## Never Before a Christmas Like This in Prince Rupert; Great Changes Are Seen

Never was there before a Christmas like this in Prince Rupert. A hustling, bustling war metropolis now, its population more than double that of a year ago owing to the momentous developments which have brought this port into an important position in the Pacific area of the world war scene, there have been great changes on every hand since the last Yuletide season here.

Of course, the business places, their resources based on the old volume of trade and their problems accentuated by the difficulty of obtaining goods and help, have never experienced anything like the traffic of the past few days. Christmas Eve finds stocks heavily depleted and the shopping rush still going on.

Possibly the busiest place of all, the last fortnight particularly, has been the Post Office. The staff there, under trying conditions, has been valiantly carrying on, endeavouring, come what may, to get out the mail in a two-way stream, the like of which has never before been known here. Thousands of sacks of mail have made what at many times seemed an almost impossible task to handle. Somehow or other, however, the staff, many of them pretty green, have been able to wade through it.

And, while the public services and utilities have been taxed to the limit, war activities have gone on uninterrupted and, in considerable measure, will continue to do so over the holiday. Observance of Christmas Day itself may be curtailed to some extent but the aim has been to arrange things so that every one will have some opportunity to observe the occasion. Except for the stores and some non-essential services, Boxing Day observance this year, in view of the war situation, will be foregone. Both management and union officials have appealed to workers in the shipbuilding industry to carry on as usual on Boxing Day. War construction activity will also proceed without interruption on Boxing Day with some work continuing as well on Christmas Day.

As for shipping and transportation, Christmas, generally speaking, will be marked by a carrying on with little, if any, pause.

There will be no relaxation of routine regulations for the regular forces although many of the men of navy, army and air force will have full opportunity to observe the Christmas Day which finds most of them far away from their homes among strangers and under vastly different conditions than those to which they are used. It will be few Prince Rupert homes that are not extending their hospitality to the men of the forces this Christmas. To those, however, who do not leave the various camps tomorrow, there will be all the good things of Christmas, Turkey and all the trimmings will be the order in them all.

Yes, it will be a different sort of Christmas in Prince Rupert this year but there is every indication that it will be a very merry one.

### BATTLE OF RUSSIA— ADVANCE KEPT UP BY REDS

Nazis Fallish Back At Rate Of  
Eighteen Miles Per Day

MOSCOW, Dec. 24 — The great Russian offensive in the Don River Bend area continues to make progress at a rate estimated at eighteen miles per day. The Soviet forces have now reached a point 132 miles from Rostov. Eight more towns are reported recaptured since yesterday with thousands more Nazi dead and taken prisoner. Large quantities of abandoned enemy equipment are also being taken.

Heavy fighting continues in the Stalingrad area with the Russians maintaining a strong offensive and taking back several key points since yesterday.

Owing to the seriousness of the situation on the Russian front, leaves for all Nazi troops in that area have been cancelled.

### AIR FORCE OUT AGAIN

Attacks During Night on Western  
Germany, Northern France  
And Belgium

LONDON, Dec. 24 — The Royal Air Force was out again last night with bombing attacks over Western Germany, northern France and Belgium. Berlin claimed that damage was not heavy.

### HOPE NOW GIVEN UP

VANCOUVER, Dec. 24—Hope has now been virtually abandoned for the safety of the Canadian Pacific Airways transport plane which has been missing since Sunday evening on a flight from Prince George to Vancouver with thirteen persons on board. All search operations, and they have been thorough, are so far unavailing.

### TUNISIAN ACTIVITY

Patrols Busy on Land in Readiness  
For Big Battle—Axis Convoys  
Attacked

LONDON, Dec. 24—Patrol activity is being kept up on the Tunisian front with every indication pointing to an early breaking out of heavy fighting between great forces which appear ready to join battle. There has been considerable air activity since yesterday with Allied planes attacking Axis convoys, eleven ships out of which have been shot down during the last few days.

Marshal Erwin Rommel's Afrika Korps is still in retreat before the British Eighth Army in Libya, having now reached a point about one hundred miles from Tripoli.

William Shrubbsall and Peter Brass are leaving for Vancouver having received their call for the Air Force.

### Americans At Dakar

WASHINGTON, D.C., Dec. 24—Specialized United States troops have arrived at Dakar, important west African port which is now under Allied control. They were landed by plane and ships and some came by jeep.

### CORVETTE IS SUNK

H.M.A.S. Armadale is Lost Off  
Timor, it is Announced

CANBERRA, Dec. 24—Announcement is made of the sinking of the Australian corvette Armadale off Timor Island. The vessel was bombed 250 miles north of Port Darwin.

### STRIKE AT JAPANESE

Air Blows Being Exchanged Over  
India and Burma

NEW DELHI, Dec. 24—The Royal Air Force is still exchanging air blows with the Japanese over Burma and India. The Japanese raided Chittagong again yesterday and three enemy planes participated in a third raid on Calcutta where it is announced twenty-five persons have been killed. Over Bengal the Japanese were driven off. British bombers are keeping up the attack on Japanese strongholds in Burma and land forces are within forty-eight miles of Ak-yab.

Ted Seidlik was taken to hospital by ambulance early this morning from the dry dock where he is employed. He suffered the loss of two fingers when his hand was smashed between the couplings and the flat car.

### Over Subscription Of Victory Loan

WASHINGTON, D.C., Dec. 24 — There has been a two billion dollar oversubscription of the United States Victory Loan. In forty-three days forty-three billion dollars has been subscribed.

### American Plane Is Missing With Five On Board

SACRAMENTO, Dec. 24—A United States Army twin-engine transport plane with five men on board is missing in northern California.

## EDITORIAL

### The Power Situation . . .

The annoyances caused to many of us through interruption of electric power services motivate some reflection as to whether we are all doing our part towards the most sparing and maximum efficiency of our admittedly limited supply of power. There are complaints heard in some quarters of extravagant use of power in important offices where one would expect to find efficiency in this as well as other matters. No doubt, Prince Rupert people have not yet come to the full realization of the fact that to use sparingly of electric light and power these days is not only saving their own pocketbooks but leaving power available for, perhaps, more important users under these emergency conditions. Certainly, this is no time for waste of our electricity any more than any other commodity so essential to the war effort.

After all, Aesop's fable of the White Christmas does not necessarily bring up the subject of the snow shovelling.

### The Need for Imports . . .

The notion that world trade is a one-way street in which everything should be exported and nothing should be imported does not hold. Perhaps to say that it is even wrong is too optimistic. The Canadian Manufacturers' Association held a post-war planning conference this summer at which the problem of transferring wartime industry to a peace basis was discussed. Many suggestions were made. It was urged, of course, that export markets should be thoroughly explored both by government and by industry. It was concurrently urged that imports be carefully examined in search of new work for Canadian plants. It was further proposed that there should be re-establishment of markets for the wealth of the land, lakes, sea mines in the raw and finished state.

That Canada cannot hope to sell her natural products in the world markets unless she takes something in return for them in goods or services of the purchasing country, the proposers of these suggestions obviously refused to see. They regard imports as an unmixed evil. It was this state of mind which spawned economic nationalism and had a hand in the rise of Hitler to power. If we are to have a lasting peace it is going to require a recognition of the facts of economic life on the part of our industrial leaders.

One of the rules for post-war laid down by the Atlantic Charter is that all nations of the world should have access to the raw materials of the world on equal terms. This does not mean that we will sell Canadian wheat to everybody everywhere for one Canadian dollar per bushel. It means that we will provide them with the currency necessary to buy our wheat by buying things from them. There is no other way in which they can get access to our natural products. If world trade is to flourish, if we are to raise the standard of living of all the people of the world, then the goal of all governments must be to increase imports rather than to reduce them.

Maybe the censor would not object if we said that we would rather just to dream of a White Christmas.

### CARVING TURKEYS

Seven Simple Steps for Disgusting Bird on Holiday Dinner Table

Are you going to let that bird make a mockery out of you again this year? No, of course, not when it's so simple. If you make up your mind to it, winter, and read carefully the following easy rules, you can pass yourself off to your wife and friends as a master carver. Make the bird look that much better this year!

1. Use a platter large enough to hold all the carved pieces, or use an extra plate to hold some of the sections. The carving knife and fork should be the best you can get. Have the knife sharpened daily. Place the platter above the plates and before the bird. Derris-sticks should be at the bird's right hand.

2. The first being you, you carve first the side nearest to you. Stand the bird with the feet facing down, placed in the thigh. Cut close to the body of the bird with long strokes. With the fork drive leg away from the body joints as the knife cuts off the leg.

3. Next leg on platter (use bird's left side, not yours). Sever drumsticks from thigh, using a clean stroke from outside tip of the joint to the inside end. Cut the thigh meat into three or four pieces. Slice meat from the drumstick and place to one side of the platter or put on the auxiliary plate.

4. Turned back into second joint of the wing. With long strokes, cut off the second joint and lay it to one side.

5. The next three steps are planned to make uniform serving pieces of the white meat. Note that the slicing works from above the wing joint as toward the breast bone. First, make an incision above the wing joint, cutting into the breast until the knife strikes the rib. Withdraw the knife without cutting off any meat.

6. Start to slice the white meat, beginning about two inches above the incision and cutting down to it. Slice thin, using long strokes. Lay slices on platter or auxiliary plate.

7. Continue to cut slices of white meat. For each slice, start about a quarter of an inch higher on the breast. Keep cutting until breastbone is reached, with the slices uniform in thickness.

MELBOURNE, Dec. 24—The position of Japanese forces remaining in the vicinity of Buna Mission on New Guinea Island appears to be desperate. American and Australian forces have made a further break-through. Three United States brigadiers have been wounded in the fighting on New Guinea. Allied bombers are keeping up their attacks on New Britain where three enemy planes have been brought down.

## VEGETABLES ARE GROWN

British People Raise Their Own Potatoes and Other Things in These War Days

LONDON, Dec. 24—In the industrial districts of Britain there has been a very great increase in the growing of potatoes and all sorts of vegetables by the workers in their spare moments, not only in their gardens but also in what are known as allotments—odd pieces of ground which are not large enough for real farming so are divided up among the workers for use as gardens of their own. Generally, these run about one-sixteenth of an acre each. The local governments arrange the allotments, supplying fertilizer, etc., at cost price, providing expert advice and otherwise assisting. The average British family can now pretty well keep itself in potatoes and other vegetables and the total thus being produced throughout the country is enormous.

The keeping of domestic rabbits to augment the meat supply has also gone ahead by leaps and bounds.

House Warming by Mr. and Mrs.  
Silas Johnson at Village of  
Kispiox

KISPIOX, Dec. 24—To celebrate the accomplishment of a long cherished plan, the erection and occupancy of a new home, Mr. and Mrs. Silas Johnson recently staged a "house warming" which, with friends in attendance from all around, was a very happy occasion. Friends invited to help in the celebration of the inauguration of the fine and commodious new home including the chiefs of various tribes of the village as well as other leading citizens and their wives, also Rev. A. Rutherford, the minister in charge at Kispiox.

The object of the festive occasion was well expressed in the words of the host who said: "We, as a family, have been interested in the advance of Christianity for many years and have taken an active and leading part in the work of the church of our village. I believe it fitting that we should show the friendly Christian spirit and fill our home with the warmth of Christian friendship. We wish to show also that we highly appreciate the fellowship of our brothers."

The chiefs and others who made speeches expressed the feelings of those present, thanking the host for the honor of having been invited to attend. They also recounted life experiences and passed on suggestions.

Mrs. Jane Starr, Mrs. Johnson's mother, was the first speaker. She acknowledged that she had gladly made a contribution toward the cost of the new home.

Silas Johnson assured his mother-in-law that she would always have a comfortable home with his family as long as she lived and that she would be well cared for in her old age.

Mr. and Mrs. Jacob Morrison, Walter Latz, Andrew Crosby, Robert Wilson, Peter Angus and Henry Aluk all addressed the gathering, uniting the natives of the village in Christian brotherhood.

Robert Wilson, an eighty-two year old patriarch, told of the days when they did not sit around the tables as they were doing now but, instead, sat around fires set in the centre of a mud floor, cooking their food on a spit over the flames. He said that white friends of the natives had never failed in their efforts to give leadership and kind and helpful advice, assisting the native people in rising to higher standards of life.

Andrew Crosby expressed the view that money was a good thing when it was properly used but a very bad thing when it was kept hidden or used for evil purposes. To use it for the building of a good home such as this he considered a worthy purpose indeed.

Henry Aluk, chief of the tribe and last of the natives to speak, acknowledged the service of Silas Johnson in the church. He had given of his time and talent without expecting monetary reward. Mr. Aluk called upon the people to sing the hymn, "Jesus, Lover of My Soul."

Rev. A. Rutherford, the resident missionary, was the last speaker. After calling upon the people to rise and sing, "Blest Be the Tie That Binds," he spoke briefly and offered the prayer of dedication of the new home.

## Holidays "Off" In Telephones

Service Folk and Urgent Business  
War Work Will Keep Lines  
Busy

MONTREAL, Dec. 24 ©—In asking the public not to make out-of-town calls on Christmas Day the Bell Telephone Company points out the reason is urgent. By refraining from calling long distance subscribers will avoid the rush themselves and clear the wires for war workers and boys and girls in camps and barracks who will be unable to get home for Christmas, to say nothing of war activities which can't take a holiday.

Since the war there has been a tremendous shift in the population of this continent. This year, quite a number of war services and war industries must continue work over Christmas, so that there will be more business calls Dec. 25 than in peacetime.

It was not until 1930 that it was commonplace to hold a family reunion at Christmas by telephone. During this period, telephone service was speeded up, so that 90 per cent of all long distance calls were completed while the caller remained at the telephone.

Even before the war the Christmas rush was becoming a problem. Unlike the shopping rush, the telephone rush was confined to one day, Christmas day itself, and was crammed into a few frantic hours of that day.

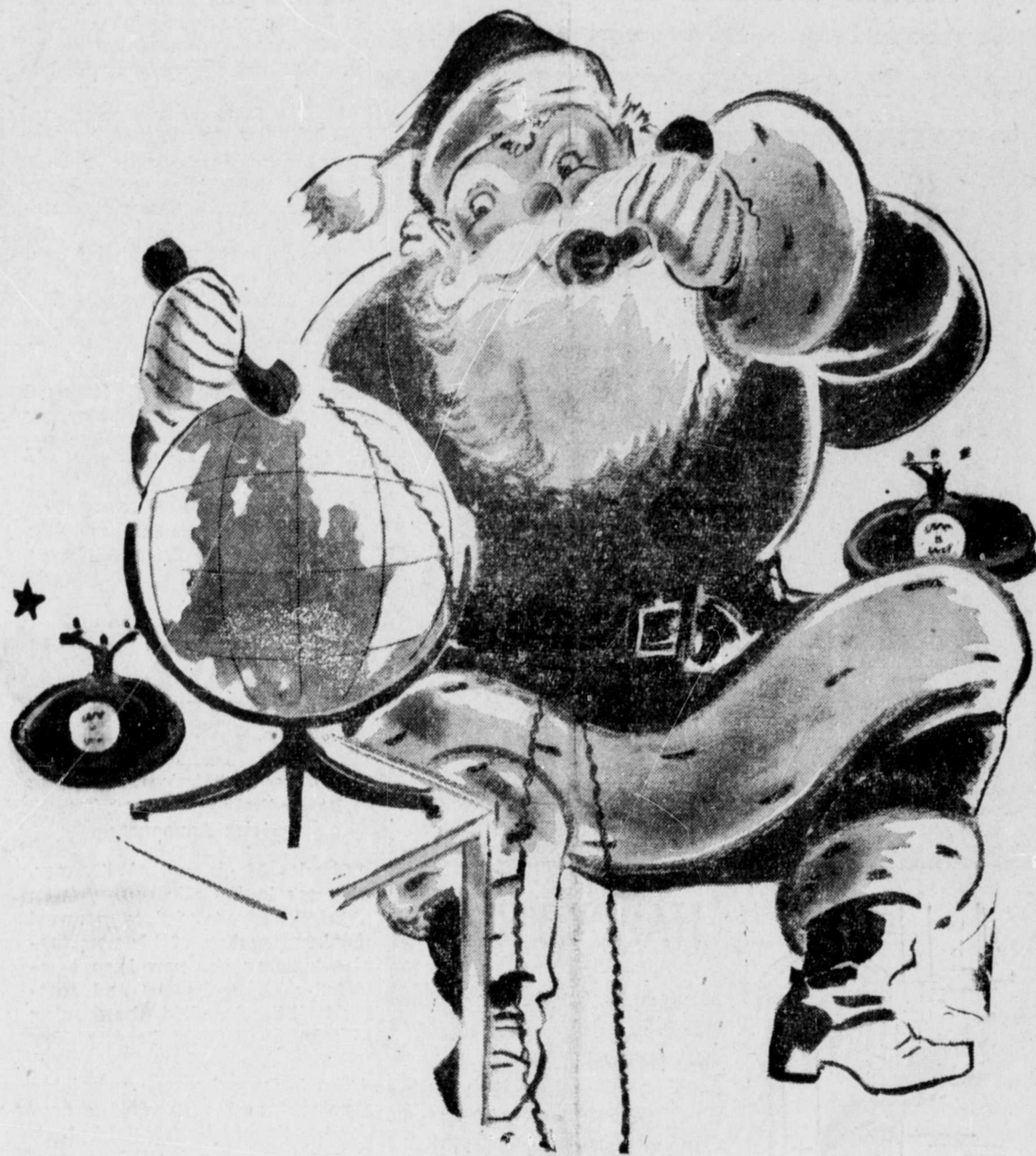

EDMONTON, Dec. 24 — The northern postman has had an exceptionally heavy Christmas load to deliver this year to the far reaches of the chilly northwest.
