Still unbowed as yet another day of battle drew a close, defenders of Singapore were exacting a high price today against the Japanese but appeared o be slowly yielding in their last ditch defence of the Far Pacific barricade. The Singapore command has received and spurned a Japanese demand for surrener and the battle thundered on as a historic delayng action with a heavy cost to the attackers the nost important consideration of the defenders. Latest official word showed that Imperial forces still held about half the island at 9:30 p.m. Wednesday, Singapore time (7:30 a.m. Wednesday, Pacific Dayight Time) but there was no assurance that this line eld in the interim. Latest word was a dispatch from he Associated Press correspondent, C. Yates Mc-Daniel, sent this afternoon, saying that the line of ombat was moving steadily closer to the centre of Singapore but it was evident from his story that the Inion Jack still flew over the city. The British garison made four desperate counter-attacks today, but military dispatches said only one was successful.

Salween River Crossing Attempt Is Smashed

Defenders of Burma and the vital Burma road have smashed a Japanese attempt to cross the Salween River in the Paan area, forty miles upstream, the British command at Rangoon announced tonight.

CArthur's Forces Foil Jap Landing

On Batan Peninsula in the Philippines shore deence guns have smashed a new Japanese effort to rack the western flank of General Douglas McArthur's lines and have inflicted heavy losses on the enemy in doing so. The Japanese tried a pre-dawn anding from a number of barges towed by a searoing tug but artillery and machine gun fire sank everal barges. When daylight came the defenders' uns scored a direct hit that sank the tug and left the irges to drift helplessly toward shore where sevsank and others were captured. Ironically enigh the barges carried equipment identified as havg been sent to Japan in 1923 from the Philippine lands for relief purposes after the great earthquake d fire in Japan in 1923.

MALAYA IS DISCUSSED

Gyro Club Hears Interesting And Timely Address by Capt. Charles Dawson of Scottish

A description of the Federated Malay States, recently occupied by Japan in its back door drive on Singapore, was given by Capt. Charles Dawson of the Canadian Scottish at yesterday's weekly luncheon of the Prince Rupert Gyro Club and proved both interesting and timely. Having lived in Malay for years as rubber planter and soldier, Capt. Dawson was well qualified to tell of that rich and strange country from first hand experience.

Various aspects of the country were described including the cities and the jungles, the natural resources and the industries, the people and the wild life. Its principal resources tin and rubber, Capt. Dawson told how these were developed. The tin mines were on the surface and open, requiring no deep digging. The development of rubber plantations was possibly more complicated. The rubber tree, he said, grew eighteen feet in one year and started producing in four years.

The choice and most productive part of the Malay States being on the west coast, there were modern cities with fine stores, excellent educational facilities and all other advantages of civilization. The jungles were nigh impenetrable. Indeed it was easier, possibly, to travel tarzan-like, swinging from tree to tree, than trying to traverse the country on the ground so thick was the growth. However, there was a fine up-to-date railway from Singapore to Bangkok and an excellent highway.

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

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
