CAPTURE OF GOV'T IS PLAN

W. W. Lefeaux, Vancouver M.L.A., Speaks to Local C.C.F. Gathering

We are out on a campaign to capture the government of British Columbia and to send to Ottawa from this province a solid rock of members for the purpose of presenting our ideas as to how the country should be run.

Mr. Lefeaux said he came not in a personal way but as the voice of the workers of Vancouver to the workers of Prince Rupert.

When Russia and Germany had been showing that unemployment was not necessary and something could be done about it, Canada had had no answer except tear gas bombs and policemen's clubs.

Mr. Lefeaux went on to give a picture individually of the four-teen C.C.F. members in the present legislature.

In spite of seeming economic advantages and high wages at the present time under a condition of war which was the "acme of capitalism," the day when peace would return must be hoped and planned for.

ASSAULT KEPT UP

Rhineland and Northern France Heavily Hit by Royal Air Force and Flying Fortresses

LONDON, Oct. 3 (CP)—Royal Air Force bombers kept the round-the-clock assault on Germany's war machine rolling last night with a strong smash at the Rhineland which started many fires only a few hours after United States flying fortresses, escorted by Allied fighters, shot down eighteen Nazi Focke-Wulf 190's in a raid on Northern France.

The British communique did not identify the exact targets of last night's raid but said that strong forces took part. Seven bombers failing to return indicated that the attacking force consisted of perhaps 150 planes.

### NAMES FOR WAR TANKS

South Africa Opens New Defence Loan With Unique Features

CAPE TOWN, October 3.— Tanks on the battle fronts of the world may soon bear the names of South African citizens or communities.

A Defence Loan recently opened in the Union now makes it possible for each individual to contribute directly to the cost of war weapons, and any who subscribe sufficiently may have a tank or fleet of tanks named after them.

Authorities hope this scheme will draw off much of the £152,000,000 (\$679,500,000) lying idle in current accounts of commercial banks; interest will be paid at the rate of three per cent annually. Lists are to remain open indefinitely, and repayment will be made at par in 1964. However the government reserves the right to repay on or after Aug. 15, 1957, on three months' notice.

South Africa will gain three advantages from the war, stated Hon. J. H. Hofmeyr, Minister of Finance and Education, at Johannesburg recently. He listed them as industrial development, closer co-operation between Afrikaans and English-speaking citizens as now exemplified in the army, and a new "African" outlook.

Speaking of next year's election, Mr. Hofmeyr said that the election could only be postponed by decision of parliament and on the grounds of the international situation.

#### Security Outlook

Prime Minister J. C. Smuts has declared that South Africa is in a position to ensure a measure of security to every member of her population. In a message to the Social Security Congress opening in Durban he stated that even though the Atlantic Charter concerned itself with international action, it is no less important that individual nations should bring about greater social and economic security for their own citizens.

In a separate statement, Hon. H. G. Lawrence, Minister of the Interior and Public Health made it known that public health expenditures will pass the £1,000,000 (\$4,470,000) mark this year for the first time.

# Timely Recipes

1 cup left-over cooked meat  
1 teaspoon minced onion  
2 tablespoons shortening  
2 1/2-inch slices soft bread  
1/4 pound fresh yellow cheese  
2 eggs, separated  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon paprika  
1 1-3 cups milk  
1 tablespoon shortening (additional)

Put meat and onion through the grinder. Pan-fry three minutes with two tablespoons shortening, place in the bottom of a greased casserole. Break bread, including crust, in small pieces. Cut cheese in small, thin slivers; combine bread, cheese, beaten egg yolks and heated milk, add salt, paprika and the additional shortening. Let stand at least 20 minutes. When ready to bake add parsley and fold in the stiffly beaten egg whites. Pour over meat in baking dish. Set in a pan of water and bake in a slow oven, 325 degrees for 45 minutes or until a silver knife inserted in the centre comes out clean. This souffle won't fall if it has to be kept warm for a short time before serving.

**Waterfront Whiffs**

Not More Than Twenty Halibut Boats  
 Still Out — Steamship Service Resuming—New Cannery Here

With a week elapsed since the closing fishing date of the 1942 season, not more than twenty halibut vessels are still being awaited from the final trips of the season and it is anticipated the ensuing week will see the most of these safely in. The sole remaining Prince Rupert boats to be accounted for are the Lois N., Capt. Ben Peterson, and Sea Maid, Capt. Henry Dairon. Up to and including yesterday halibut landings at Prince Rupert for the present season had reached a total of 16,822,719 pounds as compared with 15,556,000 pounds last year at the same date. The American landings this year are 12,758,800 pounds as against 9,903,900 pounds last year while the 1942 Canadian total is 4,063,919 pounds as against 5,656,100 pounds a year ago. During the past week no Canadian halibut was landed while American vessels brought in 574,500 pounds. Prices during the week ranged from 14c and 13c paid the Lindy for 57,000 pounds to 18c and 13c which the Oceanic and Tatoosh received for 15,500 and 21,000 pounds respectively.

Twice a week service by Canadian National Steamships between Vancouver and Prince Rupert is about to be resumed following a brief interruption owing to one of the vessels having met with a mishap, it is officially announced.

Possibly obscured in view of so many other undertakings which are proceeding along the Prince Rupert waterfront is a new cannery for herring and other fish which is to be erected at Seal Cove by the Francis Millard Co. Announcement was made this

week of the issuance of a \$16,900 building permit. A site just west of McLean's boat yard which has been used in the past by other fishery projects is the location.

Capt. J. E. Noel and Capt. A. Sinclair, well known coast pilots, arrived last night from Vancouver.

Capt. Lorne Goodfrey, who has been in command of the steamer Lady Cecilia on the Vancouver-Powell River run, is relieving Capt. John Boden as master of the steamer Catala.

Anchovies Further North  
 Due probably to the generally warm weather conditions which prevailed, anchovies were seen in substantial numbers further north than usual on the British Columbia coast this summer, according to reports brought in by Prince Rupert fishermen. All up and down Douglas Channel, less than one hundred miles south of Prince Rupert, there were large numbers of them. They even became a nuisance by getting tangled up in the coho salmon nets outside of Princess Royal Island. With characteristics like a miniature herring and about six inches long, the anchovy's usual habitat is off

Trolling on the mainland was closed at the end of last week. The only salmon cannery still operating is Rivers Inlet putting up fish from gill-nets in that area.
