THEFT PROCEEDINGS

Trial of Philip Gun-a-Noot, charged with the theft of \$78 from the home of other Indians, Mr. and Mrs. George Moore, at Kitwanga, is proceeding at the Supreme Court Assizes here before Mr. Justice Harold Robertson.

CROWN EVIDENCE IN Taking of crown evidence in the Gun-a-Noot case was completed early this afternoon when luncheon adjournment was taken. There is to be one witness for the defence.

The case of Philip Gun-a-Noot, Hazelton Indian, charged with the theft of \$78 from the home of other Indians, Mr. and Mrs. George Moore, at Kitwanga, is proceeding at the Supreme Court Assizes here before Mr. Justice Harold Robertson.

Gun-a-Noot is alleged to have taken a purse containing the \$78—\$58 of which belonged to James Fowler and \$10 each to Mr. and Mrs. Moore—from a trunk in the home of the Moores. The theft occurred on a night when a big feast was being held by the Prog Crest, Gun-a-Noot disappearing the next day. Meantime the theft had been discovered. Gun-a-Noot had been staying in the Moore house.

T. W. Brown is acting as crown counsel while W. O. Fulton is appearing for the defence.

LONDON, Sept. 25 — Lord Woolton, Food Minister, doesn't intend to deprive the workman of his daily pint. He told Monmouthshire Baptists that supplies of grain and sugar for beer would continue and added that nowadays ale is much weaker because of the quantity of water used.

Local Merchants Curtail Deliveries

Details of New Arrangements Are To Be Made Public In Announcement Tomorrow

Local retail merchants, at the instance of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board and in the interests of manpower, tire and gas conservation, have come to an arrangement for the curtailing of delivery services on a three-a-week basis. Details of the plan are to be made public officially tomorrow.

SHIP LOSS ANNOUNCED

United States Reveals That Destruction Of Two Vessels Cost 250 Lives

WASHINGTON, D.C., Sept. 25—The Department of the Navy, announces the loss of 250 lives in the sinking by enemy action of two ships in the Solomon Islands area of southern Pacific.

One was the destroyer Jarvis which vanished after being hit and is believed to have been the victim of Japanese submarines or aircraft. One hundred and seventy men are believed lost with her. An official statement is to the effect that she must be considered lost at sea.

The other vessel was a small auxiliary transport, U.S.S. Little, with loss of eighty lives.

The United States has had five ships sunk in this year and five damaged while the Japanese have had twenty-two sunk or damaged.

AIR FORCE COMMUNIQUE

R.C.A.F. Officially Announces That Was Done Overseas During Week

OTTAWA, Sept. 25.—The weekly communique of the Royal Canadian Air Force on activities overseas during the week ending Sept. 20, includes the Saer Valley as well as upon convoys.

DELIVER BOMBERS

Great Fighting Planes Are Being Flown 6000 Miles Across Pacific

MELBOURNE, Sept. 25.—Heavy bombers are now being flown a distance of 6000 miles across the Pacific Ocean from the United States by the Pacific ferry command for use in the war against Japan in the southern Pacific.

RABAU IS HEAVY HIT

Eight Thousand-ton Japanese Freighter Believed To Have Been Sunk There

MELBOURNE, Sept. 25 — Allied bombing planes hit heavily at shipping in Rabaul, New Britain, and scored a direct hit on an 8,000-ton Japanese freighter which was probably sunk.

An air field and aircraft at Buka in the Solomon Islands were hit and in New Guinea the Kokoda area was again attacked.

There is no change in the general situation on land around the Owen Stanley Mountains where Japanese forces are trying to advance on Port Moresby.

HIS HOLINESS HELPS

PRETORIA, Sept. 25. — The Apostolic Delegate in South Africa has announced that the Holy See, by arrangement with the Italian High Command, will accept and forward collective food parcels to South African war prisoners in Italy.

Build Ship In Ten Days

PORTLAND, Oregon, Sept. 25.—Henry Kaiser, west coast shipbuilder, has launched a ten-thousand ton ship in the "unbelievable" time of ten days from laying of the keel.

CLEANING UP MADAGASCAR

Little Difficulty Expected In Taking Rest Of Great Island

LONDON, Sept. 25.—British forces have about completed the occupation of the northern half of Madagascar and are now about to start on the southern part which is expected to yield with a minimum of opposition. The British are now in complete control of the coastline.

The Bishop dealt to a large extent with the spectacular development of the Alaska Highway construction and surprised his listeners with some of the information he had to convey.

Woman's Job at 70 Is Paper-Hanging

She's Been at it 30 Years And Finds it as Easy as She Ever Did

SHELburne, Ont., Sept. 25. —The wartime girl has proven herself capable of handling many jobs supposed to be for men only, but 70-year old Mrs. Edward Newton of nearby Horning's Mills has been hanging paper and painting houses for the past 30 years and is proud of her trade. Says Mrs. Newton, "I find the work just as easy now as I ever did and expect to carry on indefinitely."

Mrs. Newton started as a professional paperhanger and painter 30 years ago when she married and until the death of her husband three years ago, she was his assistant. After Mr. Newton's death she continued with the business and almost any day can be seen atop a ladder painting or deftly hanging paper.

R. C. Vaughan Succeeds S. J. Hungerford in C.N.R.—New Directors Named

OTTAWA, Sept. 25. — R. C. Vaughan, president of the Canadian National Railways, has been appointed chairman of the board of directors succeeding S. J. Hungerford whose term as director expires September 30, it was announced today.

When Mr. Vaughan became Canadian National Railways president in July, 1941, Mr. Hungerford continued as chairman of the board. The latter reached the age of seventy last July and, with his impending retirement from the board, Mr. Vaughan becomes a member of the board and chairman.

WILLKIE ON FRONT TRIP

Special Envoy Of President Roosevelt Greatly Impressed With Russian Troops

MOSCOW, Sept. 25 — Wendell Willkie is back in Moscow after a two-day visit to the Reshev front, having been to within five miles of the front lines. He witnessed an "intense battle" and was greatly impressed with Russian courage. He interviewed "thinly clad and shivering" German prisoners who looked little like crack soldiers.

LONDON, Sept. 25.—There were a few enemy aircraft over southwest England last night. A few bombs were dropped but damage was slight and there were no casualties. One enemy bomber was destroyed.

WARSHIPS ARE LOST

British Destroyer and Minesweeper Are Victims Of Nazi U-boats In Attack Upon Convoy

LONDON, Sept. 25. — The Royal Navy lost the destroyer Somali and the minesweeper Leda in a convoy homeward bound from Russia after getting "the great majority" of laden merchantmen through to Soviet northern ports, the Admiralty disclosed today.

At least forty Nazi aircraft were blasted from the sky, the Admiralty reported, while two U-boats were almost certainly destroyed and four others probably damaged seriously.

TIM BUCK GIVES UP

Twelve Other Communists Also Surrender To Royal Canadian Mounted Police

TORONTO, Sept. 25. — Tim Buck, general secretary of the Communist Party of Canada, surrendered to the Royal Canadian Mounted Police today along with twelve others who with Buck had been sought by police since the Communist party was declared illegal in Canada.

SMOKES FOR DUTCH

LONDON, Sept. 25. — Marking the 62nd birthday of Queen Wilhelmina the R.A.F. scattered over Holland thousands of packages of cigarettes sealed with labels bearing the message "The Netherlands shall arise," and one of each package inscribed "Be courageous."

BANANAS AT A GUINEA

LONDON, Sept. 25. — A dozen bananas brought from Gibraltar by an airman sold for the equivalent of \$5 each at a Red Cross auction.

Enough Wheat For 20 Years

OTTAWA, Sept. 25. — The harvest of this year estimated at 650,000,000 bushels together with the carryover of 400,000,000 bushels will give a total store of wheat on hand in Canada sufficient to meet the country's normal requirements for twenty years. The Department of Agriculture is encouraging farmers to turn to livestock production as a means of usefully utilizing some of the grain.

Fell Off High Embankment; Is Not Injured

Thomas Squarie, fisherman, was found at 8:30 this morning lying in the bushes on the north side of Third Avenue between First and Second Streets after having apparently fallen some thirty-five feet from the sidewalk above. He evidently suffered no injuries as he was able to walk off following revival shortly after the police, having been informed, went to pick him up. The man's cap was found on the railing above the point where he was found lying. He did not remember falling, he said.

CURTAILING INDUSTRIES

Federal Government To Take Drastic Steps To Conserve Use Of Manpower

OTTAWA, Sept. 25. — Drastic curtailment of less essential industries is expected to result shortly from a government order which, it was learned from official sources today, has already been framed.

Based primarily on immediate manpower needs, action sharply reducing or entirely stopping the production of a wide range of goods will make available machinery and plant accommodation for direct war purposes.

GAINS FOR RED ARMY ARE MADE

German Invaders Ousted From Several Points in Stalingrad As Fierce Battle Rages On

MOSCOW, Sept. 25. — Red Army divisions held newly recaptured ground northwest of Stalingrad against German assaults and erased a threat to the flank of the smoking city's defences by ousting the invaders from several streets and houses, the Russians said today. A savage battle was indicated northwest of the city where Russian planes, tanks, heavy artillery and troops have struck repeatedly into the German's left wing.

A noon communique said: "German attacks were repulsed. Soviet tank crews destroyed two German tanks and wiped out about two infantry companies. In fighting for a populated place our troops wiped out about five hundred Germans and captured war material."

Re-formed defences within Stalingrad were menaced for a time by Nazi attack which overran a group of houses but "Soviet troops counter-attacked and restored the situation."

The Berlin radio hedged again on the claim by German military headquarters of September 15 that the battle was in "final phase." It broadcast a dispatch which said that the High Command preferred a gradual systematic advance in order to save men and "the fall of the city may thus be delayed for some time."

New Destroyer Named Haida

LONDON, Sept. 25.—Another destroyer of the Tribal class was launched yesterday from a British shipbuilding yard for the Royal Canadian Navy, being named Haida after the Queen Charlotte Island tribe. The sponsor was Lady Lawrie, wife of the Lord Mayor of London and herself born in Canada at Montreal. Lady Lawrie spoke highly in praise of the men of the Canadian Navy.

PLANES ARE NOT SOVIET

Official Denial Made of German Propaganda Concerning Raiders Over Bulgaria

MOSCOW, Sept. 25.—It was officially denied yesterday by the Soviet government that Russian planes had bombed Rumanian points. Charges along this line had emanated from Germany.

Russia and Bulgaria are not at war but Chancellor Adolf Hitler is known to desire that Bulgaria should declare war on the Soviet. A bombing plane which was shot down in Bulgarian territory has been definitely identified as being Rumanian.

**EDITORIAL**

**Water Chlorination...**

The Vancouver papers do not see eye to eye on the question of water chlorination. The Vancouver Sun is vigorously opposing chlorination. The News-Herald has replied to the Sun, saying:

"One of the minor jokes in this tragic war is the attitude of the Vancouver Sun. It has been loudest in its demands for more effective anti-Japanese defence measures on this coast. Yet when Hon. Ian Mackenzie ordered the most primary and vital form of protection—namely of our water supply—the Sun underwent a near-convulsion in opposition.

"The mental calibre of the loudest critics of the water-safeguarding plan can best be judged by their proposals for preventing Japanese sabotage. They would hire a couple of hundred men with shotguns to keep away from our watershed the Japanese saboteurs—whom they expect to advance on foot.

"Two weeks ago in Oregon, the Japs made their first bombing attack on a forest. Had they chosen to do so they could have dropped the same weight of missiles on Vancouver's reservoir. Instead of bombs, they could have dropped containers full of deadly typhoid germs.

"Has the Sun never heard of germ warfare? Is the Sun ignorant of what the Japanese have done three times in China? Does the Sun really believe that vain boasts about the purity of Vancouver's water would be any protection against a couple of thousand capsules of typhoid fever germs, tossed at random into our water supply?"

**TO EXTEND HOME HERE**

**Anglican School Establishment Is Taxed to Capacity—New Building Project Considered**

Lack of sufficient accommodation in view of the increasing number of residents is a problem which is now facing the board of trustees of the Ridley Home which was in session this week. In the near future it is hoped to extend the premises by the erection of a two-storey building for use at meal times, for recreation and for providing extra sleeping accommodation if necessary. Although there are many difficulties to overcome in carrying through such a scheme at present, it is hoped that it may be accomplished without undue delay since the parents of many of the children now being accommodated are either in active service or engaged in some sort of national defence work. In the event of the building plan materializing, it is also hoped to open a day nursery for children of mothers engaged in war work. Here the little ones could be cared for each day and returned to their mothers at night.

The secretary's report at this week's meeting showed an increased number of residents and, if all recent applications materialize, the cottages will be housing

more than the usual number. The staff necessary to meet present needs has now been engaged and the regular school routine for the term has been resumed. The Sunday School, after being closed for ten weeks due to lack of domestic help, has been reopened.

Rev. G. A. Rix D.D., Bishop of Caledonia, presided over the meeting and others present were Very Rev. James B. Gibson, Rev. Canon W. F. Rushbrook, Mrs. Gibson, C. J. Norrington and the secretary, Miss N. L. Bird.

The board accepted with regret the resignation of Miss R. M. Davies O.B.E., who has been prominently identified with the institution since its inception many years ago at Metlakatla, and a letter was ordered sent to Miss Davies conveying the best wishes of the board for her future welfare.

Satisfaction was expressed at the generous response to a recent appeal which had enabled the board to wipe off the recent deficit and to repay a loan at the bank.
