Japanese invasion armada i sank another big transpor as well as stradding a cru mbs, it was announced today. Japan's greatest naval disaster of the fliers thus boosted to at least thirty-si. Japanese ships sunk or damaged in hattle. The Japanese have, apparently, occ burned-out oil centre of Balik Papan in East but, in so doing, unwarily sailed into a hornet's nest of American submarines, bombers and surface wareraft. On the Far Eastern front Japan's invasion hordes drove closer to Singapore as British defence lines executed a new withdrawal less than fifty miles north of the stronghold amid the heaviest fighting of the campaign.

Russia's armies, pressing their great winter counter-offensive, were reported surging forward unchecked today on the threshold of a 250-mile German defence line west of Moscow. Soviet dispatches reported the recapture of seventy-nine more towns and indicated that retreating Nazis were falling back n a double-row defence system one mile and a alf in depth extending from Velikie Luki to Vyasma to Bryansk.



We may hope—with what measure of justification we cannot be sure—that the enemy will be stopped in the Far East. But while so hoping, it well behooves us to continue without let-up in speeding the preparation of our defences against the day when they may be required -as much here as they are in Australia now.

From a straight-armed defence standpoint we have to trust that the authorities in charge are doing their part and are exerting all efforts possible to make the position secure. No doubt, they are considering such matters as guns and other fighting equipment and the placing of it where it may be needed.

Here in Prince Rupert a new militia unit in the way of a reserve in which civilians, while carrying out their normal work or business, would receive military training and be subject to call for active defence service in the event of an emergency at home may well be organized as is being done in other cities.

Meanwhile, there is the A.R.P. work in which there is place for many more volunteers in various lines of endeavour. What many do not appear to realize-possibly some are not much interested—is that the A.R.P. is a good insurance of those two most priceless possesssions—our homes and our families.

Those who may permit consideration of their own pleasures or whims to interfere with their duty may live to rue the day and wish they had done differently while yet there was time.

One Man's Big Load . . .

Prime Minister Winston Churchill told Britons yesterday that he was presumably responsible for the course the war is taking. He challenged parliament to a nonconfidence vote and demanded that trust be maintained in him if he was to carry on.

It is a great deal of responsibility for one man to be carrying. It gives rise to the thought: what would happen if anything happened to Churchill?

It is to be supposed, although the matter does not appear to be clear at the moment, that such an eventuality is being guarded against.

The Local War Effort . . .

Possibly some of us had not realized the important function being carried out at the local herring cannery in connection with the supplying of Britain with food. Other fishery plants and other industries in Prince Rupert are also doing their part in that connection. The war effort is coming to engage us more directly every day.

TRAFFIC INCREASE

More Passengers, Mail and Express Carried by Trans-Canada Air Lines.

WINNIPEG, Jan. 28:-Passengers carried by Trans-Canada Air Lines in 1941 totalled 85,154 more than a 50 percent increase over the total for 1940 of 53,180, according to information released yesterday by O. T. Larson, vicepresident.

Air mail likewise jumped from 927,037 pounds in 1940 to 1,389,614 in 1941. Air express traffic doubled during the year, the figure being 173,192 pounds compared with 88,214 in 1940.

The closing month of last year saw the heaviest mail load Trans-Canada Air Lines has carried during any month in its history. It was 150.261 pounds. Air express in December was 14,434 pounds and passengers numbered 6.079. both slightly down from Novem-
