Heavily Hit by Royal Air Force and Flying Fortresses

LONDON, Oct. 3 (CP)-Royal Air Force bombers kept the round-the-clock assault on Germany's war machine rolling last night with a strong smash at the Rhineland which started many fires only a few hours after United States flying fortresses, escorted by Allied fighters, shot down eighteen Nazi Focks-Wulf 190's in a raid on Northern

The British communique did not identify the exact targets of last night's raid but said that strong forces took part. Seven bombers failing to return indicated that the attacking force

consisted of perhaps 150 planes. In a daylight attack on Northern France, the fortresses returned to Great Britain without loss. Their main objectives were an aircraft factory at Neaulte and an air field at St. Omer.

Royal Canadian Air Force planes participated in both day and night forays.


