:

Three Features at Fine Dinner Allies Appear Ready to Launch Another Offensive Against Axis In Both Tunisia and Libya

> LONDON, Dec. 10 (CP)- Allied forces were apparently set today to launch a mighty new drive against the Axis at any moment both in Libya and Tunisia under formidable and ever growing air power. Reports by Morocco radio that the British First Army and American troops had sprung a new attack on both sides of the Axis' narrowing last foothold appeared to be premature. Advices from Tunisia, however, indicated that the Allies were no longer hampered by the pinch for air RE-ELECTED support and that a crucial battle for the last twenty-mile approach to Bizerte and Tunis might explode at any moment. On the opposite side of the North African battlefront a Cairo communique said the British Eighth Army was "allowing the enemy no rest in the El Agheila

Arthur Penny, editor of the Quebec Chronicle-Telegraph, is one of those rare exceptions who has found a large audience the hard way. He has made his audience a national one by the forcefulness of his editorials-while finding time, as well, to build up an excellent newspaper in other respects. Scarcely an editor in Canada but searches the exchanges to see what Mr. Penny has to say on this or that topic-and usually what Mr. Penny has to say is so well thought out and forceful that his editorial gets reprinted here, there, and everywhere. Result: Mr. Penny's average audience, instead of being limited to thousands, can be numbered in hundreds of thousands.

He is now celebrating his twenty-fifth year as editor first of the Quebec Chronicle and latterly of the Chronicle-Telegraph. During those twenty-five years he has built up for himself a position similar to that of William Allen White, editor of the Emporia Gazette, whose words count for more in the United States than the words, say, of a leader-writer on the New York Times. Unlike White, however, Penny, the man, has been little publicized; he has been content with the bushel of editorial anonymity as long as the light of his opinions shone clear. That they have shone clear is proved by the freedom with which they are quoted.







This action is taken in line with the Government's declared determination to stabilize living costs on a basis that is fair to all. It is a developing attack on the menace of inflation which arises out of wartime conditions. The prices of tea, coffee and oranges are now lowered by official order. Plans for reduction in the price of milk to the consumer are also under way and will be announced in the near future. The items chosen have been selected because of their important place in the weekly budget of every home in Canada.

> TEA and COFFEE Effective now—the retail price of tea is reduced by 10c per pound and the retail price of coffee by 4c per pound below the recent

> lawful ceiling prices. The table below indicates how the reduction of 10c per pound applies to less-thanpound packages; and is for purposes of illustration only.

Must now sell at per pound	90c	80c	75c
per 1-2 pound	45c	40c	38c
per 1-4 pound	24c	22c	21c
per 1-8 pound	13c	12c	11c

BULK TEA

The reduction in the maximum retail prices of bulk tea sold in quantities less than a pound should correspond to the reduction in retail prices for the small sizes of packaged tea.

FOR EXAMPLE, if a line of bulk tea now sells at 70c per pound (reduced from 80c) then the maximum selling prices should be:

4 ounces 19c

TEA BAGS

For some time tea bags have been packaged in cartons containing 2 ozs, 4 ozs. and 8 ozs. net.

Reductions in retail prices of tea packaged in tea bags must correspond to those made on packaged tea.

ORANGES Oranges must be reduced to give consumers the benefit of the reduction in cost to retailers brought about by lower prices for the new crop, by seasonal removal of import duty (effective December 1st, this year) and by the removal of the War Exchange Tax. Oranges should sell at or below the September-October 1941 retail price levels.
